New Bowie restaurant part of "new hope and enthusiasm," Chamber Director says

A new restaurant has opened in Bowie – the first one in years, according to Bowie Chamber Director Nancy-Jean Welker.

"Our town is so excited about the new restaurant," she said about the "Rafter G Restaurant," the brandnew site-built restaurant located on the West Business Loop, in Bowie. "We haven't had a restaurant in several years."

"We haven't had one built from the ground up since the mid or late 1950s, we think," she told the Range News.

The restaurant owners are Jeff and Penni Goodman, who moved to Bowie three years ago from Greenlee County.

They are also local ranchers who own the "Happy Camp Rough Mountain Ranch," south of Bowie, in the Dos Cabezas Mountains.

The restaurant's name – "Rafter G" – is from the Goodman's own cattle brand.

While they are not currently serving their own beef, plans are in the works to do so, Penni Goodman told the Range News.

In the meantime, the Goodman's are proud of serving other locally grown products – such as Cochise County wine, especially from "Coronado Vineyards," of Willcox, Penni Goodman points out.

The new restaurant has meeting rooms available for meetings and parties, and some have already been scheduled, she told the Range News.

The Goodman's plan to seal off the meeting rooms with sliding barn wood doors, which haven't been installed yet.

What has been installed, however, are custom made, solid concrete table tops and a "bar" top, which is used for counter seating in the restaurant.

The polished concrete table tops were handmade by owner Jeff Goodman's cousin, Troy Goodman, of Safford, he told the Range News.

Other table tops, which are solid "Bowie marble," as Jeff calls them, came from "Klump Materials," in Willcox.

Since construction began in August this year, the Goodman's used other area contractors, as well, such as CM Construction, of Benson; Tim's Electric and GNS Heating and Cooling, both of Willcox, he told the Range News.

Jeff Goodman also has words of praise for Cochise County and Dist. 3 County Supervisor Peggy Judd for their "overwhelming support" of the project.

The new, Western-themed restaurant, is 3,000 square feet, boasting a 700 square foot covered porch.

It is open for three meals a day, seven days a week, and hopes to attract not only locals, but traffic off the I-10, as well.

The construction and opening of the new restaurant is part of the overall improvements Welker is seeing in the Bowie community.

"Crime is at a record low, houses are selling, population is growing, and school enrollment is climbing as the citizens feel new hope and enthusiasm in 2017," she told the Range News in August this year.

Rail quiet zone coming to Bowie

Like other area communities, such as Willcox and Dragoon, Bowie will be getting its own railroad quietzone, thanks to Cochise County.

About 40 trains per day, and about 480 passenger vehicles and trucks, use the Union Pacific Railroad crossing at Central Avenue, county Public Information Officer Amanda Bailie said in a June 5 statement.

"A quiet zone means approaching trains will not give a warning sound unless deemed absolutely necessary by the engineer," she said.

After hearing complaints from those living near the crossing, the county had asked the Arizona Corporation Commission to address the issue.

"Quiet zones are designated by the Federal Railroad Administration, as it is their regulation," Corporation Commission Public Information Officer Holly Ward previously told Arizona Range News.

The commission's role includes approval of physical upgrades to the crossing, such as lights and gates. For Central Avenue, the commission approved 100 feet of raised medians at both approaches.

The crossing will be designated a Federal Railroad Administration quiet zone after the county's Highways & Floodplain Department completes its work. The road improvements, which began this month, will cost an estimated \$35,000.

Bowie Chamber of Commerce Director Nancy-Jean Welker said a "group of Bowie citizens," who had gotten together on the issue of railroad noise, asked the Bowie Chamber for its support.

"The chamber was more than happy to back them up as we see this as a positive for the quality of life here," she told the Range News. "It has been wonderful to see the locals, the county, Arizona Corporation Commission and Union Pacific Railroad come together to accomplish this improvement."

The Federal Railroad Administration's Train Horn and Quiet Zones rules state that train engineers are required to sound the horns "at least 15 seconds but no more than 20 seconds" in advance of all public highway crossings.

If a train is traveling faster than 60 miles per hour, engineers do not sound the horn until it is within a quarter-mile of the crossing, even if the advance warning is less than 15 seconds.

The "good faith" exception is for locations where engineers can't precisely estimate their arrival at a crossing and begin sounding the horn no more than 25 seconds before arriving.

In a quiet zone, railroads are directed to "cease the routine sounding of their horns" when approaching the public highway crossings.

Train horns may still be used in emergency situations or to comply with other federal regulations or railroad operating rules.

Wendy A. Conger is the new superintendent of the Bowie Unified School District.

Her appointment by the school board was announced in a Feb. 26 statement issued by Amanda Bailie, public information officer for the Cochise County Board of Supervisors.

"Mrs. Conger brings high energy to the district," Cochise County Superintendent for Education Jacqui Clay said. "Several of her goals include increasing academic growth and improving community support, ownership and

trust. She also plans to recruit and retain certified teachers, and to promote a positive and safe learning environment."

