
Map to Subject Property






Site Plan of subject property









This narrative is meant to justify my request for a zone change to parcel number 212-69-019A located in Apache County Arizona.

- A) As per Article 23, section 2303. Conditional uses, in the Apache County Board of Supervisors, adopted Medical Marijuana Regulations, "A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location is only permitted in the C-2 (general business) zone". Parcel# 212-69-019A is currently zoned as AG land. My request for a zone change is prompted based on the county requirements.
- B) Changing the zoning for parcel# 212-69-019A will enable the parcel owner to remain compliant with the Apache County Board of Supervisors, adopted Medical Marijuana Regulations. Compliance with local jurisdiction will further the public health, safety, comfort, convenience, and welfare by providing and maintaining a safe and secure cultivation facility environment as it is defined by the state. A dispensaries cultivation site may be located anywhere in the state where a cultivation site is allowed by the local jurisdiction.
- C) The environmental impact to the property and its' surrounding neighbors will be minimal. Every effort will be made to preserve the natural landscape of the property. Privacy trees will be planted in areas where the building structure are most visible from the property line. The plot plan and building configuration demonstrates how no cultivation building or work area are visible from county road N9160. We have intentionally kept the natural tree line of the property enabling the facility to blend in and not affect the established character of the surrounding neighborhood nor be detrimental to adjacent properties.

CONSENT AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN THE ARIZONA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES AND

GREEN HILLS PATIENT CENTER, INC. (October 2015)

JURISDICTION

The Arizona Department of Health Services ("Department") is charged by statute with authority to protect the health of the people of Arizona and to issue or direct the issuance of licenses and permits required by law. A.R.S. § 36-132(A)(1) & (17). The relevant statutes governing the Department's regulation of medical marijuana are Arizona Revised Statutes ("A.R.S.") §§ 36-2801 through 2819 (collectively "AMMA"). The relevant rules governing the Department's regulation of medical marijuana are Arizona Administrative Code ("A.A.C.") §§ R9-17-101 through R9-17-323 (collectively the "Rules"). The Department has authority to adopt rules specifying the procedures for revoking or denying an application to renew the dispensary registration certificate of a nonprofit medical marijuana dispensary that violates the provisions of AMMA or the Rules. A.R.S. § 36-2803(A)(4). Such procedures are specified, among other places, in A.A.C. § R9-17-322.

RECITALS

- A. On August 7, 2012 Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. ("Green Hills") was awarded a dispensary registration certificate (No. 00000051DCYH00987523) (the "Certificate") for the Community Health Analysis Area ("CHAA") that encompasses Show Low, Arizona and is designated by the Department as CHAA 21.
- B. The Certificate was renewed effective August 7, 2013 and again effective August 7, 2014. The Department Denied Green Hill's application to renew the Certificate effective August 7, 2015, which is in part the subject of this Consent Agreement.
- C. On or about October 1, 2014 Green Hills opened and began operating a dispensary at 3191 South White Mountain Road, Suite A, Show Low, Arizona 85901 ("Dispensary").
- D. On June 8, 2014 the Department received an email from Tara Haslock, a Principal Officer and Board Member of Green Hills ("Haslock"), stating that: (1) the Dispensary was

closed following a robbery; and (2) it was not known when the Dispensary would reopen.

- E. A Department representative left a phone message for Haslock on June 17, 2015 asking for an update on when the Dispensary would reopen. Haslock responded that she hoped the Dispensary would reopen by July 1, 2015.
- F. Representatives of the Department visited the Dispensary on July 9, 2015 to verify whether it had reopened. The Dispensary was not open, and a sign on the front door stated: "Closed for Repairs." The representatives also spoke with a postal worker who advised that the Dispensary's mail had not been picked up for several weeks.
- G. On July 10, 2015 the Department reviewed the Dispensary's medical marijuana transaction history from June 4, 2015 through July 10, 2015, as recorded on the Department's Medical Marijuana POS/Verification System. There were no sales recorded during that timeframe.
- H. Pursuant to A.A.C. § R9-17-310(A)(I), a nonprofit medical marijuana dispensary must be "operating and available to dispense medical marijuana to qualifying patients and designated caregivers at least 30 hours weekly between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m." The Department concluded based on the foregoing that the Dispensary was not operating and available to dispense medical marijuana at least thirty hours per week.
- I. The Department may revoke a Certificate or deny an application to renew the Certificate of a nonprofit medical marijuana dispensary for violations of AMMA or the Rules. A.R.S. § 36-2803(A)(4); A.A.C. § R9-17-322.
- J. On July 22, 2015 the Department issued a Notice of Intent to Revoke Dispensary Registration Certificate and Notice of Right to Request Administrative Hearing (the "Notice of Intent to Revoke"). The Notice of Intent to Revoke stated it was being issued because Green Hills had not complied with AMMA and the Rules.
- K. Green Hills requested an administrative hearing on the Notice of Intent to Revoke. A hearing was set for October 19, 2015 before the Office of Administrative Hearings ("OAH") under Case No. 2016C-MMR-0040-DHS.
- L. On August 10, 2015 the Department denied Green Hills' application to renew the Certificate (the 'Denial'). The Department stated the reason for the Denial was that Green Hills



had not complied with AMMA and the Rules.

- M. Green Hills requested an administrative hearing on the Denial. A hearing on the Denial was set for October 13, 2015 under OAH Case No. 2016C-MMR-0066-DHS. OAH thereafter consolidated the hearing on the Denial with the hearing on the Notice of Intent to Revoke. The consolidated hearing was scheduled for October 19, 2015 ("Hearing").
- N. Green Hills requested an Informal Settlement Conference ("TSC") on the Notice of Intent to Revoke and the Denial. An ISC was held on October 2, 2015. Representatives of the Department and Green Hills met and discussed settlement during the ISC, resulting in this Consent Agreement ("Agreement").

AGREEMENT

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, and the terms, covenants, and conditions set forth herein, and for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Department and Green Hills agree as follows:

- 1. Green Hills acknowledges and agrees the Department had reasonable cause to issue the Notice of Intent to Revoke and the Denial under AMMA and the Rules. Without admitting the violations alleged in the Notice of Intent to Revoke or the Denial, Green Hills agrees it will not contest those alleged violations and hereby waives its right to a hearing on the Notice of Intent to Revoke or the Denial. The Department and Green Hills agree that the dispute arising out of the Notice of Intent to Revoke and the Denial may be resolved in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- 2. Upon approval of this Agreement by the Department and Green Hills, the parties shall sign and counsel for the Department shall file with OAH a stipulation to vacate the Hearing and remand Case No's. 2016C-MMR-0040-DHS and 2016C-MMR-0066-DHS to the Department for issuance of a final order of dismissal, which shall affirm settlement of the matter in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- 3. Green Hills shall reopen and operate the Dispensary for business as a nonprofit medical marijuana dispensary no later than October 30, 2014. The Dispensary thereafter shall be and remain open, operating, and available to dispense medical marijuana to qualifying patients and designated caregivers at least 30 hours per week between 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. Nothing

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in this Agreement shall prevent or be construed as preventing Green Hills from reopening and operating the Dispensary prior to October 30, 2015.

- 4. Once the Dispensary is reopened and operating in accordance with the foregoing paragraph, Green Hills shall give immediate written notice thereof to the Department and shall include the Dispensary's projected business days and hours of operation. Once the Dispensary is reopened and operating, Green Hills shall at all times comply with this Agreement, AMMA and the Rules. The Department will enforce all applicable terms, requirements, and conditions of this Agreement, AMMA, and the Rules.
- 5. Green Hills shall give immediate written notice to the Department in the event the Dispensary closes, for any reason and for any period of time, the result of which will prevent the Dispensary from being open, operating, and available to dispense medical marijuana to qualifying patients and designated caregivers at least thirty hours during any week.
- In the event the Dispensary fails to be open, operating, and available to dispense б. medical marijuana at least thirty hours during any week, for any reason other than a force majeure event or an Act of God, Green Hills hereby agrees upon request by the Department to immediately and voluntarily surrender the Certificate to the Department and forever relinguish any and all rights, entitlements, or privileges arising thereunder. In such event, Green Hills shall immediately close the Dispensary on a permanent basis and hand-deliver to the Clerk of the Department at 1740 W. Adams, Room 203, Phoenix, Arizona 85282 the following original documents: (A) the Certificate and all renewals thereof; (B) the Certificate of Approval to Operate issued to Green Hills on August 7, 2013 and all renewals thereof; and (C) a fully executed Certificate of Surrender in the form attached hereto. Delivery of these documents to the Department shall constitute a final and permanent surrender of the Certificate, from which there shall be no rights of appeal, renewal, reconsideration, or other recourse. Green Hills knowingly and voluntarily waives any claims or rights it may have to compensation for surrender of the Certificate or relinquishment of any rights, entitlements, or privileges arising thereunder. The parties shall execute whatever additional documents are necessary to carry out the terms of this paragraph in the event it becomes applicable. The provisions of this paragraph shall not



apply to any other alleged violation of AMMA or the Rules in any other enforcement action the Department may take against Green Hills.

- 7. For a period of one year after the effective date of this Agreement, Green Hills shall not: (A) cause the Dispensary to move to or operate from a location outside of CHAA 21; (B) use the Certificate to open or operate a nonprofit medical marijuana dispensary outside of CHAA 21; (C) convey, assign, or transfer the Certificate for use outside of CHAA 21; or (D) encourage or enable any entity or individual to use the Certificate outside of CHAA 21. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Green Hills shall be entitled to designate a cultivation site outside of CHAA 21.
- 8. Green Hills acknowledges and agrees that, notwithstanding A.R.S. § 36-2806(H), the Department may, until all terms of this Agreement are satisfied and for a period of one year after the effective date of this Agreement, conduct any number of unannounced inspections of the Dispensary, without prior notice or requiring the filing of a complaint or any other cause, for any reason, including but not limited to verifying compliance with the terms, requirements, and conditions of this Agreement, AMMA, and the Rules. Such inspections shall be in addition to any compliance inspections conducted in accordance with AMMA and the Rules.
- 9. Green Hills shall immediately upon request provide the Department or any of its representatives with access to all records and documents of Green Hills and the Dispensary, including but not limited to records and documents maintained on any computer, or other file storage system and those stored in safes, safety deposit boxes, or other security systems, which the Department may inspect and review under this Agreement, AMMA, or the Rules.
- 10. Green Hills shall keep the Certificate current and acknowledges that it is required to timely file for renewal thereof, and meet all renewal requirements under AMMA and the Rules, in addition to the requirements of this Agreement. If Green Hills does not so apply, the Certificate shall expire.
- . 11. Written notices that Green Hills is required to send to the Department under this Agreement may be given electronically through the Department's Medical Marijuana Program email address at: m2dispensaries@azdhs.gov.



- 12. Green Hills shall at all times remain in compliance with AMMA and the Rules. Green Hills' compliance with its obligations under this Agreement shall be considered a cure in full of any violations alleged in the Notice of Intent to Revoke or the Denial. So long as Green Hills complies with its obligations under this Agreement, the violations alleged in the Notice of Intent to Revoke and/or the Denial shall not be used as an independent basis for an enforcement action by the Department. However, the Notice of Intent to Revoke, the Denial, this Agreement, and all evidence gathered or received in connection with the foregoing or Case No's. 2016C-MMR-0040-DHS and 2016C-MMR-0066-DHS may be used in support of any enforcement action the Department may take against Green Hills for any other violation.
- 13. Nothing in this Agreement shall require or be construed as requiring the Department to take any action except for compliance in good faith with the terms of this Agreement or refrain from taking any action with respect to which it has the discretion to act or not act, as the case may be, under this Agreement, AMMA, or the Rules,
- 14. This Agreement has been reviewed by the parties and their legal counsel. The parties acknowledge and agree this Agreement was the product of a joint drafting effort by them and their attorneys. In the event of a dispute as to the meaning or interpretation of this Agreement, no ambiguity shall be construed for or against any party.
- 15. Green Hills acknowledges that a mutual and fair exchange of consideration has been made in connection with this Agreement.
- 16. This Agreement may be modified only in a writing signed by the parties. No waiver of any requirement herein is effective unless made intentionally in writing. A waiver of any requirement herein shall not be deemed a waiver of any other provision.
- 17. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed and enforced under the laws of the State of Arizona.
- 18. This Agreement is subject to approval of the Assistant Director of the Department, Public Health Licensing Services ("Assistant Director") and is effective only upon the Assistant Director's approval. In the event the Assistant Director does not approve this Agreement, it shall be deemed withdrawn, have no evidentiary value, and may not be relied upon or introduced as evidence in any action or other proceeding by any party to this Agreement.

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- 19. Green Hills and its authorized signatory Haslock represent and warrant that:
 (A) Haslock is Green Hills' sole Principal Officer and Board Member; (B) Haslock is fully authorized to make and execute this Agreement on behalf of Green Hills; and (C) no further approvals are required from any persons or entities to bind Green Hills to this Agreement.
- 20. If for any reason any portion of this Agreement is adjudicated invalid or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the court in its discretion may determine the extent of the invalidity or unenforceability of the provision as it relates to this Agreement. The remaining unaffected provisions of this Agreement will be valid, fully enforceable, and in effect. If the invalid or unenforceable provision materially alters the purpose and intent of this Agreement, any court of competent jurisdiction shall have the power to reform this Agreement to manifest the intent and purpose of the parties to this Agreement.
- 21. This Agreement may be executed and delivered electronically in counterparts that shall together constitute one original Agreement.

WHEREFORE, the Department and Green Hills enter into this Agreement effective as of October 2, 2015.

Designated Agent ID Cards (R9-17-310(6a,6b,8a,8b,8c,8d))

- All Designated Agents are required to possess their Designated Agent ID Card while working or providing services at the dispensary or transporting Medical Marijuana for the dispensary.
- Any individual that does not possess a dispensary agent registry identification card issued under the dispensary registration certificate may NOT do the following:
 - 1. Serve as a principal officer, or board member of the dispensary
 - 2. Serve as a Medical Directory of the dispensary
 - 3. Work for the dispensary in any capacity
 - 4. Provide volunteer services on behalf of the dispensary
 - 5. Represent the dispensary

Separation (R9-17-310(9a,9b,9c,9d))

Written notice will be provided to AZDHS, including the date of the separation, within 10 business days after the date when a Dispensary Agent no longer:

- 1. Serve as a principal officer, or board member of the dispensary
- 2. Serve as a Medical Directory of the dispensary
- 3. Work for the dispensary in any capacity
- 4. Provide volunteer services on behalf of the dispensary
- 5. Represent the dispensary

Record Retention (R9-17-310(11))

Maintain copies of any documentation required in Chapter 17 for a minimum of 12 months (unless otherwise indicated) after the date on the documentation and provide copies of the documentation AZDHS for review upon request.

