Incoming 4<sup>th</sup> grade students are to read 10 age appropriate books over the summer vacation and fill out a Reading Log. The books may be fiction or nonfiction. In addition, they must choose at least one book and complete a book report. The Reading Log and Book Report will count towards their Language Arts grade towards their first report card.

Incoming 5<sup>th</sup> grade students are to read 7 age appropriate chapter books over the summer vacation. The books may be fiction or nonfiction. In addition, they must choose at least one book and complete a book report. The Reading Log and Book Report will count towards their Language Arts grade towards their first report card.

Incoming 6<sup>th</sup> grade students are to read 5 age appropriate chapter books over the summer vacation. The books may be fiction or nonfiction. In addition, they must choose at least one book and complete a book report. The Reading Log and Book Report will count towards their Language Arts grade towards their first report card.

The number of books have been altered per grade level due to the length of time it would take students to complete age appropriate books. 4<sup>th</sup> graders are still reading less time consuming books that their older peers.