Now in her third year at Bowie Schools, Conger has been a third, fourth and fifth grade teacher for two years, as well as a program director/principal.

Conger had already assumed the superintendent duties beginning Jan. 10 this year. The school board had made a verbal severance agreement with former Superintendent Jeff St. Clair on Jan. 9, according to the Jan. 18 meeting minutes.

At its Feb. 14 meeting, the school board made Conger's appointment official.

Conger told the Range News, "Providing opportunities and building relationships is the path that leads to teaching students how to grow their own 'garden of plenty.' This is how I relate to everyone who works at Bowie Schools."

Conger has 30 years of experience as an administrator, program director and a teacher, Bailie said. She holds master's degrees in both special education and educational leadership, as well as a bachelor's in elementary education.

The school board has also welcomed a new member, recently appointed by Clay. Jeff Goodman will be sworn in at the next board meeting Tuesday, March 13, at 6 p.m., at the District Administration Building at 315 W. 5th Street, in Bowie.

"As a community member of Bowie, Mr. Goodman has great vision and passion and will do the right thing for teachers, students and the community," Clay said in the Feb. 26 statement. "He has contributed to the beautification of areas, such as the logo of the school painted on the town's water tank to instill school spirit and pride. He will do a wonderful job serving on the board."

Serving about 60 students, the Bowie School District offers classes for pre-kindergarten through grade 12, with an elementary school, a middle school and a high school. It also operates a half-day pre-kindergarten class, as well as a full-day kindergarten since 1987.

The first school in Bowie was built prior to 1897.

Schools and other groups seeking a ranger-led program should call the park in advance to make reservations. Mobility impaired individuals who are unable to complete a 3-mile hike may call 520-847-2500 ext.25 for alternate directions to the visitor center.

The park is open every day from sunrise to sunset. The visitor center is open daily from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm. Directions to the trailhead on Apache Pass Road and alternate directions to the visitor center are on the park website, www.nps.gov/fobo. For additional questions and information, contact the visitor center staff at 520-847-2500 ext. 25.

Bowie Memories:

From Bobby Montana

"News of Joyce Harman. She came to Bowie, Sept. 1947-48 and taught Spanish. I don't recall what else she taught, maybe civics. She helped wherever help was needed. She rented a room from Mr. and Mrs. Cawood in the house next to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Almodova. I don't know if she stayed on for the 1948-49 school year. I joined the Army in Aug of 1948 so I kind of lost track of Bowie doings for 2 or 3 years."

Bobby wrote that the story's wording was taken from a jumbled article found on the internet. Most of the words are correct, but an unknown number of words are missing, and other words and phrases may not be exactly as they appeared in the original Tucson Daily News article, but they were cleaned up as much as possible to see the story.

The story was compiled from articles from the Tucson Daily Citizen, Tucson, AZ, the Santa Cruz Sentinel-News and the Madera Daily News-Tribune, California, all from Monday, August 22, 1949 editions.

Nogales Bride Plane Victim, Woman Escapes in Crash But Dies in Fall, Young Bride Killed in Crash

Colusa, Calif. Aug. 22. Mrs. Joyce Harman Westfall, 23, daughter of Roy G. Harman, formerly of Nogales Arizona, was married to John F. Westfall, about 30.

The bride of four months was killed when the light plane her husband was piloting crashed into a tree on his father's ranch eight miles north of here yesterday. He suffered minor injuries.

Westfall told Coroner Tim Sullivan he was banking to drop some supplies to a ranch hand when the accident occurred. The accident occurred only about 50 yards from the Westfall home. Witnesses told Sullivan that the plane seemed to dive into the tree. The woman fell to the ground and an examination showed she died from a fractured skull suffered when she hit the ground, the coroner said.

Mrs. Westfall was formerly a school teacher in Bowie, Arizona.

From Dutch Grusendorf, Class of 1947

One of my memories of Bowie was the Bowie Theater, the seating was wooden benches with backrests, from the days when it used to be an opera house. There cannot be many remaining people that will remember the traveling vendors that would stop in Bowie and set up shop in the theater on Movie nights.

There was not much to do in Bowie during the early evening except to see the movies. I worked at the theatre for four years. We usually had a full house on all four nights of movies during the week. It was always full, including standing room, with people from Bowie and San Simon. The regular movie goers usually would try to get their usual seats. There was an aisle down the center with the benches on both sides, the kids would always sit in the front rows, closest to the screen.

The vendor that I remember best would show up an hour before the movie was set to start. He would set up a metal backstop about 6 feet beyond the end of the benches and near the movie screen. Then he would take his Pump 22 Rifle to the back of the seating area and shoot down the center of the aisle, drawing a picture in the paper, with the bullets into the metal backstop.

Some years he would create a mountainous landscape, other years he would etch an Indian Chief complete with his headdress. The kids in the front rows would sit so still, they knew better than to move around.

When the picture was revealed, the lights would stay, and the vendor and his helper would go up and down the aisles with their small buckets asking for donations. After that they would pack up and leave, the lights would dim, and the movie would start.

Think about the kids today in that type of environment, scary.