Business Records Keeping (R9-17-310(2b))

- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will use QuickBooks, Microsoft Excel, and MJ
 Freeway, our POS System to track all records of assets and liabilities, monetary
 transactions, journals, ledgers, and supporting documents, including agreements,
 checks, invoices, and vouchers.
- Any and all manual documents that are not an electronic file or scanned into our computer system will be stored in a locked file cabinet. Only authorized dispensary agents will have access to these files.
- Records will be made available to the Department for review upon request.
- The Deposit Safe and the Large Safe are located in the Safe Room. This is a security wall room with a security door. The Large safe will much inventory as possible and the Deposit safe will hold all Bank Deposits.

Dispensary Asset Purchasing/Lending/Selling Policies (R9-17-310(13,14,15,16,17))

- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will not lend any part of the dispensary's income or property without receiving adequate security and rate of interest.
- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will not purchase property for more than adequate consideration in money or cash equivalent.
- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will not pay compensation for salaries or other compensation for personal services that is in excess of a reasonable allowance.
- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will not sell any part of the dispensary's property or equipment for less than adequate consideration in money or cash equivalent.
- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will not engage in any other transaction that results in a substantial diversion of the dispensary's income or property.
- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will cultivate marijuana in an enclosed/locked facility, once a cultivation site is decided upon.

Opening Dispensary Agents Duties (R9-17-320(A2))

Dispensary Agents will be required to perform the following duties prior to welcoming Qualified Patients and Qualified Caregivers into the dispensary:

- 1. Disarm security system
- 2. Turn on all lights
- 3. Turn on AC/Heater (as needed)
- 4. Each Dispensary Agent to Log into MJFreeway POS and AZDHS at reception computer and sale computer respectively
- 5. Count Register and verify that there is a total of \$300 in the opening drawer
- 6. Turn on TV and start video
- 7. Wipe down display cases and counter tops
- 8. Sweep/Vacuum/Dust
- 9. Empty the trash at all locations a minimum of every 24 hours or sooner as needed.
- 10. Clean bathroom, stock with paper product and soap
- 11. Open safe in the Safe Room and remove display items and Medbox keys.
- 12. Relock the safe
- 13. Arrange display and unlock Medbox
- 14. Re-stock all Patient Education, Information and Forms
- 15. Turn on open sign

Closing the Dispensary; Dispensary Agents Duties

Dispensary Agents will be required to perform the following duties prior to closing the dispensary:

- 1. Turn off the Open sign
- 2. Turn off Reception lights
- 3. Lock front door
- 4. Go to Reports in MJFreeway POS System tab and select closing
- 5. Print closing report for reference. (if needed)
- 6. Go to any transaction to reprint a receipt (typing "RP" in the criteria line.)
- 7. Check "ending cash balance" on report
- 8. Count money in the drawer. (It should match "ending cash balance" on report.
- 9. Count out \$300 dollars to leave in drawer for the next day. (80 in \$20, 100 in \$10, 60 in \$5, 40 in \$1, 20 in change.)
- 10. Count remaining money (That should match net payments)
- 11. Go to admin and click registers
- 12. Click Adjust cash balance on default register
- 13. Click action- transfer to another register
- 14. Click target- Vault
- 15. Enter adjusted amount (should equal net payments on closing report)
- 16. Click Adjustment reason- cash drop

- 17. Adjustment notes- Close register and add date
- 18. Select adjust now
- 19. Select Close Register
- 20. Current Cash Balance should show \$300 and type in actual Register closing cash balance (should be \$300)
- 21. Add any closing notes and the date and save
- 22. Reprint Closing report to show updates.
- 23. Wrap deposit in updated closing report
- 24. Fill out a deposit slip
- 25. Put deposit in cash bag and put in small safe in Safe Room
- 26. Lock the small safe
- 27. Lock the Medbox
- 28. Lock the display items and Medbox keys in the large safe
- 29. Lock the large safe in the Safe Room
- 30. Log off the computers
- 31. Turn off all lights
- 32. Arm security system
- 33. Lock down Building

Medical Director Policies & Procedures

Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will strive to be an educational resource for our patients so they can get the most out of their medicine. The Medical Director will comply with all of R-917-313.

Appoint (R9-17-310(5))

Green Hills Patient Center shall appoint a licensed physician to serve as our Medical Director via Employment Contract.

Availability (R9-17-313(B1,B2))

During the dispensary's hours of operation, our Medical Director will be available by phone or on site.

<u>Training Standards</u> (R9-17-313(C1a,1b,1c,1d))

At least once every 12 months from the initial date of the dispensary's registration certificate, the Medical Director will develop and provide training on the following subjects:

- a. Guidelines for providing information to qualifying patients related to risks, benefits, and side effects associated with Medical Marijuana.
- b. Guidelines for providing support to qualified patients related to the qualifying patients self-assessment of the qualifying patients symptoms, including a rating scale for pain, cachexia or wasting syndrome, nausea, seizures, muscle spasms, and agitation.
- c. Recognizing signs and symptoms of substance abuse
- d. Guidelines for refusing to provide medical marijuana to an individual who appears to be impaired or abusing Medical Marijuana

<u>Patient Education, the Development of, Implementation and Review of Dissemination</u> (R9-17-313(1a,1b,1c,1d,1e,1f,1g,1h,1i)), (R9-17-313(C2)), (R9-17-313(D,1a,1b,1c,1d,1e,1f,1g,1h,1i),(R9-17-313(2a,2b,2c,2d)

- As our Medical Director, they will assist us in the development and implementation
 of review and improvement process for patient education in addition to providing
 support to the dispensary. The Medical Director shall provide oversight for the development and dissemination of educational materials for qualifying patients and
 designated caregivers regarding:
 - a. Alternative medical options for the qualifying patients debilitating medical condition

- Side effects of and contraindications for Medical Marijuana impairment including use/operation of a motor vehicle/heavy machinery, caring for children, job performance
- c. Guidelines for notifying the physician who provided the written certification for Medical Marijuana if side effects or contraindications occur
- d. Potential for differing strengths of Medical Marijuana strains/products potential
- e. Drug-to-drug interactions including interactions with alcohol, prescription drugs, non-prescription drugs, and supplements
- f. Techniques for the use of Medical Marijuana paraphernalia
- g. Information about different methods, forms and routes of Medical Marijuana administration
- h. Signs and symptoms of substance abuse programs and referral information
- A system for qualifying patient or the qualifying patients Qualified Caregiver to document the qualifying patients pain, cachexia or wasting syndrome, nausea, seizures, muscle spasms, or agitation that includes:
 - A log book that is maintained by the Qualifying Patient or the Designated Qualified Caregiver and in which they can track the use and effects of specific Medical Marijuana strains or products
 - b. A rating scale for pain, cachexia or wasting syndrome, nausea, seizures, muscle spasms and agitation
 - c. Guidelines for the Qualifying Patients or Designated Qualified Caregiver self-assessment
 - d. Guidelines for reporting usage and symptoms to the physician providing the written certification for Medical Marijuana and any other treating physicians.

Refusal of Medical Marijuana (R9-17-313(3))

The Medical Director will assist in policies and procedures for refusing to provide Medical Marijuana to an individual who appears to be impaired or abusing Medical Marijuana

Written Certifications (R9-17-313(E))

Medical Director WILL NOT provide written certifications for any qualifying patients.

Patient Education and Support Policies & Procedures

Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will strive to be an educational resource for our patients so they can get the most out of their medicine. Whether it is a one on one consultation with one of our trained Dispensing Agents about strain selection or learning more about the marijuana plant itself, we are here to help. Our patients will receive educational material about Medical Marijuana, educational material about the laws in Arizona in regards to Medical Marijuana, and even tracking sheets for patients to track their own effects from each strain. Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will have a medical director on call or on site during hours of operation to tend to our patients medical needs whenever necessary.

- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will offer a wide variety of educational material to inform our patients, the general public and anyone else that may inquire about Medical Marijuana and related products.
- The Patient Education Manual will offer the following educational materials:
 - 1. Print out detailed information on different marijuana strains including species of the plant such as Indica, Sativa, and Hybrids. The six major Cannabinoids THC, CBD, CBN, CBG, CBC, THCv, potency and its effects
 - 2. Patient Material will includes:
 - a. Method of Consuming Medical Marijuana:
 - Smoking including pros and cons
 - Vaporizing including pros and cons
 - Edibles including pros and cons
 - 3. AZDHS Warnings Statement: "ARIZONA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES' WARNING: Marijuana use can be addictive and can impair an individual's ability to drive a motor vehicle or operate heavy machinery. Marijuana smoke contains carcinogens and can lead to an increased risk for cancer, tachycardia, hypertension, heart attack, and lung infection. KEEP OUT OF REACH OF CHILDREN AND UNAUTHORIZED INDIVIDU-ALS.
 - 4. A statement that using Medical Marijuana in public places is prohibited.
 - 5. Risks and side Effects/Contraindications of Medical Marijuana including use/ operation of a vehicle/heavy machinery, caring for children and job performance
 - 6. Drug Interaction/Medical Issues
 - 7. Alternative Medical Options including Yoga, Acupuncture and Hypnotherapy
 - 8. Self-Assessment included with Patient Education maintained by the Qualified Patient/Designated Caregiver in which the Qualified Patient/Designated Caregiver tracks the use and effect of specific Medical Marijuana strains and product and its routes of administration.
 - 9. A rating scale for pain, cachexia or wasting syndrome, nausea, seizures, muscle spasms, and agitation
 - 10. Informative printout on varying Medical Marijuana subjects:
 - Signs and Symptoms of Substance Abuse- its warning signs, tolerance, dependency, withdrawal, loss of control

- A listing of substance abuse programs and referral information in alphabetical order
- Helping a family member or friend struggling substance abuse
- 11. We will also have hand out explaining the Medical Marijuana laws in Arizona and how to safely comply with those laws.
- 12. Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. Dispensary Agents will be trained and knowledgeable in all areas of Medical Marijuana in Arizona, so any patient in our dispensary will be able to ask for assistance or information.

Patient Records Policies & Procedures

All employees are required to follow HIPAA guidelines when handling confidential patient information. Failure by anyone to follow these guidelines may result in disciplinary action up to and including discharge.

Establishment and Maintenance of a Qualifying Patient (R9-17-315(A1))

Only an authorized dispensary agent will record all qualified patient records. The dispensary agent in charge of patient records will be educated on the policies and procedures regarding patient confidentiality. There will be a ZERO TOLERANCE policy for any misuse of patient records or information.

Entering a Qualified Patients Record (R9-17-315(A2a,A2b,A2c,A2d))(R9-17-315(3))(R9-17-315(B1,B2))

All qualified patient records will be entered thru our MJ Freeway POS with the date, signature of the authorized Dispensary Agent handling the patient records, the Dispensary Agent's registry ID number, the patient's name, patient's date of birth, if applicable the patient's caregiver and once all records are entered they will be final so no changes can be made to the patient record.

- Each Designated Agent has their own confidential user name and password to prevent unauthorized access and the MJ Freeway POS system uses an internal time and date stamp.
- The dispensary agent is accountable the use of their electronic signature.
- Confidential patient information including the Patient Intake form will be filed in locked filing cabinets and only authorized Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. dispensary agents will be allowed access. Patient records will not be removed from the premises for any reason whatsoever.

Availability of Patient Records (R-9-17-315(4,5,67))

- Patients records may ONLY be accessed by a Dispensary Agent when necessary for the course of business
- No patient records will be released to anyone without the proper legal documentation stating they are allowed access to our patient's records.
- Patient records will be made available to the Department for review upon request.
- Patient records will be accessed and maintained only by a dispensary agent authorized by dispensary policies and procedures to access the qualifying patient record.
- Maintenance of Patient Records: All patient records will be kept on site in locked filing cabinets for (5) years from the qualified patient's or, if applicable, the quali-

fied patient's caregiver's last request for Medical Marijuana or related products from Green Hills Patient Center, Inc.

Dispensing Medical Marijuana Policies and Procedures

<u>Dispensing/Sales</u> (R9-17-314(1,2,3,4, 5,6a,6b,6c,6d,6e)) (R9-17-315(C1a,1b,1c,2)) (R9-17-318(G1Civ))

Qualified Patient will enter Green Hills Patient Center thru the storefront door under video surveillance. A video camera will be pointed at each point of sale location allowing for the identification of any Qualified Patient or Designated Caregiver making purchase. Qualified PatientPatient enters waiting area and checks-in with Designated Agent. Designated will:

- Obtain Qualified Patients Medical Marijuana Registry Card or Designated Caregivers Registry Card. If it is a new Qualified Patient or Designated Caregiver they will be given a Patient Intake Form and required to provide a 2nd form of ID. Verify Qualified Patient or Designated Caregiver's identity
- 2. Dispensary Agent will scan Qualified Patient or Designated Caregivers registry ID card into the AZDHS System and verify the card is "ACTIVE" and verify they are within their legal limits to purchase Medical Marijuana at our dispensary by verifying that the Qualified Patient or their Qualified Caregiver has not exceed the 2 and one-half ounces of Medical Marijuana during any 14 calendarday period. (Use AZ Medical Marijuana Card Verification POS System User Instructions and Arizona Medical Marijuana Registry Identification Card Status Information for reference)
- 3. Once the patient is verified, a Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. Dispensary Agent will escort the patient into the display/ dispensing area. Only the number of patients that can be assisted by dispensary staff at any one time will be allowed in the dispensing area. The patients will be allowed into the dispensing area in the order they arrived in the waiting room, unless a patient is required to fill out paperwork on site.
- 4. Once in the display areas there will be a display counter containing Medical Marijuana samples and Dispensary Agent will offer appropriate patient educational materials as well as assisting patient. The patient will select their medication and proceed to the dispensing checkout counter area.
- 5. Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. Dispensary Agent will scan their registry ID card, into the AZDHS website to verify the card is "ACTIVE" and they are within their legal limits of purchasing 2 and one-half ounces of Medical Marijuana during any 14 calendar-day period prior to completing the transaction.
- 6. All of the following information will be recorded into the AZDHS Medical Marijuana electronic verification system at time of purchase:
 - b. the amount of Medical Marijuana dispensed
 - c. Whether the Medical Marijuana was dispensed to the qualifying patient or to the qualifying patient's designated caregiver
 - d. The date and time the Medical Marijuana was dispensed
 - e. the dispensary agent's registry ID name

- f. Dispensary's registry ID number.
- 7. Designated Agent will then ring up product sale in MJFreeway POS System and note whether the Qualified Patient was offered Patient Education materials as a sale line item.

