

The new State Dashboards are being published this week, and it appears all of us will be going through somewhat of a learning curve in interpreting the various dashboards that represent schools and school districts.

You can see each dashboard indicates a specific color that represents the status of each of the areas being measured. Also, you notice there are indicators that measure either "Standard Met" or "Standard Not Met."

This is the first public representation of how our schools and how our district is doing with the new State indicators. Of course every district and every school in the State would love to see all "blues," but this is a baseline for how we are doing in all of the areas measured. The good news is improvements and growth in these areas is part of the calculation. We are already seeing improvements in the areas needed most, and we are looking forward to moving the needle in all areas.

I relate this to our results as indicated in our baseline dashboard. We celebrate areas of strength, but more importantly, we look intently on improving our areas of need. We are honest and sober minded about improving student achievement, suspension rates and chronic absenteeism.

Some may ask the question, "Yes, but how do we improve student behavior and even items like student attendance?" The answer lies behind the belief and understanding is what we do on our campuses makes a difference.

We have systems in place in working with students and parents who may be struggling in getting to school consistently. These include but are not limited to meeting with parents sooner in face to face meetings when students begin to miss school.

We also see how our Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program have decreased suspensions sharply in our district and throughout our schools. The

Dashboard might not show it, but the system continues to bring improvements in student behavior.

Lastly, more and more of our staff have developed confidence and expertise in our ability to know and teach the new standards as our students begin a journey toward greater competency in the new State Testing (CAASPP: California Assessment of Student Assessment and Progress).


