FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Be A Churchman (or woman)!

When Richard "Doc" Oster transferred his church membership from Louisiana to the then-new Trinity Lutheran Church here in Summerfield, his pastor wrote: "There are times when a Pastor wishes he could transfer certain people to another church. There are also those he wants to keep. Dr. Richard Oster is a 'keeper.' You are receiving a *true churchman* who loves his Lord and over the years has given evidence of his discipleship." What wonderful words to describe a church member! I think the term "churchman" has fallen into disuse these days and would almost be thought of as a "throwback" term. If that is true, I hope we can revive it.

What is a churchman (or woman)? Being a "true churchman" goes beyond simply joining a church or being a member or attending worship services. It goes beyond serving on a committee or being an usher or helping with church maintenance. Being a true churchman speaks more to an attitude or approach to church membership. It is the positive, supportive attitude of a Christian who sees the church as the organization which is *the* hope for a dying world and understands the importance of making sure that the church always puts it's "best foot forward" no matter the circumstances.

We're all familiar with people who easily criticize and find fault with things at church, or who like to share gossip under the guise that they are "spiritually concerned." People like this make it difficult for a church to move forward, because pastor and leaders are always tending to little fires and trying to bring them under control. People who insist that everything must be acceptable and pleasing to them, and complain when things are not, are not churchmen or women. People who leave one church for another because they don't like this or that are not churchmen or women. People who are a part of the inevitable "problems" of a church are not churchmen or women, either.

I remember a voters' meeting years ago at a church I served. One of our members spoke extensively and passionately about a direction he wished the congregation would take. The congregation voted decisively against his position. After the meeting, he came up to me and said "I want you to know that, personally, I was in favor of the position I proposed. But I also want you to know that, now that the congregation has decided, I am with the congregation." That's a churchman. That's a person who is willing to put him or herself aside for the greater good. That's a person who wants the church to succeed no matter what. And when that happens, the church becomes an effective witness to the life-changing message of the selfless Gospel of Jesus Christ.

There can never be too many "true churchmen" in a congregation. We have many of them here, people who put themselves and their desires aside for the good of everyone. I am thrilled and proud to serve with them. But there can never be too many "churchmen" at Trinity. Would you be willing to check your heart and motivations and commit yourself to being a "churchman" or "churchwoman?" We will be blessed, and so will you, if you do!

Everyone is encouraged to take time out of their busy schedule to pray with Christians around the world. Materials will be provided. Fellowship will be in the lobby. So, mark your calendars and don't miss this rewarding experience.

ORIGINS OF WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

The origins of World Day of Prayer date back to the 19th century when Christian women of the United States and Canada initiated a variety of cooperative activities in support of women's involvement in mission at home and in other parts of the world. Women had a strong sense of identification with the needs of women and children and searched for ways to provide support. Despite strong resistance from all-male mission boards, beginning in 1861 women founded many women's boards for foreign and home missions where they could work directly with other women and children.

Women were encouraged to engage in personal prayer and take leadership within their mission auxiliaries and associations. This emphasis on prayer led to annual days and weeks of prayer. In 1887 Presbyterian women called for a day of prayer for home missions and Methodist women called for a week of prayer and self-denial for foreign missions. A Baptist day of prayer for foreign missions began in 1891. Women had a vision of Christian unity that was essential to their exercise of mission. By 1897 six denominations had formed a committee for a united day of prayer for home missions. In 1911 women celebrated the 50th anniversary of women's missionary activity by organizing a series of speaking engagements across the US providing other women with a powerful experience of ecumenical cooperation and fellowship. Women of the six participating denominations wrote a common worship service on a rotating basis and in 1912 called for a united day of prayer for foreign missions.

After the devastation of World War I, women incorporated the conviction that world peace was intrinsically tied to world mission and renewed their efforts for unity. The first Friday of Lent was established as a joint day of prayer for missions and celebrated for the first time on February 20, 1920. Due to the enthusiasm of denominational and interdenominational women's groups, world spread rapidly throughout the USA. In 1922, Canadian women who had begun celebrating a day of prayer in 1895, took up the same date.

In 1926 women in North America distributed the worship service to as many countries and partners in mission as they could. The worldwide response was enthusiastic. By 1927 the call to prayer was issued for a World Day of Prayer for Missions. The title was shortened to World Day of Prayer in 1928 and that same year, this statement came from the World Day of Prayer Committee: It is with deep gratitude that we recognize the growing power inherent in our World Day of Prayer. A very decided expansion of this prayer fellowship has come during the past year. The circle of prayer has expanded literally around the world. We have learned the great lesson of praying with, rather than for, our sisters of other races and nations, thus enriching our experience and releasing the power which must be ours if we are to accomplish tasks entrusted to us.