<u>Denial of Sale due to Impairment</u> (R9-17-310(2d)),(R9-17-313(3)) (R9-17-315(C3a,3b,3e))

GHPC employees are trained in recognizing signs and symptoms of substance abuse/impairment. For the purpose of denying Medical Marijuana; Impaired is defined as: A patient with observed Diminished Physical or Mental Function, which any reasonable person would be concerned for the patient's and public safety.

- 1. Once Designated Agent determined that Qualified Patient/Designated Caregiver impairment puts themselves and other at risk, the Designated Agent must report to the onsite manager for verification.
- 2. Manager complete the D-5 Refusal of Medical Marijuana Form
- 3. Make copies and give one to patient, instruct the Qualified Patient to contact their Certifying Physician as soon as possible
- 4. Send one copy to certified physician if possible
- 5. Manager file form in the Refusal of Medical Marijuana Folder

<u>Denial of Sale due to Expired/Invalid/Void Card</u> (R9-17-310(2d)),(R9-17-315(C3a,3b,3c)

If patient presented an expired/invalid/void card at check in, have Dispensary Agent:

- 1. Complete the D-5 Refusal of Medical Marijuana Form
- 2. Make copies and give one to patient, instruct the Qualified Patient to contact their Certifying Physician as soon as possible
- 3. Send one copy to certified physician if possible
- 4. Manager file form in the Refusal of Medical Marijuana Folder

Delivery Option

The city of Show Low zoning laws do allow for delivery of Medical Marijuana, and in the future Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. may provide deliveries to patient or caregivers in cities/towns that do allow for off-site deliveries.

Inventory Control System Policies and Procedures

Overview (R9-17-316(A)) (R9-17-316(B2,B3,B4))((R9-17-319(A4))

Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. intends to utilize inventory-tracking software MJ Freeway to ensure compliance with the following policies and procedures:

- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. shall designate one (2) dispensary agents who will have oversight of the dispensary's inventory control system and shall provide written documentation of the designation.
- The dispensary shall only acquire marijuana from another dispensary or their cultivation site, a qualifying patient or designated caregiver.
- Green Hills Patient Center ensures that the Medical Marijuana infused products are sold or dispensed according to applicable requirements in 9A.A.C. 8, Article 1.
- If picking up, follow Policies and Procedures for Trip Plan for Transporting Medical Marijuana.
- Acquiring Medical Marijuana from other Dispensary is handled by Dispensary Manager or Operations Manager Only
- Before placing order, have a copy of the providing Dispensary's License, Designated Agent providing Medical Marijuana card on file.
 - a. Provide the other Dispensary a copy of GHPC License, Tax Resale License
 - b. Provide copy of Dispensary Agent cards that will be accepting or picking up order

Receiving Medical Marijuana from another Dispensary (R9-17-310(2civ)) (R9-17-316(C3a,C3b,D3c,C3d,C3e))

- 1. Verifies the orders with the other dispensary agent
 - a. Fills out D-2 Record of Acquisition Form
 - b. Make sure product labeling and analysis are provided with orders

Receiving Edible Food Products infused with Medical Marijuana from another Dispensary (R9-17-316(6a,6b,6ci,6ci,6di))(R9-17-319(B))(R9-17-320(A4))

- 1. Verifies the orders with the other dispensary agent
 - a. Fills out D-2 Record of Acquisition Form
 - b. Make sure product labeling and analysis are provided with orders
 - c. Ensures that all Edible food products are securely packaged
 - d. VERIFY that weight of EACH Medical Marijuana infused product on the invoice ACCURATELY matches EACH infused product label on the infused product.
 - e. Inspect the quality of the overall product

Receiving Donation of Medical Marijuana from Qualified Patient/Designated Caregiver that Authorized to Cultivate(R9-17-310(2ciii)) (R9-17-316(C2a,C2b,C2c,C2d))

- 1. Make copy of the Qualified Patient/Designated Caregiver and verifies the card status with AZDHS database. If card is active, we can accept donation
- 2. Fill out the D-1 Record of Donation Form
- 3. No money or anything of values in exchange for Medical Marijuana

<u>Processing and Tracking Received Medical Marijuana from another Dispensary/Qualified Patient/Designated Caregiver</u> (R9-17-310(2ci))

- 1. All Dispensary Managers and Inventory Managers will wash hands and any exposed portion of the Dispensary Agent's arms before packaging Medical Marijuana including, working with the equipment to package
- 2. Take products to Safe Room
- 3. Fill out Intake Sheet
- 4. Use air tight containers to stored Medical Marijuana after cutting the bags and pour in container or reseal original bags with heat seal.
- 5. Weight the empty container first. Then weigh with Medical Marijuana, subtract the container's empty weight. Use this number to complete the Purchase Order in the MJ Freeway POS system.
 - Creating a Purchase Order in MJFreeway
 - 1. Go to the inventory tab and click Purchase Orders from the pull down menu
 - 2. Click "create purchase order"
 - 3. Enter title (Vendor and date)
 - 4. Add supplier from drop down
 - 5. Enter Supplier license number
 - 6. Enter transaction ID if applicable
 - 7. Enter delivered by if applicable
 - 8. Enter date ordered and date expected
 - 9. Select status from pull down
 - 10. Select product from product pull down list
 - 11. Enter quantity
 - 12. Input cost
 - 13. A second box will pop up under the selected product, when box appears add the producer from the drop down list. Producer license number should automatically fill in, if it doesn't add the producer license number.
 - 14. Enter Batch Number (if batch number does not exist, click add batch number and save)
 - 15. Enter harvest date, package date and expiration dates if applicable
 - 16. Enter Gross weight of package
 - 17. Enter MMJ net weight
 - 18. Enter Gross weight received and the Received MMJ will automatically fill in.

- 19. If not package ID is made for product leave blank and package number will automatically be generated
- 20. To enter the next item click ADD ITEM button
- 21. Repeat steps 3-20
- 22. Click save
- 6. Enter all product information to MJ Freeway including its product Labeling and Analysis, Weight and Designated Agent name, Reg ID #.
- 7. Print and place bulk label on the container and store in the Safe Room.

<u>Processing and Tracking Received Edible Food Products infused with Medical Marijuana from another Dispensary (R9-17-310(2ci))</u>

- 1. Take Edibles to the Display Area
- 2. Enter Edibles into the MJ Freeway POS System
- 3. VERIFY that weight of EACH Medical Marijuana infused product label ACCU-RATELY matches the description within the MJ Freeway POS System
- 4. Print and affix label to the product
- 5. Place the products in the display case
- 6. CAUTION: Infused weight may not be exactly the same even if we order the same item.

Packaging Medical Marijuana (R9-17-310(2ci)) (R9-17-320(B1a)) (R9-17-320(B2c))

- 1. All Dispensary Managers and Inventory Managers will wash hands and any exposed portion of the Dispensary Agent's arms before packaging Medical Marijuana including, working with the equipment to package
- 2. Use the digital scale on the preparation table located in the Safe Room
- 3. Wear appropriate gear such as disposable rubber gloves to prevent contamination
- 4. Use sealable pouch with the preprinted AZDHS warning statement
- 5. Uses appropriate bag size for Medical Marijuana:
 - a. Bags labeled AZ 1 gram is to be used for packaging 1 gram
 - b. Bags labeled AZ 1/8 oz. is to be used for packaging 3.5 grams
 - c. Bags labeling AZ ¼ oz. is to be used for packaging 7 grams
- 6. Put 1 gram in Sample Container and put sample in the display case
- 7. Seals bags with the heat clamp
- 8. Weigh the bulk and write it down on the label the date, weight, and initial
- 9. Enter conversion in MJ Freeway POS inventory and print package label
- 10. Place barcode label on the bag
- 11. All marijuana inventories including each day's beginning inventory, acquisitions, sales, disbursements, disposal of unusable marijuana, and ending inventory will be taken on a daily basis.

Disposal of Unusable Marijuana (R9-17-310(Cv))

Only Dispensary Managers and Inventory Managers are authorized to dispose of Unusable Medical Marijuana. Unusable marijuana inventory will be documented Unusable Marijuana Form. Dispensary Managers and Inventory Managers will use the following process to keep track of the unusable marijuana that has not yet been disposed of:

- 1. Handle with gloves/ Use Universal Precaution
- 2. Weight of the unusable Marijuana or Product
- 3. Record the discard samples weight
- 4. Record any discrepancy weight in gram
- 5. Empty waste in a heavy duty sealable bag

Once heavy duty bag is full, Dispensary Manager or Inventory Manager will contact the Show Low Police Department for disposal thru the police department. Dispensary Manager or Inventory Manager will:

- 1. Record reason for weight lost.
- 2. If within reasoning, skip step 3, go to step 4
- 3. If the discrepancy is due to suspected criminal activity by a Dispensary Agent, contact GHPC Dispensary Manager, the Department and local law Enforcement Authorities.
- 4. Record date of disposal of unusable Marijuana on D-4 Form, Record of Disposal which will include the following information:
 - Weight of Disposal
 - Date of Disposal
 - Description and Reason for Disposal
 - Method of Disposal
 - Record of the name and badge number of law enforcement office taking possession of the Unusable Medical Marijuana for disposal
 - Record of the name and registry ID number of the dispensary agent responsible for the disposal.
- 5. Record of Disposal will be kept in the Record of Disposal Folder.

<u>Daily Inventory Procedures</u> (R9-17-310(Ci)) (R9-17-316(E1,E2))

Each morning the Dispensary Manager or Inventory Manager will pull inventory product reports thru the MJFreeway POS System from the previous day's sales and enter amounts sold into:

- 1. Daily Inventory Log (in Grams)
- 2. Concentrate Log
- 3. Edible Daily Inventory Log
- All daily and monthly inventory logs will be kept at the dispensary location for (5)
 years from the date of the document and will be available to the Department for review upon request.

Weekly Inventory Procedures (R9-17-310(Ci) (R9-17-316(D1))

Once every 7 days, the Dispensary Manager or Inventory Manager will pull product reports from inventory products thru the MJFreeway POS System. Dispensary Manager or Inventory Manager will:

- Conduct a complete product inventory verifying amounts and weights of all products.
- 2. Inventory counts are to match those recorded into the dispensary's inventory control software. If for any reason the inventory counts do not match those entered into the MJFreeway POS System, Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will immediately determine the cause of the discrepancy thru reconciliation and /or review of the camera recordings, document the reason/cause the loss occurred and document the corrective action taken. Inventory Manager will then fill out a D-6 Record of Unreconciled Loss Form. If the discrepancy is due to suspected criminal activity by a dispensary agent, Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will immediately contact the Department and local law enforcement authorities.

Monthly Inventory Procedures (R9-17-310(Ci) (R9-17-316(D1)) (R9-17-316(E1,E2))

At least once every 30 calendar days the Dispensary Manager or Inventory Manager designated as being responsible for oversight of the dispensary's inventory control process shall complete an inventory audit according to generally accepted accounting principles. All daily and monthly inventory logs will be kept at the dispensary location for (5) years from the date of the document and will be available to the Department for review upon request.

- 1. All usable and unusable marijuana weights will be recorded.
- 2. Inventory counts are to match those recorded into the dispensary's inventory control software. If for any reason the inventory counts do not match those entered into the MJFreeway POS System, Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will immediately determine the cause of the discrepancy thru reconciliation and /or review of the camera recordings, document the reason/cause the loss occurred and document the corrective action taken. Inventory Manager will then fill out a D-6 Record of Unreconciled Loss Form. If the discrepancy is due to suspected criminal activity by a dispensary agent, Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will immediately contact the Department and local law enforcement authorities.

<u>Inventory Discrepancies</u> (R9-17-310(10))((R9-17-310(Ci)) (R9-17-316(D1))

Inventory counts are to match those recorded into the dispensary's inventory control software. If for any reason the inventory counts do not match those entered into the MJFreeway POS System, Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will immediately determine the cause of the discrepancy thru reconciliation and /or review of the camera recordings, document the reason/cause the loss occurred and document the corrective action taken. Inventory Manager will then fill out a D-6 Record of Unrecon-

- ciled Loss Form. If the discrepancy is due to suspected criminal activity by a dispensary agent, Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will immediately contact the Department and local law enforcement authorities.
- 2. Inventory counts are taken very seriously and any discrepancy in numbers is of the utmost importance to us. All documentation of inventory count discrepancy will be available to the Department.

Product Labeling & Analysis Policies and Procedures

<u>Information on Each Label ((R-9-17-317(A1,A2,A3,A4,A5,A6,A7))</u>

Every Medical Marijuana product sold by Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will have a product label visibly attached to it. Each label will clearly state the following:

- 1. The registry ID number of Green Hills Patient Center, Inc.,
- 2. The amount
- 3. Strain
- 4. Batch number of Medical Marijuana,
- 5. If not cultivated by Green Hills Patient Center, Inc., whether it was obtained from a caregiver, patient or other dispensary
- 6. The date of manufacture, Harvest or sale.
- 7. A list of any chemical additives, including nonorganic pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers, used in the cultivation and production of the Medical Marijuana
- 8. The Patient or Caregiver's Name
- 9. The registry ID number of the qualifying patient.
- 10. Every label/package will also clearly show the following statement: "ARIZONA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES' WARNING: Marijuana use can be addictive and can impair an individual's ability to drive a motor vehicle or operate heavy machinery. Marijuana smoke contains carcinogens and can lead to an increased risk for cancer, tachycardia, hypertension, heart attack, and lung infection. KEEP OUT OF REACH OF CHILDREN" if not preprinted on bag

Edible Product Labels (R9-17-317(C))

Edible food products will be labeled with all the above information as well as the total weight of the edible food product.

Product Analysis (R9-17-317(D))

Upon request from the Department, Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will provide a sample of the dispensary's Medical Marijuana inventory or sufficient quantity to enable the Department to conduct an analysis of the Medical Marijuana.

Patient Delivery and Transportation Policies& Procedures

Patient Delivery

The city of Show Low zoning laws do allow for delivery of Medical Marijuana, and in the future Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. may provide deliveries to patient or caregivers in cities/towns that do allow for off-site deliveries; however we do not currently offer this service.

<u>Transporting Medical Marijuana or Medical Marijuana Infused Products to or from Your Dispensary (R9-17-318(C1a,1b,1c,1d)) (R9-17-318(C2)) (R9-17-318(D1,2,3,4))</u>

(R9-17-318(E)) (R9-17-318(F1,2))

Prior to transporting Medical Marijuana or Medical Marijuana infused products, the Designated Agent will complete the following:

- 1. Have a D-2 Form Filled out
- 2. Complete a Trip Manifest Form which identifies:
 - a. The name and Agent ID number of the Dispensary Agent in charge of the transportation
 - b. The date and time of the start of the trip
 - c. The anticipated route
 - d. A description of the marijuana or paraphernalia being transported
 - e. Batch numbers
 - f. Weight as applicable.
- 3. The dispensary agent shall provide a copy of the trip plan to the dispensary and shall carry a copy of the plan at all times during the trip.
- 4. The Designated Agent will ONLY transport Medical Marijuana between the dispensary and another dispensary.
- 5. At the conclusion of the transportation, the dispensary agent shall record the end time of the trip and shall document any changes to the trip plan.
- 6. At all times during transport Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will require dispensary agents to maintain two way communication capabilities with the dispensary, shall use a vehicle that has no marks or identification of medical marijuana and shall ensure that nothing being transported is visible to the outside of the vehicle.
- 7. Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. shall maintain a copy of all transportation records for a minimum of 5 years and shall provide such records to DHS for review upon request.

