Governor Doug Ducey and Superintendent of Public Instruction Kathy Hoffman announced the extension of Arizona school closures through the end of the school year. The extension follows updated guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and an announcement from the White House extending physical distancing guidelines until April 30, 2020. Below is updated information on resources that will be provided during the closure.

Meals - NEW Additional Pick-up Locations

During the closure, Altar Valley School District will continue providing breakfast and lunch to all children 18 years old and younger, Monday – Friday. Children must be present to receive a meal. There will be no adult meals served.

CHILD FIND

Children who are between birth and twenty-one years of age and have a developmental delay, or are suspected of having a disabling or emotionally handicapping condition, may be eligible for special services. To determine if a developmental delay exists, professional evaluations and/or assessments may be conducted in the areas of:

- Physical Development
- Language and Speech Skills
- ❖ Social and Emotional Skills
- Cognitive or Mental Development
- Self-Help Skills (e.g., dressing, feeding, etc.)

Altar Valley School District's CHILD FIND can help with a free screening and referral for diagnostic and/or early intervention programs.

McKinney-Vento

The McKinney-Vento Education of Homeless Children and Youth Assistance Act is a federal law that ensures immediate enrollment and educational stability for homeless children and youth.

children as "individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence." The act provides examples of children who would fall under this definition:

- Children and youth sharing housing due to loss of housing, economic hardship or a similar reason
- Children and youth living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camp grounds due to lack of alternative accommodations
- Children and youth living in emergency or transitional shelters
- Children and youth abandoned in hospitals
- Children and youth whose primary nighttime residence is not ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation (e.g. park benches, etc)
- Children and youth living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations
- Migratory children and youth living in any of the above situations

McKinney-Vento students have the right to:

• Attend school in the attendance area where they are currently living.

- The McKinney-Vento Act defines homeless Attend the school of origin (the school they attended when they became homeless), or the school in which they were last enrolled.
 - Immediate enrollment and support from district McKinney-Vento Liaison in obtaining school records and coordinating services.
 - Receive transportation to their school, if necessary.
 - Free school meals.
 - Receive tutoring services focusing on academic assistance.
 - Receive Preschool services.
 - Support with on-time grade progression and graduation.

AVMS Presents: Fantastic Fifth Grade



As we begin winding down the school year our fabulous fifth grade team is reflecting on a year of growth and change. Mrs. Venglarcik moved into 5th/6th Science and Mrs. Mattias into 5th/6th grade Social Studies. Mrs. Laureta's focus turned to ELA and Mrs. Bauerelen's to Math. While we all love teaching, being able to focus on one area of 'expertise' benefits our students greatly and makes us all happy.

Science:

5th graders began their science studies this year by learning about life science. They enjoyed meeting some minibeasts close up when a University of Arizona entomologist brought some specimens for some close encounters with our students. They learned about the characteristics that distinguish insects from other arthropods. Our students continue to expand their understanding of animals through opportunities to provide care and feeding for classroom pets in Mrs. Venglarcik's classroom.

Fifth grade scientists have been exploring physical science by learning about the differences between physical and chemical changes. They have been classifying compounds as

reactants and products in chemical changes by completing wet labs and then building models of these processes with Lego blocks. Students are simulating the same practices that scientists and engineers use in their respective fields.

The move to science and social studies block classes has made more robust labs possible. Our students focus alternatively on science for a week at a time, and then social studies the next week. Science labs are a great opportunity for application of math and measurement skills in a practical setting.

Social Studies:

In Social Studies we just finished up our Civil War unit and are currently studying the Industrial Revolution. The students are learning that Agriculture + Trade = Manufacturing, and how much this impacted America at this point in history. We are discussing manufacturing processes, growing industry, child labor, technology, and inventors/inventions.

Math:

I LOVE MATH! Upon learning we were departmentalizing this school year I was ecstatic to take on the role

of math teacher. My goal is for the kids to walk away with a deeper understanding of math concepts as well as a love of all things mathematical.

We have just completed our last Galileo test for the school year and are now preparing for AZM2. Our students have worked hard learning about powers of 10, exponents, decimals, volume and our favorite **FRACTIONS!** Time is passing by so quickly as we continue learning about coordinate graphing, quadrilaterals, and polygons. Our goal is to finish strong on AZM2 testing and slide, cool as cucumbers, into the summer months.

ELA:

In ELA, the kids are so pumped up at writing essays and are up to the challenge. They take pride in posting their outputs on the wall to inspire other kids. Our students enjoyed writing much better than before and have more confidence in expressing their ideas in it. We are enjoying stories about the American Culture and History. Kids are very excited about how the first pioneers travelled and moved to the west.