MARCH MUSIC NOTES

ANOTHER HUGE SUCCESS: Our BGD Night at Trinity! (Bluegrass, Gospel, Dessert). The dessert room looked like a Thanksgiving dessert buffet! It was unbelievable. The little cards telling about the desserts made it so interesting. Folks who visited and have seen me since the BGD event mentioned the cards, the generosity of the desserts provided, and, of course, our wonderful musical groups.



We could all be proud that, with so many visitors, Trinity provided a fun evening. I send heartfelt thanks to ALL THE BAKERS OF TRINITY – FOR EVERY BEAUTIFUL, TASTY, and BOUNTIFUL DESSERT that adorned our tables. AND, an extra 'thank you' to Patti, to all the kitchen crew, the cleanup crew, the Set-up crew – our evening worked out so well because so many hands and hearts generously helped to make it special.

MOVING ON to LENT, PALM/PASSION, Holy Week, and RESURRECTION SUNDAY:

I have special music planned throughout the season. However, Palm/Passion Sunday is dramatic and stirring, with the blessing of the palms, the procession into the sanctuary, the reading of the Passion account, and the music of the 'Antique Brass' and timpani, organ, choirs, and bells.

New this year: our Trinity Bells will ring on Good Friday, as well as Palm and Easter Sundays.



EASTER SUNDAY:

Our choirs, brass, timpani, bells – leading worship at BOTH SERVICES.COME EARLY to worship to hear the high trumpet play 'I know that my Redeemer lives!' and our Trinity bells Playing the Mozart 'Alleluia!' Our Easter choral anthem is a rarely-sung gem. It is titled 'EASTER HYMN,' by Pietro Mascagni. Mascagni was An Italian composer, 27 yrs. old, when his opera premiered in Rome, 1890, from which this Easter Hymn originates.

In the opera, the first part of the Easter service has begun, in the church, and one hears the solo organ and a small choir singing. The procession into the church has yet to begin, for the villagers waiting outside. The Easter service is central and vital to the life of this small village, as it is central and vital to the life of our small community of believers here at Trinity.

Musically, the distant organ and the small choir grows to a grand, massed ensemble; with dynamic contrasts in the pitch and volume. The lyrical melody keeps rising and rising, higher and higher, phrase by phrase – as though depicting in sound 'Jesus is risen from the grave, ascending to Heaven.' There is increasing urgency as the choirs and instruments joyously proclaim, 'Alleluia, alleluia! The Lord is risen indeed!'

A side note: I did not have any brass parts for this anthem. They are only available from one rental company, at a huge expense. I listened on YouTube to the EASTER HYMN, the version sung by South Church, Boston. I contacted the music director at South Church, and asked where I could purchase brass parts.' They can only be rented,' he said, but he had composed his own brass parts.

He was so thrilled that we were bringing this outstanding anthem to Central Florida, that he GAVE ME his brass parts. Frank Kelly, who is our timpanist on big Sundays, generously created percussion parts. These kind acts have made it possible for me to go ahead, and to prepare the music with the choirs and the instrumentalists.

We have four young artists coming from Deland, Florida – who are also very enthusiastic to participate in this unique choral opportunity – to sing the Choir 2 parts. I am rehearsing them separately from our own choirs at Trinity. They will be staying overnight with us, to be certain they are up and ready to go for our 8 AM worship on Easter. Our own choirs are working diligently on the anthem, at Thursday rehearsals.



You will hear all of this glorious musical praise, to our risen Lord, on Easter Sunday.



In February, we celebrated God's Love for us and spread His love to many children, furry friends, and Senior citizens through the sewing and distribution of 22 pet beds delivered to Marion County Humane Society. Three crib sheets were delivered to the Infant and Toddler Pantry. One baby blanket was given to a baby who was recently baptized in the church. 173 drawstring bags were delivered to Kid Central. Five quilts were given to various people needing comfort. In addition, 3 walker bags were given to people who needed them.