Security Policies and Procedures

The Purpose is to establish guidelines to provide a working environment that is safe, and to reduce any perceived or actual risk of harm for Board members, staff, volunteers, patients, caregivers, contractors, service users and others visiting GHPC Dispensary. We will work with local law enforcement officials to maintain the correct protocol before, during and after a security issue. Our buildings will contain the following security equipment:

Third Party Security System (R9-17-318(G1a))

We contracted a third party security system monitoring company to provide and install all of our security equipment. The security company will be monitoring 24 hours per day, 7 days a week to detect unauthorized intrusion.

Exterior Lighting (R9-17-318(G1b))

Exterior lighting around the front, side and back of building to facilitate surveillance

<u>Cameras (R9-17-318(G1Ciii1,G1Ciii2))</u>

Cameras will be installed at necessary locations to comply with state regulations. These include entrances and exits, all security door areas, at the check-in window, at all point of sale locations, in the designated room holding our safe, and inside every cultivation room in the our cultivation facility with the ability to clearly record images in low light conditions. All security cameras will be positioned in such a manner as to get the best facial image of anyone in the areas listed above. All security cameras will have a recording resolution of at least 704x480.

Monitor (R9-17-318(G1ci))

A 19" or greater call-up monitor will be located in the designated safe/security room with access only available to approved dispensary agents.

Video Printer (R9-17-318(G1Cii)

A video printer capable of immediately producing a still photo from any video camera image will be located alongside the monitor in the designated safe room.

Storage of Video Camera Recordings (R9-17-318(G1Cvi)

All video camera recordings not stored electronically will be kept locked up in our safe for at least 30 calendar days and will be available to the Department and local police enforcement upon request.

Power Backup (R9-17-318(G1Cviii))

All video cameras and recording equipment will be run on emergency power to ensure that they all still operate for at least 5 minutes during a power outage.

<u>Failure Notification System</u> (R9-17-318(G1Cvii))

A failure notification system will be installed to provide audible and visual notification of any failure in the electronic monitoring system.

Panic Buttons (R9-17-318(G1d))

Panic buttons will be installed (1) in the check-in office behind the security glass, (2) in the dispensing area, and (1) in the cultivation site in a central location. All employees will be aware of the location and proper use of the panic buttons.

- Panic Alarm Activation
 - a. Panic alarms come in one button to activate the alarm: Press the button

When to Use the Panic Alarm (R9-17-318(G2e))

Activate the alarm to notify Security by pressing the button(s) if you feel threatened or see another person in need of assistance.

Notes

- Panic alarms are programmed to work in designated areas only. Be sure to know the boundaries for your activation area.
- Security Services checks the alarms regularly to ensure they are powered and operating properly.
- Preventing and Responding to Workplace Violence Safety Tips and Guidelines

Emergency Preparedness

Your best defense it to be prepared for emergencies before they happen by:

- Imagining appropriate responses to various situations you may find yourself in
- Deciding ahead of time how you will respond to various situations
- Knowing the location of emergency exits and procedures.
- Knowing where to access panic alarms, telephones, and emergency intercoms.
- Installing panic buttons in your work area
- Comparing procedures with your coworkers or people with similar occupations
- Not loaning keys or access cards to anyone. Report lost or stolen cards or keys immediately to Security
- Tell your supervisor, Security or Human Resources if you are a victim of domestic violence or are aware of a person with a history of violent behavior and you feel there is a potential for the violence to extend into the workplace.

Trusting Your Instincts

Certain comments and/or conduct may not be welcomed. For example, this could include someone taking pictures of you without your consent. Consider:

- Keeping personal information at a minimum when talking with anyone who makes you feel uncomfortable
- Do not engage in conversations that make you feel uncomfortable. Excuse yourself and walk away
- Being firm and confident and do not permit any kind of harassment.
- Being alert for anger and hostility. De-escalate arguments whenever this is possible
- If you feel you are being harassed, threatened or intimidated: tell the person to stop, document the incident and inform your supervisor, Security or Human Resources.

Dealing with Strangers

- Adopt a non-threatening attitude toward visitors in your Dispensary/ Dispensary's Cultivation Site by asking "May I help you?" as this is really asking "What are you doing here?"
- Escort strangers to the location or person they identify as their destination if you are comfortable doing so
- Report strangers acting suspiciously to Security

Warning Signs of Potential Violence

No one can predict human behavior, and there is no specific profile of a potentially violent person. Nevertheless, a potentially violent person may exhibit any or all of the following characteristics:

<u>Physical Signs</u> Use caution if someone exhibits one or more of the following non-verbal signs or body language:

- Exaggerated or violent gestures
- Change in voice
- Loud talking or chanting
- Shallow, rapid breathing
- Scowling sneering or use of abusive language
- Glaring or avoiding eye contact
- Violating your personal space
- Red-faced or white-faced
- Sweating
- Pacing
- Restless or repetitive movements
- Trembling or shaking
- Clenched jaws or fists
- Facial grimacing

History of Violence

- Fascination with weapons, acts of violence, or both
- Demonstrates violence towards inanimate objects
- Evidence of prior violent behavior

Threatening Behavior

- States intention to hurt someone (verbal or written)
- Hold grudges
- Excessive behavior (phone calls, gift-giving)
- Escalating threats that appear well planned
- A preoccupation with violence

Intimidating Behavior

- Argumentative
- Displays unwarranted anger
- Easily frustrated
- Uncooperative
- Impulsive
- Challenges co-worker and management

Increase in Personal Stress

- An unreciprocated, romantic obsession
- Serious family or financial problems
- Recently job loss

Negative Personality Characteristics

Suspicious of others

- Believes he or she is entitled to something
- Cannot take criticism
- Feels victimized
- Shows a lack of concern for the safety and well-being of others
- Has low self esteem
- Blames others or his or her problems or mistakes

If a Robbery Occurs

Remain cool and calm. Handle the entire procedure as if you are making a sale to a customer. Most robberies last under two minutes. The longer a robbery takes, the more nervous the robber becomes, so keep it short and smooth.

- 1. Listen carefully to what the robbers say, and obey them. Don't be a hero.
- 2. Don't fight. Don't use weapons. Don't jeopardize your own safety or that of other workers.
- 3. Give the robbers all the cash and merchandise they want
- 4. Don't delay or argue.
- 5. Tell the robbers of any possible surprises.
- 6. Tell the robbers if you must reach for something or move in any way. Ask them for their directions.
- 7. Tell the robbers if another employee is in the back room so they will not be startled.
- 8. Activate the alarm system only after the robbers have left, not while they are still in the store.
- 9. Continue to remain cool and calm.
- 10. Be careful not to stare or fix your gaze too long on the robbers, but observe what they look like, what they are wearing, their size, and the type and color of weapons.
- 11. Listen carefully to what they say and note the robbers' exact heights against the height strip as they exit.
- 12. Immediately after the robbers have left, record their appearance, mannerisms, and any distinguishing characteristics on a description sheet.
- 13. Do not chase robbers.
- 14. Call the police. Dial 911

Tell the police:

- The direction robbers took when they left
- The time of the robbery
- The appearance of the robbers, and any weapon or vehicle used
- 15. Stay on the phone until the police tell you they have all the information they need.
- 16. Protect the crime scene.
- 17. Ask any witnesses to wait for the police. Get names and addresses.
- 18. Don't touch the evidence.

<u>Security During Hours of Operation</u> (R9-17-318(G2a))_(R9-17-318(G1d)) (R9-17-318(G2d))

- 1. The first Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. employee to arrive to open up the dispensary or will need to enter a predetermined code into the security device next to the front door to disable the alarm system.
- 2. Employee will check the security cameras and pull up a video recording from 30 days prior to ensure the equipment is functioning properly.
- 3. All surveillance cameras will be operational 24/7 and a 19" or greater central call-up monitor will be located in the designated safe room (off limits to employees), with a video printer capable of immediately producing a clear still photo from any video camera image.
- 4. A self-closing and locking security door will be operational in the check-in/waiting room entering the dispensing area.
- 5. Silent panic button devices will be strategically located in the dispensary and cultivation site to alert our 3rd party security vendor of any intrusions.
- 6. Security and safety procedures will be taught extensively and thoroughly to all of Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. Dispensary Agents.
- 7. All areas that are restricted access will be clearly marked as such and secured to allow access only by designated personnel with identification and any unauthorized personnel found in restricted areas will be reprimanded accordingly.
- 8. Access to cultivation facilities shall be limited to board members, principal officers, and Authorized Dispensary Agents and shall be granted only upon proper identification as such.

Loitering (R9-17-318(G2c))

In order to maintain a comfortable environment, safety and wellbeing of our customers and employees, GHPC prohibits individuals and/or groups of individuals loitering, i.e. to linger idly or aimlessly, or linger on the Dispensary/ Dispensary's Cultivation's premises with no intention to utilize our amenities.

- 1. Patrons shall not loiter in the Dispensary/ Dispensary's Cultivation's parking areas or grounds, including the front of the Main Dispensary. For the purposes of this policy, loitering means staying in such an area for more than 15 minutes while not engaged in dispensary activities, such as purchasing from the dispensary or waiting for a ride after using the dispensary or similar activity.
- 2. Persons violating this policy will be banned from GHPC
- 3. Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will not allow any loitering and will work with local law enforcement if necessary to implement best practices to prevent it.

Security During Off Hours

- 1. The last Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. employee to leave the dispensary or cultivation facility will be required to active all security devices and lock all doors and windows.
- 2. All windows will be protected with adequate security measures.
- 3. The exterior of the buildings will be well lit. Lights will be positioned to facilitate surveillance and to ensure maximum security at all entrances and exits during the night.

Location of Safes

The Deposit Safe and the Large Safe are located in the Safe Room. This is a security wall room with a security door. The Large safe will much inventory as possible and the Deposit safe will hold all Bank Deposits.

Cleaning & Sanitation Policies and Procedures

<u>Pesonal Cleanliness (R9-17-320(A1a, A1b,A1c,A1d,A1e)) (R9-17-320(A3,A4,A5)) (R9-17-320(B2a,2b2c))</u>

All Dispensary Agents working at Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will follow strict cleanliness guidelines, which if not followed can lead to disciplinary action. Each dispensary agent will abide by the following cleanliness rules:

- 1. All Dispensary Agents will wash hands and any exposed portion of the Dispensary Agent's arms before entering the dispensary
- 2. Protect all Medical Marijuana and Medical Marijuana infused products from flies, dust, dirt and all other contamination
- 3. All Dispensary Agents will wash hands and any exposed portion of the Dispensary Agent's arms after using the Bathroom
- 4. All Dispensary Agents will wash hands and any exposed portion of the Dispensary Agent's arms after taking their lunch break or scheduled break
- 5. All Dispensary Agents will wash hands and any exposed portion of the Dispensary Agent's arms after touching bare body parts other than the dispensary's clean hands and exposed portion of arms
- 6. All Dispensary Agents will wash hands and any exposed portion of the Dispensary Agent's arms before packaging Medical Marijuana including, working with the equipment to package
- All Dispensary Agents will wash hands during any preparation, as often as necessary to remove soil and contamination and to prevent cross-contamination when changing tasks.
- 8. All dispensary agents will be required to keep their nails trimmed, filed, and maintained so that the edges and surfaces are cleanable.
- All dispensary agents will be required to wear rubber gloves when handling Medical Marijuana directly or any equipment or material used
 10.
- 11. All dispensary agents will be required to come to work wearing a clean set of clothes that are appropriate for their assigned tasks.

Reporting Health Hazards (R9-17-320(B4,B5))

- 1. All health hazards or potential health hazards that may adversely affect the safety or quality of any Medical Marijuana will be reported by the Dispensary Agent or appropriate supervisor to the dispensary's Medical Director.
- 2. If the Medical Director determines that a Dispensary Agent's health condition may adversely affect the safety or quality of the Medical Marijuana, that dispensary agent will be prohibited from direct contact with any Medical Marijuana or equipment or materials for processing Medical Marijuana until the Medical Director de-

termines the Dispensary Agent's health condition will not adversely affect the Medical Marijuana.

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WELCOME

At Green Hills Patient Center Inc., we believe that every Designated Agent helps to make our dispensary successful. We look forward to the opportunity to work together to create a very successful business environment. We hope you feel that your time with us will be mutually beneficial and gratifying and will be proud to be a member of our team. Our ultimate goal is to provide excellence in patient care with a personal touch.

This handbook explains much of what we expect of you and many of our rules however; Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. has the right to revoke, change, or supplement these policies at any time without notice. The policies and procedures in this Designated Agent Handbook are not intended to be contractual agreements between the Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. and the Designated Agent. This handbook also outlines any of the programs and benefits available to eligible Designated Agents; please read it in its entirety and retain it for future reference. If you have any questions regarding the information provided in this manual, please contact the Dispensary Manager.

We hope that your experience here will be challenging, enjoyable, and rewarding. Again, welcome!

Designated Agent Policies and Procedures

Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. plans to employ 3-6 full and part time Designated Agents, with 2-3 Designated Agents working in the dispensary at one time. We will also employ interns and volunteers whenever possible to not only educate and involve the local people, but to also keep costs down. All Designated Agents will be hired on a 3 months probationary period. During this time each Designated Agent will be trained, tested and evaluated on everything from their work ethic to knowledge of the Medical Marijuana program in Arizona. Educational training will include reading materials, attending lectures/classes, being present for all Medical Director Regulation R9-17-313 (performed at a minimum of every 12 months) training and hands-on training. The board members of GHPC, Inc. will handle Dispensary Manager.

Designated Agent ID Cards ((R9-17-310(6,a))

All Designated Agents are required to possess their Designated Agent ID Card while working or providing services at the dispensary or transporting Medical Marijuana for the dispensary.

Confidentiality ((R9-17-310(a,iii))

Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will stay in compliance with HIPAA guidelines regarding confidentiality. All Designated Agents must complete confidentiality training and will be documented on Designated Agent files. All Designated Agents must adherence to confidentiality requirements and any violation of these policies will result in disciplinary actions.

