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

K-3 Reading Plans

By the end of September, all students in grades K-3 were assessed in reading, as required by Ohio law, to determine if they are on track to be reading at the third-grade level by the end of grade three. Parents of students who were not on track according to the assessment will have their child's reading plan in hand before the end of the month.

Should you have questions or concerns about the plan, please contact your child's teacher or the elementary office.

Students in 3rd grade took the Ohio State test in English Language Arts for the first time in October. This is the first of several opportunities for the students to meet the requirements for promotion to fourth grade. Third-grade parents will receive additional information with the first set of results from the Ohio State Test. 

By this point, we're likely all familiar with the term *Helicopter Parenting*, where parents keep an overly watchful eye on their child's every move and then swoop in to save the day at the first sign of trouble. But have you heard of *Lawnmower Parenting*?

While the helicopter parent hovers and worries, the lawnmower parent takes it even further, stepping in to clear their child's path of potential obstacles and challenges. This prevents their child from having to experience any feelings of pain, sadness, discomfort or disappointment.

If any of these scenarios sound familiar, you have likely come across a Lawnmower Parent. (Keep in mind these examples refer to middle and high school parents.)

- A parent panics when they realize their child forgot his math homework on the kitchen table, so they run it right over to the school in time for class.
- A student misses a day of school from illness, but instead of the student following up with you, the parent reaches out to the school to collect her makeup work.
- A student is feeling really anxious about having to make a presentation in your class, so the parent contacts you to push for an alternate

arrangement.

While it's normal and natural for parents to want to protect their children, this type of parenting can have long-lasting, harmful effects.

When a parent constantly intervenes in a child's life in this manner:

- It sends the message that, "my parents – not me – are the only ones equipped to make decisions and handle challenges in my life."
- It creates youth who increasingly feel "entitled" and expect things to always go their way with minimal effort on their part.
- Most dangerously, this type of parenting shelters children from experiencing and dealing with any type of adversity. It's only a matter of time before something goes wrong and it's out of the parent's control. And when that happens, the child has no positive coping skills to deal with their situation, and may act out aggressively, negatively internalize what they're feeling, or possibly turn to substances in an attempt to get a handle on their emotions.

Another name being given to this style of parenting, which may paint an even clearer picture is "Curling Parents." Think back to the Olympic sport where the

players slide a stone down the ice toward a target, but then rush just ahead of it to smooth and attempt to direct its path to success. Call it curling, bulldozing, snowplowing or lawn mowing—it all means the same thing, and it's truly a disservice to our children. In order for students to develop into happy, healthy and successful adults, they must be taught, encouraged, and guided to begin to think, speak, and make decisions for themselves. They need to be allowed to learn from their mistakes and to be taught to process and handle adversity appropriately and positively. If it comes time that they have done their part advocating for themselves and a situation remains unresolved, then mom or dad can step in to assist.

Here are some helpful tips for working with your child on homework.

General Homework Tips

- Make sure your child has a quiet, well-lit place to do homework.
- Make sure the materials your child needs (i.e. paper, pencils, dictionary, etc.) are readily available.
- Establish a set time each day for doing homework, and don't let your child leave homework until just before bedtime.
- Have a positive attitude toward homework.
- When your child asks for help, provide guidance, not answers.
- Have your child do the hard work first when they are most alert.
- Allow your child to take a short break if he or she becomes frustrated. Give

SHOULD MY CHILD STAY HOME?

FEVER

- *100 degrees or higher on the day of or the night before school-keep home until fever free for 24 hours without medicine
- *if has headache and stiff neck, seek medical help **right away**

COLD

- *mild cough, sneezing, aching muscles and watery eyes
- *keep home on the first day or two – this is when they are most able to spread the cold to others

BAD or HARSH COUGH

- *stay home and contact your child's health care provider (might have bronchitis, flu, pneumonia, whooping cough or croup)
- *return to school after the cough improves and child is feeling better or when your child's health care provider recommends

SORE THROAT

- *keep home if also has fever, swollen glands, a hard time swallowing or talking or if throat is red and swollen
- *bad sore throat with headache and/or upset tummy can be signs of strep throat – contact your child's health care provider

VOMITING/STOMACHACHE/DIARRHEA

- *keep at home for at least 24 hours after the last time the child vomits (pukes) or has diarrhea without medicine

EARACHE

- *if pain, drainage or blood from the ear canal, contact your child's healthcare provider

PINK EYE

- * contact your child's health care provider and keep at home until 24 hours after treatment starts

RASH

- *contact your child's health care provider before sending back to school (may be one of many easy to spread diseases such as Impetigo, Chicken Pox, Shingles, Fifth Disease, Strep or Staph infection, Roseola or Scabies)
- some rashes are a sign of a worse disease
- rashes may also be from poison ivy, reaction to a medicine or a food allergy

LICE/NITS

- *treat with a NON-TOXIC product; follow the directions given to you by the NON-TOXIC product, the health department or your child's health care provider
- *most schools require your child to be checked by the health department or the school before coming back to class
- *do NOT use anything flammable on your child's hair (rubbing alcohol, kerosene)
- *check all other people that live in your house and treat them if they have lice or nits

NOT SURE IF YOUR CHILD SHOULD STAY HOME? CONTACT YOUR CHILD'S HEALTH CARE PROVIDER

him or her a set time that homework should resume.

- If your child has been successful in homework completion and is working hard, reward their effort.

Reading Homework Tips

- Have your child read aloud to you every night.
- Choose a quiet place, free of distractions, for your child to do his or her nightly reading assignments.
- Ask your child to tell you in his/her own words what happened in the story.
- Before getting to the end of a story, ask your child what he/she thinks will happen next and why.
- When your child reads aloud to you and makes a mistake, point out the words that were missed and help him or her read the words correctly.

Math Homework Tips

- o If you don't understand your child's math assignments, engage in

frequent communication with his or her teacher.

- o Follow the progress your child is making in math and check with her/him daily about math homework.
- o Try to be aware of how your child is being taught math, and don't teach strategies and shortcuts that conflict with the approach the teacher is using. Ask the teacher about online resources that you can use with your child at home.

Parents who tell a child that *doing homework is important* are conveying the message that education is highly valued in their family. Be sure to let your son or daughter know you expect it to be done. On the other hand, teachers do want to know when homework is taking the child too long or battles over homework are causing uncomfortable conflict in the home. Do not hesitate to let the teacher know if this is the case.

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
