#### Assistant Superintendent's Message

Park #1 Pride - Accountability, Achievement and Growth.

It seems in today's world one hears a lot about accountability when the topic of public education is raised. But what is school accountability? The state of Wyoming defines accountability as how well teachers, principals, and superintendents help students grow academically. The Wyoming Department of Education (WDE) has a system that measures both state and federal school performance levels.

School performance levels are determined from a variety of indicators and are calculated to help determine which schools are doing well and which schools are in need of support. The Wyoming Accountability in Education Act (WAEA) looks at student growth, readiness, achievement, equity, and English language proficiency. Based on these indicators, schools receive one of four overall performance ratings: Exceeding Expectations, Meeting Expectations, Partially Meeting Expectations, or Not Meeting Expectations.

The federal accountability system is defined in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Under ESSA, schools with a graduation rate below 67 percent and the bottom 5 percent of Title I schools are identified for state-led support. Additionally, schools with specific student groups in the bottom 10 percent are identified for supports and interventions led by the local school and district. This information is included in the school performance report which is the "report card" for each school.

Park County School District #1 has developed our strategic plan last year to address areas where accountability measures applied. Our Board of Education, staff and administration set objectives to ensure our students achieve and grow at high levels. One of our objectives is, "All schools will meet or exceed targets as measured by the state accountability report." I'm happy to report all our schools have either met or exceeded targets according to the WDE.

We recognize the effort of our students and staff to continually learn, grow and achieve in all areas of education, not just the state test. Park #1 was recently notified by the WDE that Powell was in the top five in every subject area tested in Wyoming Test of Proficiency and Progress (WY-TOPP). Michelle Panos, WDE communications director said, "Park 1 is consistently in the top of all districts with the increase of proficient and advanced students in all three subjects over the previous year." The WY-TOPP tests students in third through 10th grades in math and English. Students in fourth, eighth and 10th grades also took science exams.

We are so proud of our students and the success they have achieved. The parent and community support in Powell is second to none which adds to the sense of pride in our learning community here at Park County School District #1. Go Panthers!

On August 27th Ethan Asher, a senior at PHS, was involved in a lifethreatening car accident on his way to school. He suffered head trauma, a torn aorta, and a severed spine. The family was told that there was no chance Ethan would walk again. A prayer vigil was held on Wednesday, August 28th at Washington Park and members from across the community joined together to lift up the Asher family. The outpouring of support prompted the creation of the public Facebook group #EthanStrong. Ethan's mom, Tiffani Asher, posts updates on Ethan's recovery, and members offer words of encouragement. The group has over 5,000 members with posts and support from all across the region, country, and as far as Avellino, Italy. #EthanStrong support crosses state lines and surpasses borders. Fundraisers throughout the community and beyond have raised thousands of dollars to help the Asher family and support Ethan during his recovery.

#### **Halloween Safety Tips**

#### Keep Costumes Both Creative and Safe

- Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors.
- Choose face paint and makeup whenever possible instead of masks, which can obstruct a child's vision.
- Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers.
- When selecting a costume, make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls.

#### Drive Extra Safely on Halloween

- Slow down and be especially alert in residential neighborhoods.
   Children are excited on Halloween and may move in unpredictable ways.
- Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully.
- Eliminate any distractions inside your car so you can concentrate on the road and your surroundings.
- Drive slowly, anticipate heavy pedestrian traffic and turn your headlights on earlier in the day to spot children from greater distances.

#### Trick or Treat With an Adult

 Children under the age of 12 should not be alone at night without adult supervision. If kids are mature enough to be out without supervision, they should stick to familiar areas that are well lit and trick-or-treat in groups.