- Confidentiality of patient information, company policy, procedures, standards, practices, and finances will be strictly enforced. The law and our own business ethics policies require that all Designated Agents maintain confidentiality when handling patient matters.
- Designated Agents shall not disclose patient information to outsiders, including other patients, third parties or members of one's own family. Patients will trust Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. to maintain their confidentiality and care.
- Due to the nature of our business, Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. strongly discourages Designated Agents from developing personal relationships with patients.
- Company information is only for the use of Green Hills Patient Center, Inc., and not to be used outside of the company.
- All information gained and created while employed at Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. is property of the company and may not be taken when leaving the company. Taking this information will be considered theft and Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will enforce this to the full extent of the law.
- Any disclosure of confidential information will result in disciplinary action.

Personal Designated Agent Property

Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. cannot be held responsible for lost or stolen personal property of Designated Agents.

Searches

- Personal Designated Agent workspaces are subject to inspection without prior notice. This includes desks, computers, work areas, and personal property such as purses and bags.
- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. reserves the right to conduct a personal body search if an Designated Agent is suspected of theft.

Job Training and Education ((R9-17-310(a,iii))

- Training education will include Medical Marijuana industry topics, safety, confidentiality and all training required under Regulation R9-17-313.
- Training and education will take place throughout the year as well when topics arise that needs further explanation to our Designated Agents.
- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. management and our medical director will present Training and education.
- All trainings will be recorded and located in the Training Folder

Diversion of Medical Marijuana ((R9-17-310(10))

- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will cooperate with the Show Low Police Department if an Designated Agent is caught stealing or illegally distributing Medical Marijuana.
- Designated Agents found to be diverting Medical Marijuana could be arrested and punished to the full extent of the law.

Designated Agent Conversations

- Designated Agents are prohibited from conducting personal conversations while in the presence of the public.
- The only conversations that should take place in public are between Designated Agents and patients.

Electronic Communications

- Use of company communication devices for personal reasons is strictly prohibited. This includes chatting online, accessing blogs or social networks of any kind.
- Company communication devices are to be used for business matters only.
- Use of personal communication devices, including personal phones, is to be used during break times or off hours.
- Designated Agents are not allowed to download anything from the Internet using company computers. Anything that is to be downloaded from the Internet is to be done or approved by the Operations Manager.
- All access codes and passwords will be given only to Designated Agents. Security access
 passwords to confidential patient or company information will only be available to the
 management of Green Hills Patient Center, Inc., or entrusted Designated Agents as needed.
- Designated Agent's personal cell phones must be on silence mode; except Managers

<u>Personal Appearance & Hygiene</u> (R9-17-320(B1e)) (R9-17-320(B3))

- Designated Agents must present themselves in a clean and odor-free fashion.
- Designated Agents will be required to wear appropriate attire. This will let patients know exactly
 who is a Designated Agent of Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. as well as project a professional
 appearance.
- Designated Agents must wash their hands after eating, smoking, using the bathroom and after break time.
- Personal expression is welcome as long as it is consistent with our professional image.
- All Designated Agents must maintain proper grooming and hygiene. Any Designated Agent with a beard or mustache must keep them will groomed.
- Pungent perfumes or colognes are prohibited from being used by any Designated Agent during work hours.

Tardiness and Missed Work

- All Designated Agents are required to be at their workstations, ready to start work at the beginning of their assigned work shifts.
- Traffic or weather conditions, with the exception of natural disasters or emergencies, are not excusable reasons for missing work.
- Designated Agents that are going to be late or miss work are required to contact the appropriate supervisor in a reasonable amount of time before their shift.
- Repetitive tardiness is taken seriously and may lead to disciplinary action up to and including discharge.

Jury Duty

- Designated Agents will be provided time off with pay to comply with state and federal wage laws if summoned for jury duty.
- Designated Agents are expected to return to work once relieved of jury duty.

Military Leave

- Designated Agents required to fulfill military obligations in any branch of the US Military will be given the necessary time off and reinstated in accordance with federal and state law.
- The time off will be unpaid, unless state or federal laws dictate otherwise
- Designated Agents are required to present documentation of required military as early as possible.

Designated Agent Discount

- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. Designated Agents who are Arizona Medical Marijuana card holders are allowed a company discount between 30% - 50% on all company products.
- The appropriate supervisor must ring all Designated Agent purchases up.
- All Designated Agent purchases must comply with state regulations.
- Designated Agents may not use their discount for patients or anyone else.

Medicine should not be allocated by the staff to any director unless deemed otherwise by a
written dispensary release. No medicine shall be vended to a director, even if they are an
authorized patient in the state of Arizona. Defiance of this policy shall result in termination of
the Designated Agent that ran the transaction, and direct action should be taken against the
director.

Visitors

- No visitors of Designated Agents or patients will be allowed in unauthorized, confidential or potentially hazardous areas.
- All Visitors must wear "Visitor" badge
- Any Designated Agent expecting a visitor must notify the appropriate supervisor.

Contact with Media

Media statements, if requested, are only to be made by directors or management.

Food and Beverages

- All food or drinks must be consumed in designated break areas.
- Designated Agents are allowed 1 closed drink container at their workstation.

Safety Procedures

- Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. Designated Agents will be taught to think defensively and use caution in unsafe situations.
- Designated Agents are required to notify the appropriate supervisor in the event of an unsafe situation.
- Heavy lifting at work must be done using your legs, and if necessary, ask for help.
- Designated Agents must inform the appropriate supervisor if they are injured or become ill while at work.
- The use of alcoholic beverages or illegal substances is strictly prohibited while at or before work.
- Possession of alcoholic beverages or illegal substances is strictly prohibited while on company property.
- Designated Agents will be taught to know the locations of first aid stations and fire safety equipment.
- All Dispensary Agent Cards will be collected at night and kept in the safe
- OSHA standards will be complied with at all times.

Sexual Harassment

- Any form of sexual harassment or harassment is strictly prohibited.
- Any Designated Agent found in violation or suspicion of sexual harassment will be investigated and dealt with in a timely manner.

- If an Designated Agent has harassed an Designated Agent they are required to report to management.
- All harassment reports can be made anonymously.
- All parties involved in any reported harassment conflict will be counseled. Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. will actively intervene at any indication of a potential hostile or violent situation.

Door Safety

- All interior security doors are to be locked at all times.
- Any door entrance with a security code or security access must be opened by an authorized Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. Designated Agent.

Request Time Off

 All Designated Agents must request time off 1 week in advance for written approval; approval is based on staffing needs of GHPC.

Performance Review/ Disciplinary Policies and Procedures

Performance Reviews ((R9-17-310(a,iv))

A performance appraisal is a review and discussion of an Designated Agent's performance of assigned duties and responsibilities. The appraisal is based on results obtained by the Designated Agent in his/her job, not on the Designated Agent's personality characteristics. The appraisal measures skills and accomplishments with reasonable accuracy and uniformity. It provides a way to help identify areas for performance enhancement and to help promote professional growth. It should not, however, be considered the supervisor's only communication tool. Open lines of communication throughout the year help to make effective working relationships.

- Each Designated Agent should receive a thoughtful and accurate appraisal. The manager will give rating in each of the performance categories:
 - Job /Technical Knowledge,
 - Problem Solving and Decision Making,
 - Self-management Skills
 - Communication,
 - Interpersonal Skills,
 - Adherence to Company Policies and Procedures.
 - o The Rating Marks are:
 - 5 = Outstanding
 - 4 = Exceeds Expectations/ Requirements
 - 3 = Meets Expectations/ Requirements

- 2 = Improvement Needed
- 1 = Unsatisfactory Job Performance
- Periodic reviews help supervisors gain a better understanding of each Designated Agent's abilities. The goal of the review process is to recognize achievement, to evaluate job progress, and then to design training for the further development of skills and strengths. A careful review will stimulate Designated Agent's interest and improve job performance. The review provides the Designated Agent, the supervisor and Human Resources a critical, formal feedback mechanism on an annual basis, however these discussions should not be restricted solely to a formal annual review.
- Annually, the appropriate supervisor evaluates each Designated Agent's performance. In the case
 where an Designated Agent has changed jobs partway through the appraisal period, both of the
 Designated Agent's supervisors during the appraisal period should submit an appraisal of the
 Designated Agent's performance. During the performance evaluation process, the most recent
 job description on file should be reviewed and updated if necessary
- Designated Agents are reviewed for a pay increase. The amount of the pay increase pool of funds is recommended by the administration and approved by the Board of Director. The method for allocating funds is based on rewarding meritorious performance. Merit increases will be awarded on a pay-for-performance basis and are based on individual performance. When used as intended, a pay-for-performance structure achieves the goal of rewarding truly top performers with merit increases that match their achievements and contributions.

<u>Disciplinary</u> ((R9-17-310(a,v))

- From time-to-time Directors and Managers are faced with Designated Agent misconduct
 issues and disciplinary actions. Given that there are a number of individuals in leadership and
 supervisory positions who may be new to their roles, this memorandum will serve as a basic
 reference guide when considering rules and standards applicable to Designated Agents and
 standards of conduct.
- Designated Agents are expected to meet Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. standards of performance, ethics, and professionalism. Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. follows a progressive discipline philosophy which is designed to, whenever possible, give Designated Agents who fail to meet standards an opportunity to improve. As part of progressive discipline, areas of concern are clearly explained to Designated Agents, clear action steps for improvement are outlined, and a follow-up is scheduled to review progress. Progressive discipline is a constructive way to improve Designated Agent performance; however, with each occurrence requiring discipline, the severity of the sanction increases to include suspension and/or termination. The level at which disciplinary action begins is determined by the immediate supervisor, in coordination with Human Resources, based upon the facts related to the conduct in question. The following outlines various steps in the progressive discipline plan.

For disciplinary actions under Levels I, II, fill out a Performance Counseling Form located in the Human Resource Folder. This documentation is to be completed by the Manager and signed by both the manager and the Designated Agent. If the Designated Agent refuses to sign, that should be indicated on the memo and witnessed by another party. After the form is signed, inclusion in the Designated Agent's personnel files.

- ➤ LEVEL I FORMAL DISCUSSION A formal discussion is used to coach an Designated Agent when there is a problem in an Designated Agent's job performance or instances of minor misconduct or offenses in the work place. It is the supervisor's responsibility to assure that the Designated Agent understands exactly what the performance, conduct, and/or workplace problem is. Further, the supervisor must outline job expectations and what changes are necessary to meet the performance standard. It is important that the Designated Agent has an opportunity to participate in a solution to the problem, that the Designated Agent is offered guidance or training to help resolve the situation, and that the Designated Agent realizes the significance and seriousness of the situation and need for change.
- ➤ <u>LEVEL II VERBAL WARNING</u> The verbal warning level of the disciplinary procedure is generally utilized for misconduct that occurs after the formal discussion. A verbal warning may be issued without a formal discussion should the misconduct warrant such action. A summary of the oral warning should be documented on the disciplinary form and signed.
- LEVEL III WRITTEN WARNING The written warning is generally issued for misconduct that occurs after a verbal warning. A written warning may be given instead of a verbal warning should the misconduct warrant such action. Should a written warning be issued in progression to a previous warning, the prior warning should be referenced.
- LEVEL IV SUSPENSION A suspension (with or without pay) may be imposed should misconduct continue after a written warning has been issued. A suspension may be the first level in the disciplinary procedure should the misconduct warrant such action. A disciplinary suspension is without pay and is imposed to emphasize to the Designated Agent the seriousness of the situation and the fact that improvement is required or termination of employment will be coordinated. The Designated Agent will be notified of a suspension in writing, with the terms of the suspension clearly stated.
 - Note: An Designated Agent under investigation (such as in a harassment charge investigation) may be suspended with pay pending the completion of the investigation. A suspension during an investigation may be converted to a disciplinary suspension without pay or termination at the conclusion of the investigation if findings dictate that level of disciplinary action.
- ➤ LEVEL V TERMINATION While Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. may use any of the above levels prior to termination, termination may also be the first level of the disciplinary action should the misconduct warrant such action as allowed by the state if Arizona as a "right to work" state. Determinations will be based on factors such as severity, frequency, and degree of deviation from expectations. Because of the great variety of situations that may arise, Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. may need to make decisions related to employment outside of the progressive disciplinary procedures. When an Designated Agent is terminated for

cause, the Designated Agent shall be removed from the payroll and lose any and all accrued Green Hills Patient Center, Inc. benefits.

Dear Member of the Planning and Zoning Commission,

The Planning and Zoning Commission (PZ) has a responsibility to make recommendations based on health, safety and the general welfare. As such the PZ must be a forward looking organization and anticipate future situations. In making a recommendation, either for or against approval of a conditional use permit for medical marijuana (MM) dispensary offsite cultivation at parcel 212-69-019A (Joel Young), the PZ has a duty to anticipate criminal conduct of third persons. The PZ also has the same duty when contemplating changes to the zoning ordinances relating to MM.

The State of Arizona has promugulated rules and regulations that differentiate between MM cultivation by a patient and MM cultivation by or for a dispensary. A dispensary cultivation site is required to have multiple panic buttons whereas a patient cultivation site is not.

The PZ has a duty to consider why the State requires panic buttons; what is the purpose of panic buttons; what danger does the State anticipate that would require panic buttons; what would be a reasonable and prudent response by local law enforcement to a panic button being set off; does local law enforcement, the Apache County Sheriffs Office (ACSO) have the staffing and funding necessary to provide that reasonable and prudent response.

I have spoken with the Arizona Department of Health Services, which is responsible for MM at the state level. The department stated that the danger the State anticipates with MM dispensary offsite cultivation is armed robbery. Panic buttons are required to be integrated with a security system that auto dials and notifies local law enforcement. It will then be the responsibility of the ACSO to respond in a reasonable and prudent manner to protect the health, safety and general welfare of all involved and nearby. Since the State considers armed robbery a real possibility, the county cannot simply dismiss the issue.

Any reasonable and prudent person, after careful thought, will conclude that panic buttons are not for notifying the ACSO after the fact. A simple landline telephone or cell phone can report a crime after the fact. Rather, panic buttons are for summoning the ACSO for a response *during* a violent attack. A response during a violent attack would be a necessity to protect the health, safety and general welfare of all involved and nearby. Such response must be measured in a small number of minutes.

I also have had a telephone conversation with the second in command of the drug enforcement division of the ACSO. We discussed the staffing situation at the ACSO, which leaves each officer to cover extremely large areas of the county. I left the conversation with a clear understanding that the ACSO could not be expected to respond in a small number of minutes, 24/7, 365 days out of the year. I understood that if one were lucky and an officer was in the right place at the right time he or she could possibly respond in a small number of minutes. I find even that doubtful. Additionally, luck must not be involved.