What is Kids Central? Kids Central is a place for people to go to help children in need. They have an office in Wildwood, Leesburg and Ocala. I was warmly welcomed by Dayana at the Wildwood office where I delivered the drawstring bags. She graciously explained to me how the drawstring bags would be used. One of the uses is for foster children who are moved from place to place to carry what few personal belongings they have. Drawstring bags take up much less space than suitcases. Another use is to send items children need to relatives who are taking care of children when the parent is not available or incapable to care for their own. This is called the Kinship Program. These kindhearted relatives can often barely scrape by to take care of their immediate family so assistance is given to help when they open their homes to these children in need. Thirdly, at Christmas time they provide Christmas to 150-250 children in need. Items are taken home by the parents to wrap. A drawstring bag is a great way to keep the gifts disguised until they can wrap them. I asked her how long the drawstring bags we brought to date would typically last. She said they would be gone in 4 months' time! We have plenty more to sew for them and will continue to provide them with bags. Our goal is to make sure they will have plenty to make it through the summer.



Kids Central provides many other services. At the center, there are computers for people to use to apply for jobs, etc. They hold workshops to help people hone their parenting skills, resume writing skills and job hunting skills as well. They have a bulletin board with pictures of the smiling faces of people who were assisted in being gainfully employed. They also help those who need help applying for government assistance or referrals for other resources.

Other reasons for rejoicing: We are now only 5 quilts away from the amount of quilts we need for the April 1st honor flight. We have many children's and baby quilts accumulating and expect a major distribution to our children's charities in March. Sandy Horne stepped up to the plate and learned how to sew our walker bags. We had a gap there since Evelyn Schultz and Sharon Smith moved away. New member Tami Campbell has been instrumental in our drawstring bag production, turning them right side out and putting the drawstrings in. She has a friend who has designed a tool to use that makes it much easier and quicker than using a safety pin. Former Scrappy Quilter Betty Cleal made a major donation of materials and sewing supplies. Praise God from whom all blessings flow!!!!!

Maybe this message isn't the strongest comparison between tipping for food service and for that what we receive by God to sustain our lives, but again this is only an analogy.

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TRADITION

For some, tradition means a Thanksgiving dinner of turkey or ham, mashed potatoes, candied yams, bread stuffing or corn bread dressing, cranberry sauce, green bean casserole, and a host of family favorites. And, lest I forget, pumpkin pie, apple pie, or mincemeat pie, or maybe all of them or a combination of the three. Christmas dinner may look the same as Thanksgiving. In 1987, I took my wife for her first trip to Key West, Florida. With few exceptions we have made the journey each year. Our favorite time to go is Thanksgiving. Why? Because it is the end of the summer season when there are fewer people. Our traditional dinner on the fourth Thursday of November is to have a New England clam bake to include Maine lobster, clams, corn on the cob and little red potatoes. No turkey for us.

Our English word "tradition" comes from the Latin verb trader, which literally means 'to hand on." When we speak of tradition, we mean those things that are passed along from one generation to another as important and essential to our identity. To some, tradition is something that cannot and should not be changed. To others, it is living and growing and changeable. Who is right? Well consider, there are churches that refuse to change and adapt. Their motto is "We've never done it like that before." When I was in seminary I was taught that those are the last seven words of a dying church. I was also taught that the words "let's try it and see what happens" are the words of a church that more than likely will survive and thrive.

Back to food. This year, my wife and I did not get to go to Key West. We spent Thanksgiving with my family in California. The plan was to have a traditional Thanksgiving dinner. And plans were made for such. However, my brother and his wife were both in the hospital, so we decided to do something different. As the head chef, I made the strategic decision that the Thanksgiving meal this year would be hot dogs. You could have a chili dog, a chili cheese dog with or without onions. There were at least ten toppings for you to choose from. A new tradition? Probably not. Just a break from the old.

Consider worship, there are denominations whose liturgy is the same each and every week. You do not need a worship guide to keep up with what is going on. When it is time to pray for the confession of our sins, it is the same week after week. At Trinity, it is different each week, the absolution is the same but the confession is different. In some congregations worship seems to be a series of one act plays. That is their tradition. At Trinity, our worship flows without mini breaks. In most liturgical churches, there is a procession down the center isle and at Trinity, sometimes the procession comes from the right side of the stage. Static or changing?

I believe Trinity has one very good static tradition. I offer the following. Each Sunday, with few exceptions, people start arriving for coffee and conversation by 6:30 am, an hour and a half before the service. Why? Because we are family wanting to communicate with other family members. There is nothing better. However, sometimes we get so wrapped with those we know that we may overlook those we do not know. Perhaps they have come looking for family members at Trinity. Let's show them they have come to the right place, greet our new family members, and introduce them to a caring and loving family. They might just say "hot dog."

