The middle school students use direct instruction as well as Magna High and Accelerated reader programs to reach all students at the varied levels present within the 6 – 8 grade spectrum. The 9 -12 grade Mission students use Edgenuity which is a state approved curriculum aligned to the state standards. The Assistant Principal of Alternative Education, Mr. Brian Brazier, supervises the schools and courses listed above.

The mission of Mission Community Day School (MCDS) is to provide a personalized education for students in grades 6-8 & 9-12 residing in Corcoran. MCDS students will be prepared as educated, responsible, and contributing students, who can read, write, communicate, and calculate with clarity and accuracy using current technologies and resources. MSCS will empower students to cultivate respect for self and others by offering opportunities for life-long personal and social development while establishing and achieving educational, and personal goals. Types of Services Funded (Fiscal Year 2019-2020)

Mission Community utilizes various textbooks from multiple publishers, a more thorough look at the curriculum used can be found in the Textbook & Instructional Materials tab in this document. Edgenuity is an online software used to expand our selection of A-G courses and mainly utilized in our 9 – 12 grade community class and high performing middle school kids. Another online program used is Pearson, it is used for intervention in the subjects of math and English. Accelerated Reader through Renaissance Learning is used to create interest and growth in the students’ reading and skills. Accelerated Reader is also used for intervention. Reading Plus Program by McGraw Hill is also used for reading intervention. In order to assist students in math we utilize the Magna High program. We also have a PBIS program for the students to motivate them to do high character things. We provide them with a currency they earn and can use to purchase things from a store we have with items purchased that kids will strive to earn the currency for. Additionally, at the community schools we provide students with counseling for the social and emotional needs. We have a teacher that comes in the afternoon to serve our ELD students several times a week. Moreover, there are counselling services provided for students that have drug abuse issues through West Care. At our community day school we have a smaller number of students affording us a chance to offer a more close up intimate setting to learn from the teacher and aide. Special ed teachers as well as mentors are provided and engage the students to assist them in school as well as in life. Lastly, we have a partnership with The MJ Project which provides our students with any books they might want or desire at no cost.

The teachers at Mission Community Day School participate in a four-day staff development training at the beginning of the school year. Designated days throughout the year afford for the PLC's to meet and discuss planning. Due to the various schedules, that the staff has at the site a specific day is not scheduled throughout the week. Professional development for the staff includes sexual harassment training, mandated reporter, safety protocols, and procedures. Attendance accounting was discussed as well as covid-19 protocols and sanitation. Tulare County Office of Education offers training for our teachers and on-going professional development during the academic school year. Coaching, teacher-principal meetings, student performance data, PLC meetings, our county office of education-Kings County, training's and conferences all are part of our ongoing professional development. Furthermore, my teachers are involved in internship programs that constantly check-in and monitor the teachers in creating and performing certain targeted lessons. We also meet as a staff several times a year to go over curriculum changes and introduce new strategies and focal points. We meet to discuss what's working and what needs to be improved upon. The district also provided training for the Community Contacts on attendance accounting and Covid-19 protocols specific to their positions. Paraprofessionals also went to training on how to deal and work with social and emotional issues that students may face. Additionally, the staff was training on the new curriculums that were purchased for the students. The community contact also received training by CASAS for the purpose of reporting data in Topspro.