Parcel 212-69-019A is 8.04 miles from a paved road, 6.08 miles of which are not county maintained. It is an additional 30.5 miles to the ACSO in St. Johns. As anyone who lives in Apache County knows, non county maintained roads are often in poor condition. The condition of these roads constantly change and at times are nearly impassable especially in inclement weather. Criminals don't choose the times to commit crimes when it's optimum for law enforcement to respond. Additionally, their crimes, as we see in the media, often spread to the surrounding community. If the PZ and Board of Supervisors recommend and approve the conditional use permit for parcel 212-69-019A the ACSO must be capable of a reasonable and prudent response at all times. If the ACSO is not capable of a reasonable and prudent response at all times then the conditional use permit must be denied.

In making your decision, the PZ should consider a like or similar circumstance of another type of business that has panic buttons or silent alarms. Banks have silent alarms to summon local law enforcement during the commission of a robbery. No reasonable and prudent person or entity would site, build, recommend or authorize a bank to be built in such an area that is so remote to a manned law enforcement office. Rather, all of the operating banks that I am aware of are located within approximately 5 minutes from a manned law enforcement office.

Some people, possibly even some members of the PZ, would like you to believe that the issue of approving this conditional use permit and other applications, that may in the future come before the PZ, for conditional use permits relating to MM dispensary offsite cultivation, is property rights. Some people believe that a property owner should be allowed to do whatever they like with their property. Nothing could be further from the truth. It is recognized in every county and local jurisdiction in the State of Arizona that property rights can be and are limited. Zoning, development and building ordinances exist to promote the health, safety and general welfare. Property rights of an owner to do whatever they please are secondary. The duty of the PZ is to be concerned about health, safety and the general welfare of the community.

There is an additional issue to be considered regarding MM dispensary offsite cultivation at parcel 212-69-019A. A careful reading of the current Apache County MM ordinance and the proposed amendments both contain language, that in essence, it is the intent to keep MM dispensary offsite cultivation sites at least 2500 feet from locations where children are likely to be. It is my understanding, that at least one child lives in a home that is within the 1000 feet notification area. I cannot think of any place more important, than their home, where a child is likely to be. To allow this conditional use permit to be recommended and approved would be, in my opinion, discriminatory to this child. Additionally, to amend the MM ordinance, by reducing the distance required between MM dispensary offsite cultivation areas and children, so as to approve this conditional use permit, would also be, in my opinion, discriminatory to this child.

There is really only one answer, that a reasonable and prudent person can have, to the question of whether this conditional use permit should be approved. The answer is **no**.

If, however, the PZ and Board of Supervisors should recommend and approve the conditional use permit for MM dispensary offsite cultivation at parcel 212-69-019A, the citizens of Apache County should pray that there is never a problem at this site. In my opinion, if the PZ and Board of Supervisors knowingly site a dangerous business in an area without adequate law enforcement and people are harmed or killed, or property damage is involved, then Apache County is responsible. I believe, that the resulting lawsuit(s) would bankrupt the county. Fortunately, for me, I live approximately 3 miles away from the proposed cultivation site and the potential mayhem and lawsuits are not likely to involve me.

With respect to amending the current MM ordinance, I believe a reasonable and prudent location for a MM dispensary offsite cultivation location contains, at a minimum, the following restrictions:

- 1. At least 2500 feet from locations where a child or children under the age of 18 are routinely likely to be, including their home.
- 2. Located on a county maintained road, preferably paved.
- 3. Located within 7-10 driving miles of a manned law enforcement office or manned substation. Manned means 24/7, 365 days a year.

I am not concerned about the locations of private MM cultivation sites of patients who have a MM card from the state of Arizona and abide by the rules promulgated by the State, as the quantities of MM are small.

I think I stoned."

Yes I know this belongs on "Today Funnies"

But it is a true story and I will let you all know how the "MILK" taste and if it works afterwhile I'm headover to Hommer as soon as he wake up. I wonder if he wants another glass of milk.

A string of worrisome incidents linked to marijuana might be enough to give pause to your typical, blissed-out pot smoker: Since when does weed trigger aggression or motivate someone to commit a crime and land kids in hospitals?

But recent headlines involving people under marijuana's influence might have some wondering if there's a link.

A Colorado man is accused of <u>killing his wife</u> after eating now-legal pot candy, Denver authorities said. A Wyoming college student <u>leapt to his death</u> from a Denver hotel balcony after eating a marijuana cookie purchased at a pot shop, police said. And at least one Colorado hospital has reported an increase in visits after children ate too many pot-laced treats, according to a study in JAMA Pediatrics.

Could it involve the way the drug is ingested -- in the form of pot cookies or brownies instead of smoking? There's not enough research on edible marijuana to make a definite link, said Al Bronstein, a physician and medical director of the Rocky Mountain Poison and Drug Center, which handles local poison control issues. But Bronstein noted that edible marijuana is risky for several reasons.

"What we're seeing with edibles is that the effect is delayed for approximately 30 minutes, depending on the person," Bronstein said. "People get impatient for the effect and will take more, and then the symptoms are more pronounced than what they were expecting."

In other words, if one cookie doesn't get the job done, some people might be quick to eat another before the high takes effect, possibly resulting in an overdose.

It's also not clear how marijuana interacts with prescription medication.

Richard Kirk, the man accused of shooting his wife dead after eating marijuana candy, may also have been on prescription pain pills, The Associated Press reported.

With edible marijuana, there is portion size to take into consideration.

People might be used to eating a few cookies, but the recommended dose of a pot cookie might only be a tiny piece of a single cookie.

"That's difficult to do, practically," Bronstein said. "I know, myself: I wish I could only eat oneeighth of a Snickers bar and leave the rest for later."

Samantha Rodin, a "budtender" at La Conte's Clone Bar and Dispensary in Denver, added that edibles don't affect everyone the same way.

"People need to be educated on how to dose themselves properly because everyone is different," Rodin said. "I know someone who could eat three medical marijuana cookies and not feel it, and I can only take a bite and I'll be good for a while."

She warned people to read the labels carefully.

"Every package tells you how many doses," she said. "Some of the [marijuana-infused] drinks I get, they'll say four doses. Other packages might say 10 doses. The packages are labeled correctly. People get a little carried away."

There's also risk of children getting their hands on the pot brownies, candy and cookies.

"They're lookalikes for common edible products," Bronstein said. "So it's difficult for a child to know the difference."

Jim Gerhardt, a police sergeant in Thornton, Colo., and a board member of the Colorado Drug Investigators Association, agreed that marijuana edibles pose a new threat.

"Where kids are concerned, there are two issues," Gerhardt told ABCNews.com, speaking in his capacity as part of the CDIA.

"Sometimes smoking a drug is a little intimidating, especially if you're not prone to be a smoker," he said. "But eating a candy or brownie is a much easier way to ingest the drug, so it's less intimidating. Plus, those are products that kids are drawn to -- cookies and snacks, and things like that.

"And it's difficult for school officials to pick up on," he added. "You could sit in the cafeteria eating these cookies and brownies, and no one would know it's infused with THC."

Children's Hospital Colorado in Aurora, Colo., saw a significant spike in the number of children treated for accidentally eating marijuana-laced treats after Colorado relaxed its drug laws, according to a 2013 study published in JAMA Pediatrics.

A 4th grader in Denver brought a <u>marijuana edible</u> to school on Tuesday, police said. Earlier this month, a California teen was <u>busted for allegedly selling pot brownies</u> to fellow high school students after another student got sick, police said. Last month, three seventh-graders in California were hospitalized after eating what was likely a marijuana-laced brownie at school, the AP reported.

Experts urged parents to keep their marijuana stash -- medical or otherwise -- hidden and even consider kid-proof packaging.

Gerhardt added that marijuana edibles are also more dangerous for people making the treats.

"What they'll do is extract high-concentrated THC from the plant," he said. "Most people use butane to do that, so we have a ton of explosions in our state right now. If they don't blow themselves up, then they get a very heavy-concentrated form of THC that can be baked into anything, put into any food or beverage."

Bronstein said people just need more education.

"It's kind of akin to the education about alcohol -- to drink responsibly," he said. "People need to eat these edibles responsibly, and they have limited experience with these products. That's the real problem. This is a drug. People need to be respectful of that."

Dear Mr. Ollerton,

My communication with you concerns the proposed development of a marijuana growing facility on the far west side of Apache County adjacent to Road N9160. Please forgive the lack of further identification as I have not been provided that information. I do know, however, that a hearing on this matter is scheduled before the Apache County Board of Supervisors on Thursday, December 3rd at 1:00 P.M.

It is also my understanding that I may not be able to voice my concerns at the hearing due to time constraints; therefore, my written statement is as follows:

My wife and I, having retired from the Arizona Department of Corrections, are currently living in Tucson. We have resided in the same home for thirty-five years and are appalled at the deterioration of our neighborhood; created primarily by the proliferation of illegal drugs including marijuana. It has also been our experience to realize that a majority of felonies that resulted in incarceration in the state prison system was the direct result of illegal drugs including marijuana.

Following my retirement from the department, I have spent countless hours on the U.S./Mexican border as a volunteer patrolling the smuggling routes used by the cartels---often in the company of the U.S. Border Patrol---in an attempt to stem the flood of illegal drugs including marijuana into our country. Yet, having arrived at the conclusion that none of our efforts would make any difference nor preserve what was left of our neighborhood, we opted to flee to a safer environment.

We were fortunate to find a small plot of land at the west end of Conejo Road about seven miles north of the Concho Highway and, in July of this year, purchased the parcel (#212-72-001F). Our plan was to develop the property into a modest retreat; a haven from the dreadful scourge of drugs and the attendant violence that is taking control of this country. Now, having begun the project 216 miles from our home, we have learned that the very element we've spent a small fortune trying to leave behind is planning to move into our neighborhood-just over a mile from our property!

It is our understanding that the proposed marijuana growing facility is affiliated with a medical marijuana dispensary in Show Low. I suppose that would make the operation legal under Arizona law. Still, the growing and possession of marijuana is illegal under federal statutes and, I have no doubt the Fed would be closely watching this

operation. And so will the state and county authorities; until they get bored with the whole process and redirect their attention to more important issues.

What then? The growing facility, having been established out in the boondocks (why so far removed from any major thoroughfare?), will be visited by persons other than law enforcement and, eventually, the drug cartels. In Colorado, that very element has quickly secured control of the medical marijuana industry. Rarely are state or county law enforcement even seen in the area of the proposed operation; where will the resources to keep tabs on this operation come from?

But legal and safety issues aside, what impact will the operation have on the roads---that often traverse open cattle country---leading to the facility? During the rainy season they are a bottomless morass of mud and nearly impassible. In the dry season they are deeply rutted and dusty. What will be the environmental impact of the trucks and other vehicles using the roads to move supplies and product? Will law enforcement also be using the roads or will helicopters be hovering overhead with their attendant noise in an otherwise serene high-desert setting.

Security will also be of concern in a marijuana growing facility that would, no doubt, require the erection of tall poles with bright lighting at the top to illuminate the operation. Gazing at the stars at night absent light pollution would be lost as would the peace and serenity sought after by every resident in the area. Solitude and quiet are the first responses given whenever residents in the area are asked, "Why did you move out here?"

I understand that the tax revenue derived from such an operation would be very attractive to a county as poor as Apache. In the long term, however, I believe that nothing good will come from this business and will, eventually, cost the county dearly in terms of quality of life and the safety of it's residents. I firmly believe that the request to establish a marijuana growing facility in Apache County should be denied.

In Protest of Proposed Zone Change and Proposed Conditional Use Permit.

Dear Mr. Ollerton,

I am writing to you in opposition to the **Medical Cannabis Cultivation Facility** proposed by property owner Joel Young at Tract: 212-69-019-A in Concho, Arizona. I live a bit more than 1,000 feet so was not notified by the property owner. My husband and I bought our property #212-24-002A to grow our own food, run a few cattle and live in a quiet country sitting. Our ranch is one of the oldest dwellings in the area with out buildings built in the 1800's as well as 2 homes that are all built of stone. Our well was drilled pre 1917. The history of our ranch is at the core of how we wish to develop and grow what we now call home and wish to pass on to our children.

In Joel Young's letter he stated his intent was to keep the integrity and harmonious appearance with the existing character of the general vicinity. I can't imagine his grow facility will be harmonious with the more that 100 year old buildings. The roar of his 24/7 heating, cooling and humidity control system, the traffic noise of large trucks delivering the vast amount of supplies he will need is **not harmonious** with the sounds of cattle, chickens and turkeys. I do not want his "artificial buffering devices" over what is natural to mitigate the noise and smell of his grow facility or any other adverse effects. His possible run off is **not harmonious** with my desire to raise all organic animals and gardens, in fact the drainage plane from his property goes across mine on its way to the Little Colorado.

In the Apache County Comprehensive Plan our area is designated Rural Ranch and recommends any commercial facility should be placed along a paved road. Old Hunt road is not paved though it is minimally maintained by the county, we turn onto a dirt road (CR 9211) a mile in with a total of at least 7 miles of unmaintained roads to get to our area.

We have no Police or Fire protection in our area. The properties tend to be closer together than Mr. Young's "40 acres apart", we are essentially a dead end road with 10 homes within half a mile of his property, hardly sparely populated. Looking at his plan it appears the buildings are set back from the road by only 400 or so feet, on a hill and in full view of the road.

It is widely believed that Pro-marijuana forces are gearing up for a ballot initiative in 2016 that would seek voters' approval for full legalization. There has been a rise in applicants seeking large grow operations in order to get a foothold in anticipation of legalization. If this happens it appears Mr. Young's operation would turn into a retail one in a very rural area. I believe that would be a huge impact on our area.

I believe that Mr. Young has tried the marijuana cultivation business illegally in the recent past and that is why he currently is under indictment by the Navajo County Grand July for the following charges:

Count One - Production of marijuana (less than 2 lbs) - Class 5 Felony

Count Two - Possessions of marijuana for sale (less than 2 lbs) - Class 4 Felony

Count Three – Misconduct involving weapons (used or possessed a deadly weapon during the commission of a felony) – Class 4 Felony

Count Four – Misconduct involving weapons (manufactures, sold or transferred a prohibited weapon to-wit: a sawed-off shotgun) – Class 4 Felony

In the last case management conference for Mr. Young's criminal case CR2015-00091 a jury trial has been requested and set for March 9, 2016.

We are a quiet rural neighborhood with single family homes who moved here so we could enjoy the peacefulness, see the stars at night, enjoy the deer and antelope that come to the tanks to drink and graze in the pastures, and to get together as families for dinner and conversation. I, as well as others wish to pass all this on to our children.

