IN-PERSON SESSIONS

Presenters will present in-person in

Chattanooga, TN on November 16 or 17. In-person sessions will not be live streamed and will not be required to submit a recorded presentation.



VIRTUAL SESSIONS

Presenters will submit a

pre-recorded version of their presentation for on-demand viewing. There will be no live component for virtual sessions.

Just as attendees have two ways to participate, presenters will have the option to present in-person or virtually. In-person presenters will follow the typical event model of presenting onsite in Chattanooga during a designated time. Virtual presenters will be required to pre-record their sessions and submit them prior to the event.



WHAT TO SHARE

This year's event theme will build upon last year's theme, *Raising Rural: A Fair Chance for a Good Life*, which will explore the six themes of NREA's Rural Research Agenda:



Designed in Collaboration with NREA's Research and Higher Education Committee



SPATIAL AND EDUCATIONAL EQUITY: Spatial and educational equity are conceptualized in two ways in this agenda: 1) spatial inequity, or how equity challenges are related to place, and 2) how equity, or rather, inequity relate to diverse identities and social circumstances present within the rural school and community.




HEALTH AND WELLNESS: This theme includes two major subthemes: mental health inequities and the effects of chemical/drug dependency on the whole community.



PARTNERSHIPS AND COMMUNITY RELATIONSHIPS: This category identifies the richness and strengths found in rural educational partnerships while also recognizing the tensions that sometimes complicate community relationships. This agenda suggests partnership research is pivotal to addressing inequities and building upon rural education assets.



TEACHER AND LEADER PREPARATION, RECRUITMENT, AND RETENTION: Workforce is a pressing issue for rural schools. The agenda suggests research that addresses recruitment of new teachers and leaders, retention of current educators, and teacher preparation programs that prepare candidates for positions in rural communities.



COLLEGE AND CAREER TRAJECTORY: This category recognizes the need for research on both college and career pathways for rural students, including expectations and aspirations, access to information and academic offerings, and transition to post-secondary pathways.



POLICY AND FUNDING: The agenda calls for attention to issues ranging from inequitable funding to local and state governance to adoption of policies that leverage the strengths of rural educational settings.

20-MINUTE RESEARCH SYMPOSIUM SESSIONS

These 20-minute sessions showcase leading research on rural education issues. Proposals for research presentations should be blinded and provide a summary of the research that addresses the following: background and relevance to rural education and the conference, purpose and research questions, method, findings (preliminary for proposal or finalized/approved for presentation), discussion of implications for rural education, and references. Research proposals will be peer reviewed by members of the NREA research committee and selected based on reviewer scoring and recommendations. Authors of top-scoring research proposals will compete for the distinguished Howard A. Dawson Best Research Paper Award. Submitting authors of a small number of top scoring research proposals will be invited to send the full paper to be read and judged by the awards subcommittee.



60-MINUTE SESSIONS

These sessions are intended to go into more depth around innovative or promising practices aligned with the event theme and guiding questions in a 60-minute format. The style of your session can range from an in-depth and interactive learning experience, to a panel discussion, to an informal conversation where audience participation is the main component.



POSTER SESSIONS (In-Person Only)

This year's conference newly offers the opportunity to present your work in a poster format! The poster session offers an abbreviated way to present research and/or promising practices in rural education. Poster proposals will be peer-reviewed by at least two members of the NREA research committee and selected based on reviewer scoring and recommendations.

PROVIDE the following information: Presenter and co-presenter contact information, session title and description, the theme that your session best aligns, and what resources they can expect to take away from your session. For Research Symposium Sessions, you will also need to upload a document containing the following: Purpose and research questions, research method, research findings, and discussion of implications for rural education, and references.

SUBMISSION, SELECTION, & REGISTRATION

ONLINE SUBMISSION

Submit your proposal online by **March 31, 2023**. We cannot accommodate special time/date requests. In-person presenters must be available to present on November 16 or 17.

PROPOSAL SELECTION

The primary proposal contact will receive an email notification regarding acceptance status by mid-April, along with information on next steps.

PRESENTER REGISTRATION

If accepted, up to two presenters will receive a **discounted registration fee** of \$300/person for in-person presenters or \$100/person for virtual presenters. Registration will be required for acceptance.