Council Meeting Notes February 18, 2020

TREASURER'S REPORT (copy attached): Gary Eckoff presented the Treasurer's report for January 2020.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT (copy attached): Rusty Ryan presented the Financial Secretary's Report for January 2020.

Patti Paxton made the following MOTION: Council shall accept the Treasurer's Report and the Financial Secretary's report as presented. Gary Eckoff seconded the motion. Motion carried.

<u>PASTORS' REPORT</u>: Pastor Dan ran through the Pastors' Report (copy attached) noting that there has been a lot of activity in all areas.

The Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC) has put together a report that was taken from the surveys that the Congregation completed. The LRPC is preparing for Cottage Meetings. There was a question at the end of the survey asking about major areas of concern. Pastor Dan is not proposing that any action be taken at this time, but would like us to think about a couple of things. His suggestion is that, as we are in a place and time to move forward, we consider a one-year capital campaign for (1) a new organ and (2) staffing for Trinity South for a year. Then we would immediately follow up with a three-year capital campaign to (1) reduce current mortgages and (2) acquire land for Trinity South.

Regarding the new organ, Chuck Wilt, Head Elder, reported that Rocket met with the Elders earlier this month. The current electronic organ is 25 years old and was purchased, used, in 2004. Breakdowns are happening more often and we have spent about \$3,000 per year over the last five years for repairs. The Board of Elders is responsible for the maintenance and replacement of the organ. An independent consultant came in to discuss options. He gave Rocket a report which she passed on to the Elders. The Elders recommend we establish an organ replacement fund and a committee to begin reviewing options for the future.

At the recommendation of the Board of Elders, Chuck Wilt made the following two motions:

MOTION: Church Council shall approve the establishment of an Organ Replacement Fund to receive future member donations. Patti Paxton seconded. Motion carried.

MOTION: Church Council shall approve the collaboration of Council President and the Chairman of the Board of Elders to appoint a committee to study the future replacement options and funding for the church organ, with the help of an independent consultant. This committee will report back to the Board of Elders and the Church Council with their recommendations. Martha Mitchell seconded. Motion carried.

Discussions then turned to a capital campaign for associate pastoral staffing at Trinity South. It was suggested that we look at all possibilities. This is the beginning of the process! There are a lot of details to be worked out.

Pastor Blair reports that small groups are underway and he is hearing very positive comments. This session will go through April.

BUSINESS MANAGER'S REPORT:

Jill Esposito informed Council that the carpets in both buildings are being cleaned on Feb. 24th and that the vinyl floors in both buildings are being cleaned on the 29th. New member orientation is Thursday, Feb. 20th. She urged each Board to make sure there is a representative present. There will be 20-22 new members. Also, a Financial Review Committee needs to be formed.



NEW BUSINESS:

Bob Behrends moved: <u>MOTION</u>: Council shall approve Operation Barnabas Chapter to solicit donations from the congregation for the 4th of July event. Gary Eckoff seconded. Motion carried.

BOARD REPORTS:

Elders (report attached): Chuck Wilt reported that they are still in need of communion assistants and ushers.

Evangelism (report attached): Bob Behrends reported that the Creation Studies seminar is being rescheduled. No new date at this time. Scripts have been written and approved for a radio schedule to begin in March 2020. Details of the 4th of July Veteran's event are well into the planning stage. They plan to ask the congregation for donations, pending approval of Council. "You Are the Jury" play is tentatively scheduled for the April 1st Lenten service. The web site was discussed and it was decided that they take a more active role in keeping it current.

Fellowship (report attached): Patti Paxton reminded us that new member orientation is Thursday, February 20th. Breakfast for new members, between services, is on February 23rd. Lenten soup and sandwich supper menus have been distributed. Desserts need to be provided by the Board(s) assigned to that particular date.

Human Care: Martha Mitchell commented that they might have to disband the prayer shawl ministry. They are having difficulty finding people who knit or crochet.

Stewardship: Dennis Esch distributed a brochure from the FL-GA district, "Veterans of the Cross Retreat" (copy attached). He also handed out a copy of the "Gift Planning Newsletter: Transfer the Blessings" (copy attached). He discussed the philosophy behind this gift planning process. This is not financial planning. There is a gift planner available to assist folks in developing a "Lifetime Plan for Giving". He would like to see our congregation become more aware of this process. He will continue to be involved and report back to the Council.

Our next meeting is scheduled for March 17, 2020 at 1:30 PM. Gary Eckoff moved that the meeting be adjourned, Rusty Ryan seconded. Meeting was adjourned. Pastor Dan closed the meeting with prayer.