If Mr. Young is allowed to proceed with the medical cannabis grow facility our lifestyle and quality of living will be severely impacted by increased traffic coming to the grow facility, noise, fumes/odors, security lights and diminished property values. Small communities have few secrets and ours is no different, the presence of a medical cannabis grow facility will draw curiosity drive by's and those checking for a robbery opportunity into our quiet community. We all hope that you understand that this proposed grow facility does not belong in our small rural community and ask that you do not recommend this project for approval.

I am writing to you today in opposition of the medical marijuana cultivation facility proposed by property owner Joel Young at Tract: 212-69-019-A in Concho, Arizona. I am also opposed to the change in zoning request to change the zoning of the property from AG2 Agriculture General to C-2 General Commercial for the purpose of obtaining a conditional use permit. I live at 212-69-017 and was not originally noticed by the property owner because I live over 300' from his property boundary. I did however receive a revised letter in the regular mail on 11/14/15 notifying me because I live within the 1,000' boundary. The additional letter was prompted by an email on November 10, 2015 from Milton Ollerton, Planning and Zoning Director to applicant Joel Young. I've owned my property since 1996 and live on the property with my 9 year old daughter.

In the letter crafted by Joel Young he is seeking a zoning change and approval of a conditional use permit for a medical marijuana cultivation facility; a commercial venture. Mr. Young listed his intent was to keep the integrity and harmonious appearance with the existing character of the general vicinity. The letter continues to cite providing buffering devices in order to mitigate adjacent properties from potential adverse effects. Currently there is no reason to install buffering devices in our quiet neighborhood and a medical marijuana cultivation facility will absolutely not keep the integrity and harmonious characteristics of the properties and families who reside in this community.

I believe that Mr. Young has tried the marijuana cultivation business illegally in the recent past and that is why he currently is under indictment by the Navajo County Grand July for the following charges:

Count One - Production of marijuana (less than 2 lbs) - Class 5 Felony

Count Two – Possessions of marijuana for sale (less than 2 lbs) – Class 4 Felony

Count Three – Misconduct involving weapons (used or possessed a deadly weapon during the commission of a felony) – Class 4 Felony

Count Four – Misconduct involving weapons (manufactures, sold or transferred a prohibited weapon to-wit: a sawed-off shotgun) – Class 4 Felony

In the last case management conference for Mr. Young's criminal case CR2015-00091 a jury trial has been requested and set for March 9, 2016.

I moved out to the Concho area to enjoy the quiet and peacefulness of the neighborhood. The air is clean, noise is almost non-existent and although the lots are large in size there are many residents like myself who live on our properties. My concerns are for the safety, security and property values for my family and my neighbors who live in this area. Our roads are primitive roads and not maintained by the county. Additional traffic on our roads will further deteriorate them and cause safety issues for the residents of the area. My daughter rides her bike and walks our dogs on the very roadway where the increased traffic will be traveling. I fear that the individuals traveling our roads will not be cognizant that this is truly a neighborhood and not a business community and will not be aware that children live and play here. We are located outside of a fire district so our residences do not have fire protection. If there were a serious fire at the proposed medical marijuana cultivation facility this could put my residence and other structures at risk. We do not have routine Sheriff patrols and the closest Sheriff's presence is St. Johns which is over 40 miles away. If there were a robbery of this facility our neighborhood could be at risk and the perpetrators would have no concern about an audible alarm or a panic button on the cultivation facility. I do not believe that a medical marijuana cultivation facility fits in this community and I believe that the existence of such a facility will diminish the property and land values for all the surrounding properties within this quiet residential community. I personally would not consider purchasing a property next to or nearby a marijuana cultivation facility. I believe that this would not be considered as asset to our community profile and does not fit in with the proposed Apache County Comprehensive Plan (see section 4.3.1 from Apache County Comprehensive Plan below). If Mr. Young is allowed to proceed with the medical marijuana cultivation facility our community peacefulness, harmonious characteristics and integrity will be destroyed by increased traffic, noise, fumes/odors, security lights, audible alarms, high security fences, diminished property values and increased people who do not live in this area coming to the cultivation facility. I also believe that although Mr. Young does not plan to have any signage that he is operating a medical marijuana cultivation facility that the word will get out and this may draw an unsavory element into our quiet community. I believe that instead of changing the zoning for one parcel located in a rural ranch area so that a single property owner can operate a commercial cultivation facility that the Planning and Zoning Department assist this individual in locating suitable locations where this type of business does not degrade community peacefulness, harmonious characteristics and integrity of the neighborhood. For almost twenty years I've enjoyed the peacefulness of the area have not lived in fear of strangers coming into my neighborhood and I sincerely hope that you understand that this proposed medical marijuana commercial cultivation facility does not belong in our residential community; please do not approve zoning change and the conditional use permit.

4.3.1 Rural Ranch

In general, the purpose of the Rural Ranch character area is to maintain the open character of land traditionally used for ranching in Apache County. A significant amount of the land designated as Rural Ranch has been divided into 36 or 40 acre parcels.

Development in Rural Ranch may not include lots smaller than nine acres without 1) compliance with Apache County's subdivision regulations and 2) approval of a community master plan, described in Section 4.1, that addresses roadways, provision of water, sewer, sanitation, and other public services, and location of residential and nonresidential uses. Community master plans should include a minimum of 36 acres; residential density in a community master plan should not be more than one dwelling unit per gross acre.

Rural Ranch may include both low density residential and limited commercial uses focused on adjacent highways. Commercial uses in Rural Ranch should be allowed only along paved or other appropriately surfaced access or rights-of-way and are encouraged at highway intersections. Any industrial or storage uses in Rural Ranch should be screened from views from rights-of-way.

Please consider our objection to the application by Mr. Joel Young for the establishment of a marijuana cultivation facility on Parcel Number 212-69-019-A in Concho, AZ.

My wife and I have been the owners of Parcel Number 212-69-018, immediately adjacent to the subject property, for approximately 20 years. Our plan for purchase of this property was to build a retirement home in a quiet, rural community.

We strongly believe the establishment of this facility will most probably completely crush a 20 year plan and lower the property value of our parcel. In addition to this fact, we object to this application for the following reasons:

Traffic and roads. The roads in this area are very rural and owner maintained. Because commercial truck traffic as well as the employees working on the property, will substantially degrade these roads as well as adding additional noise and possibly dangers. If approval of this application is considered at this time, we request Mr. Young be required, at his expense, to upgrade the roads from County Road 5270 to Mr Young's property to County Road standards, with stop signs at appropriate intersections. This should be a requirement of approving the application or make some other agreement with the other owners.

Mr. Young's credentials are disturbing. While we are unaware of his entire history, his recent record alone, in Navajo County does not appear to lend itself well to being involved with the production of a product containing a narcotic.

Mr. Young in his letter dated November 1, 2015 states the hours of operation would be 7:00 am until 10:00 pm. This does not fit well with a quiet, rural, residential community. If approved, we believe the hours

should be restricted to no later than 7:00 pm

Where will the water come from for the marijuana? If the plan is to drill wells on the property, how many wells? Will his wells infringe on the the water supply of other residents? As time passes, will current or future resident's wells be affected, depleted or require expensive deeper wells?

In his letter of November 1, Mr. Young makes numerous statements concerning his "intentions to keep the integrity and harmonious appearance with the existing and intended character of the general vicinity." We believe the only purpose of these intention's are to obtain the conditional use permit. Intentions are not reality. We believe that any reasonable person when considering the "intentions" enumerated are unrealistic, unreasonable and inconsistent with the purpose of the intended enterprise. We support this view because unknown people will now be working on this property. Increased traffic will eclipse not only the current traffic, but all future traffic that could exist by residential use of the property Operating hours till 10:00 pm will require lighting. After hours will most likely also require very robust security lighting.

While we appreciate the letters from both Apache County and Mr. Young notifying the affected nearby property owners, all property owners I have been in contact with were unhappy with the very strategic scheduling of the meeting between the property owners and Mr. Young. We feel that selecting November 25, at 9:00 am for the meeting was an covert attempt to make it difficult for people to attend the meeting. the day before Thanksgiving.

Finally, the above objections address only a few of the major areas we can reasonably foresee. Without having any experience with what additional issues this operation will create, we are as concerned with the unknown areas of conflict as the issues enumerated above.

In conclusion, we would like to thank you for your time and consideration of our concerns and objections.

We live at 35 County Road N 9158, Cocho AZ (Laidback Way). This is just west of Mr. Young's property: tract 212-69-019-A. We own approximately forty (40) acres and this property is fenced and crossed fenced with improvements of electrical service, phone, sewer, water, outbuildings and a double-wide modular home. We put our brand on this piece of land with raised garden beds, berry bushes, fruit and regular shade trees, and of course, flower beds with blooms from early spring until late fall.

In the mornings our red heeler and two border collies run the fence line to make sure no jack rabbits or coyotes have crossed into forbidden territory and yet each afternoon a couple of roadrunners venture to the house and enjoy the seed and water left from the daily feeding of the wildbirds. This is our home and has been for over eight years. After working for twenty years at the US and Canadian border, a quiet and peaceful neighborhood just fit the bill.

A place where people married and divorced; where babies were born and loved ones died; where neighbors watch and strange vehicles are noticed; where the car broken down has many

offers for help, where the unfamiliar plume of smoke is checked to make sure a home or outbuilding isn't on fire. A place where people facing hard times are met with boxes of food, gasoline for a car, help with a bed-ridden family member.

This neighborhood had expanded with new people moving in and hoping to make this peaceful place theirs also. Lots of these new arrivals want to escape the frantic pace of life they left behind. Some find this is not what they really want and begin to try to make their new home more like the area they came from. This does not usually set well with those who have sacrificed much to live in this peaceful place.

To change the zoning to accommodate one man at the expense of many is unthinkable. To live in an area outside of a fire district; where emergency medical service has to be by helicopter; where law enforcement service can take days instead of hours; where the roads traveled to our homes are very primitive and resemble rabbit trails and are not maintained by the county; shows devotion to this way of life; to each other; and an unwillingness to allow a change in zoning to happen.

A zoning change will put a strain on existing electrical services; additional travel on poor roads by inconsiderate drivers; a raise in property taxes yet a drop in valuation of property; an increase in undesirables casing homes and property for stealable items; unsightly lights and fences and smells; and the prospect of private individuals, untrained, and armed to stand guard in this quiet, peaceful neighborhood.

Please do not deliver a slap in the face to these homeowners and voters to favor a man who seems to have no regard for existing laws as shown by his current indictment by the Navajo County Grand Jury.

I have additional thoughts regarding parcel 212-69-019A and medical marijuana. This morning, on channel 15 news, two news items made me pause and rethink my position that Joel Young's applications will not have an adverse effect on the local roads. I now believe they will.

Please review and deliver the attached letter to the members of the Planning and Zoning Commission.

This letter is in addition to my previous letter, as each letter addresses different issues.

Dear Mr Ollerton & Members of the PZ Commission.

During our conversation, yesterday December 1, at your office, regarding the conditional use permit application for parcel 212-69-019A (Joel Young), I stated that while I am opposed to the conditional use permit for the reasons listed in my letter that I supplied, I do not envision a problem with the roads.

This morning, December 2, there were two segments on channel 15 news that made me pause and reconsider my thoughts regarding the 6.08 miles of non county maintained roads used to access parcel 212-69-019A. I now believe that in the future there will be problems with these roads if the conditional use permit is approved.

The two items on the news were:

- Dunlap Stone University is now offering the first accredited online class on the business of marijuana. Apparently it is anticipated that marijuana is going to be a large industry throughout the nation.
- 2. It is likely that the recreational use of marijuana will be on the Arizona statewide ballot in November 2016.

I had an opportunity to talk privately with Joel Young approximately 2 weeks ago. Also, I listened to Joel and his dispensary partner speak on November 25 at a community meeting that Joel sponsored. The two news items "filled in the blanks". I now see the larger picture and it has a negative impact on the roads that will be used to access parcel 212-69-019A and the surrounding area,

The following are my understandings:

- 1. Joel Young told me that there will be 4-5 employees working at the dispensary cultivation site on his property.
- 2. Joel's partner, during the November 25 community meeting, spoke of the exciting new world we are in regarding recreational marijuana. He spoke extensively about Colorado's and other state's experiences with recreational marijuana. He stated that he is excited to get in at the "ground floor" of this new world.
- 3. I asked, during the community meeting, if Joel and his partner would stipulate that they would limit the cultivation area to two thousand square feet forever. His partner immediately responded, without hesitation, no.
- 4. Another community member asked, during the meeting, about how much profit their marijuana cultivation business would produce. Joel's partner responded that the business would be nonprofit, but that did not mean that individuals involved would not be making a profit. He then chuckled.

- 5. At the November 25 community meeting, a person whose name I don't recall introduced himself as a member of the Apache County Planning and Zoning Commission. This person talked about various property owners in Apache County that want to place entire 40 acre parcels under marijuana cultivation.
- 6. Joel's partner, immediately after the November 25 meeting, stated that there are 28 investors backing this medical marijuana cultivation project.
- 7. I read in an article, approximately 2-2.5 months ago, that there is a dispensary offsite medical marijuana cultivation site in Golden Valley AZ (close to Kingman) that has fourteen thousand square feet under cultivation. The same site employs 28 people. That is 2 people per each one thousand square feet, which would be close to the same ratio as Joel's operation.
- 8. Approximately 2 months ago I was at the Apache County engineering office to take care of an address issue. I casually asked what the cost is to build a improved gravel road that meets Apache County engineering standards. I approximated 1 million dollars per mile. The engineering staff stated 1.25 million per mile.
- 9. This entire area of the county, to my knowledge, is used only as residential property. Except for the rancher in the area, that runs cattle. The rancher operates the ranch by himself and his wife, they have no employees. The ranch does not produce a burden on the roads.
- 10. The condition of the non county maintained roads in the general area of parcel 212-69-019A are a concern to the area residents. I know this because, at this time, I attempt to maintain, in a passable condition, 2 miles of these roads, utilizing a 45 hp tractor. While I am working on the road many residents of the area stop and thank me for my contribution, to the community, by working on the road. The vast majority of the residents are concerned about the portions of the road that I do not work on. They understand that I can only do so much with my small tractor.

After the news reports today, I now believe that I understand the bigger picture.

Joel Young, his partner and 28 investors, in my opinion, want to open a medical marijuana dispensary offsite cultivation business as a beginning to a larger business plan. If (actually when) the voters of Arizona approve recreational marijuana, Joel's medical marijuana cultivation business will convert to recreational marijuana. I believe that they will exponentially expand the area under cultivation. Marijuana cultivation and processing is labor intensive. If you use the ratio of 2 employees per 1000 square feet of cultivation, each acre under cultivation would require 87 employees. Joel's property is, I believe, 36 acres. This operation has the real potential to become quite large. The non county maintained roads in the area simply could not handle the traffic burden that will result.

The Planning and Zoning Commission (PZ) and the Board of Supervisors have a duty to anticipate and plan for this real possibility. Who would improve the roads for this higher level of traffic? Does the county have the funds (6-7.5 million dollars) for such a project? Would the county create a road improvement district (if legal) to pay the costs? If so, how many parcels would be in the improvement district? If 1000 parcels were in an improvement district each parcel would have to pay \$7500 and undoubtly the members of such a district would demand that their own roads be improved at additional costs. Should the local residents have to pay to improve the road so that Joel and his investors make millions? The County would then have ongoing additional road maintenance costs, driving up property taxes for the entire county. An improvement district, such as this would definitely have a negative impact on property values in the area. Would the County just say "too bad" for the area residents?

The PZ and Board of Supervisors cannot "stick their heads in the sand" and say that this is just a hypothetical. The recreational marijuana movement is spreading throughout the nation. It is only a matter of time before it reaches Arizona.

The PZ and Board of Supervisors must be very careful and prudent in their decisions so as to prevent unintended consequences.

There is a simple answer to the entire issue, both now and in the future. The conditional use permit for parcel 212-69-019A must be denied. The rezoning application for this parcel must be denied. If all businesses such as Joel's are required to be on a paved road, in a C2 zone, as described in the Apache County Zoning Ordinance and the current Apache County Medical Marijuana Ordinance all of the problems disappear. Not only do the road issues disappear but the issues listed in my original letter to the PZ also disappear.

Additionally, it would be a mistake to amend the current Apache County Medical Marijuana Ordinance to allow dispensary offsite cultivation to be permitted in AG zones because you get right back to the problems with the roads as described above.

I want to make clear, I am not against medical marijuana or recreational marijuana. I simply do not want medical and recreational marijuana to adversely affect the health, safety and general welfare including the condition of the roads.

Gentlemen:

I am writing as a concerned citizen and Apache County property owner, about the upcoming consideration of putting in a new marijuana growing facility north of CR 5270. I wanted to take this opportunity to voice my concerns. I know time at the hearing tomorrow is limited and I would never have the chance to voice them all in person, so I am hoping you will grant me a few minutes of your time to read them.

We own 520 acres up just a mile from the proposed grow site. Though our primary residence is in Tucson, that is a property we bought as a vacation getaway. A quarter section parcel of the three we own was a small farm at one time, and we have worked to try to clean and fix it up and maybe be able to make it productive and sustainable just for growing food for our own consumption; we have no plans for any commercial use.

Where we live in Tucson, it is a small community just north of town. We built here on 20 acres 8 years ago, hoping to escape a bit from the city and enjoy the peace and beauty and tranquility of country I ife. In the interim we have come to learn much about the local demographics, much of which is impacted by drug use and manufacture, both meth and marijuana. We had to deal with a really bad neighbor who turned out to be the kingpin of one of the biggest marijuana rings in the country; currently he's doing time in federal prison for money laundering and his drug trafficking activities.

There are a lot of locals who also depend on meth for their sustenance and just to get through life; it is a constant battle with them as break-ins, burglaries, theft and violence (shootings, arson, fights, etc.) are a part of their everyday lives and how they support their habits. After years of fighting the marijuana neighbor's girlfriend who remained in their home with her new boyfriend, and suffering the continuing string of petty crimes and insults they indulged in, we were finally able to purchase the home and fix it up and rent it out to good neighbors and nice people. Years of neighborhood angst were ended; the stress and worry about the element attracted, including the black stretch limos, the many ways they defied and broke a law which they have no respect for, the pack of dogs they owned that terrorized the neighborhood, killed livestock, etc., just the bad neighbors they were in every way, were over.

When we acquired this property in Apache County, we were hopeful that we would be able to enjoy there the peace and tranquility of country living without the crime and concerns we've dealt with here for the past 8 years because of the drug trade. Our hearts sank when this proposal was brought to our attention by our neighbors. Those of us out here who brave the distance, the roads, the weather, and all the privations of remote living in order to find some peace and quiet and security, deserve to be protected by our elected officials from this gross intrusion. We have invested quite a bit of money in trying to fix up our little farm, including a permaculture consultation from a well known ranch/farm permaculture consultant, to know how to best be stewards of this fragile land and combat the erosion and flooding and challenges that are typical out here. We really want to be good neighbors, and good stewards of our little piece of Apache County.

The record and background of the man making this proposal are also troubling; he may not have the felony conviction that the law places as an immediate disqualifier for operating such an operation, but

he has enough of a record (drug related, domestic violence, meeting the police at the front door with a sawed off shotgun, as I was told) that indicate he is not a savory character or someone I would want as a neighbor or trust to give a hoot about his neighbors or the neighborhood.

I don't care if marijuana is now conditionally "legal" in Arizona. Just the presence of large scale drug production, like marijuana, is an attractive nuisance, and will always attract the wrong element, including cartels, gangs, and organized crime. These marijuana growing operations, however they may be cloaked in legitimacy by the new laws and associations with medical marijuana outlets, are thinly veiled "funding sources for a variety of organized criminal activities." Anything they could claim to be "giving" to the communities they are found in is more than paid for by the price those communities pay for their presence in so many ways. They consume a huge amount of utilities and resources, and are commonly guilty of electricity bypass theft, which is then paid for by other local utility customers and are implicated in electricity shortages and brownouts or blackouts. The risks of electrocution and fire and explosions are very high, not to mention the very real security risks which are acknowledged by the extraordinary measures they typically take in terms of fencing, lighting, etc. If they were not concerned that these operations attract criminal activity, why would this be necessary? This article from Police Chief magazine is very helpful.

This article is also very important in stating the disconnect between the PR package that voters and local officials are sold and the reality of these operations. The cloak of "legality" in reality hasn't changed the way these facilities operate, or the type of people that typically operate them. "Legal grow operators are virtually identical in operation to the illegal grow operations. As such, there are direct parallels to legal grow operations and clandestine drug labs. Operators typically ignore environmental waste regulations, employee health and safety regulations, fire codes, and building codes. Operators frequently are untrained in commercial aspects of agriculture, drawing instead upon underground texts from otherwise unknown "publishers." Proponents of medical marijuana grows typically skew reality by displaying photographs of sophisticated gleaming, clean, grow ops staffed by workers in hooded Tyvek suits, wearing respiratory protection. If that was the typical grow operation, then voters would have received what they expected." http://www.forensic-applications.com/marijuana/growops.html

Other residents have also raised the strictly nuts and bolts concerns of having a commercial enterprise in this area, where roads are very primitive, at certain seasons unpassable, and access and availability of emergency services and first response teams to either hazardous situations or criminal activity is very limited and subject to long response times due to the distance from neighboring towns. At the very minimum, such an operation has no right or reason to be in such a location, but belongs in an industrial or commercial area with easy access to emergency services. Changing the zoning here, as I believe has been requested by the owner of this property, would do nothing to change the facts or reduce Apache County's exposure to risk and liability. This is a huge liability and long list of accidents and incidents and pending lawsuits and potentially worse, just waiting to happen. This is the wrong proposal, in the wrong place, period.

As the latter article concludes,

"In conclusion, just because a grow op may be legal does not automatically confer a guarantee of prudence or safety. The legality of the operation does not affect the inherent hazards of conducting an industrial process in a residential setting.

The legality of the operation does not separate the grower or the user from the dark criminal world from which the industry grew. Most grow ops remain an untested toxic tort proving ground for landlords, lenders and insurance companies."

I plead with you on the Board of Apache County to do the right thing, for both the County and the local residents, and not approve this very risky and ill-advised grow facility in this area.

I am also opposed to the change in zoning request to change the zoning of the property from AG2 Agriculture General to C-2 General Commercial for the purpose of obtaining a conditional use permit. I live at 212-69-017 within 1,000 of the proposed cultivation facility. I've owned my property since 1996 and live on the property with my 9 year old daughter.

Intent was to keep the integrity and harmonious appearance with the existing character of the general vicinity.

In order to accomplish this it will require providing buffering devices in order to mitigate adjacent properties from potential adverse effects. Currently there is no reason to install buffering devices in our quiet neighborhood and a medical marijuana cultivation facility will absolutely not keep the integrity and harmonious characteristics of the properties and families who reside in this community.

At the public meeting that was conducted on 11/25 at the Cedar Hills Community Center the impacts to our neighborhood was discussed.

Roads – Non-maintained – no plan to mitigate against additional traffic - Our roads are primitive roads and not maintained by the county. Additional traffic on our roads will further deteriorate them and cause safety issues for the residents of the area.

We are located outside of a fire district so our residences do not have fire protection. If there were a serious fire at the proposed medical marijuana cultivation facility this could put my residence and other structures at risk. We do not have routine Sheriff patrols and the closest Sheriff's presence is St. Johns which is over 40 miles away. If there were a robbery of this facility our neighborhood could be at risk and the perpetrators would have no concern about an audible alarm or a panic button on the cultivation facility. I do not believe that a medical marijuana cultivation facility fits in this community and I believe that the existence of such a facility will diminish the property and land values for all the surrounding properties within this quiet residential community. I personally would not consider purchasing a property next to or nearby a marijuana cultivation facility. I believe that this would not be considered as asset to our community profile and does not fit in with the proposed Apache County Comprehensive Plan (see section 4.3.1 from Apache County Comprehensive Plan below). We live at 35 County Road N 9158, Cocho AZ (Laidback Way). This is just west of Mr. Young's property: tract 212-69-019-A. We own approximately forty (40) acres and this property is fenced and crossed fenced with improvements of electrical service, phone, sewer, water, outbuildings and a double-wide modular home. We put our brand on this piece of land with raised garden beds, berry bushes, fruit and regular shade trees, and of course, flower beds with blooms from early spring until late fall.

In the mornings our red heeler and two border collies run the fence line to make sure no jack rabbits or coyotes have crossed into forbidden territory and yet each afternoon a couple of roadrunners venture to the house and enjoy the seed and water left from the daily feeding of the wildbirds. This is our home and has been for over eight years. After working for twenty years at the US and Canadian border, a quiet and peaceful neighborhood just fit the bill.

A place where people married and divorced; where babies were born and loved ones died; where neighbors watch and strange vehicles are noticed; where the car broken down has many

offers for help, where the unfamiliar plume of smoke is checked to make sure a home or outbuilding isn't on fire. A place where people facing hard times are met with boxes of food, gasoline for a car, help with a bed-ridden family member.

This neighborhood had expanded with new people moving in and hoping to make this peaceful place theirs also. Lots of these new arrivals want to escape the frantic pace of life they left behind. Some find this is not what they really want and begin to try to make their new home more like the area they came from. This does not usually set well with those who have sacrificed much to live in this peaceful place.

To change the zoning to accommodate one man at the expense of many is unthinkable. To live in an area outside of a fire district; where emergency medical service has to be by helicopter; where law enforcement service can take days instead of hours; where the roads traveled to our homes are very primitive and resemble rabbit trails and are not maintained by the county; shows devotion to this way of life; to each other; and an unwillingness to allow a change in zoning to happen.

A zoning change will put a strain on existing electrical services; additional travel on poor roads by inconsiderate drivers; a raise in property taxes yet a drop in valuation of property; an increase in undesirables casing homes and property for stealable items; unsightly lights and fences and smells; and the prospect of private individuals, untrained, and armed to stand guard in this quiet, peaceful neighborhood.

Please do not deliver a slap in the face to these homeowners and voters to favor a man who seems to have no regard for existing laws as shown by his current indictment by the Navajo County Grand Jury.

MARIJUANA HEALTH BENEFITS

Marijuana has many known health benefits. And current research is revealing even more health benefits from marijuana.


Marijuana strains naturally contain chemicals called <u>cannabinoids</u>. Indicas, sativas, and hybrids vary in their composition of cannabinoids. The two primary cannabinoids in marijuana are delta 9-tetrahydrocannabinol (<u>THC</u>) and <u>Cannabidiol</u> (<u>CBD</u>). View graph (below) to see all cannabinoids in marijuana.

THC is the psychoactive chemical in marijuana that produces the euphoric effect known as a "high." It also helps relieve pain, stimulate appetite and suppress muscle spasms. CBD is known for its expansive resume of health benefits. Scientific studies have found CBD helps with reducing inflammation, nausea, pain, anxiety, and seizures, is antibacterial, and inhibits cancer cell growth, among more.

When consumed together, THC and CBD have been found to increase marijuana's efficacy while reducing adverse effects. CBD also works collectively with THC by boosting its health effects and moderating its psycho-activity. This means that marijuana with higher levels of CBD than THC will provide more medical benefits with less of a cognitive "high."

Generally, at dispensaries, THC levels in marijuana range from 10% – 30%, with 15% – 20% being the most common. CBD levels usually range from less than 1% to upwards of 5%. Marijuana strains with a high CBD content are still rare at Arizona dispensaries. But the demand for the medical benefits of CBD-rich marijuana, as well as for the purity of organically-grown marijuana, will lead to more dispensaries offering these unique strain options.

CBD can also be found in <u>tincture</u>, <u>pill</u>, and other forms. Most <u>Arizona</u> <u>dispensaries</u> carry CBD products.

\$142.19 million: The estimated size of the medical marijuana market in Arizona in 2014, according to the <u>ArcView Market Research</u> report, up from **\$35.37 million** last year. Arizona has a record 80 medical pot dispensaries currently open, with more expected to open this year, according to AZMarijuana.com.

In 1970, the US Congress placed marijuana in Schedule I of the Controlled Substances Act because they considered it to have "no accepted medical use." Since then, 23 of 50

US states and DC have legalized the medical use of marijuana.

Proponents of medical marijuana argue that it can be a safe and effective treatment for the symptoms of cancer, AIDS, multiple sclerosis, pain, glaucoma, epilepsy, and other conditions. They cite dozens of peer-reviewed studies, prominent medical organizations, major government reports, and the use of marijuana as medicine throughout world history.

Opponents of medical marijuana argue that it is too dangerous to use, lacks FDA-approval, and that various legal drugs make marijuana use unnecessary. They say marijuana is addictive, leads to harder drug use, interferes with fertility, impairs driving ability, and injures the lungs, immune system, and brain. They say that medical marijuana is a front for drug legalization and recreational use.





Percentage of Teen Marijuana Use in 10 States with Legal Medical Marijuana

Ten states had legalized medical marijuana by 2006; seven of those ten passed the laws between 1999 and 2006, the years for which the teen use data are available for all states.

Four of the seven states that passed medical marijuana laws between 1999 and 2006 had a decrease in average teen marijuana use the year after the law was passed. The other three states showed an increase the year after the law was passed. Six of the seven states had a lower percentage of teen use in 2006 than the year in which they legalized medical marijuana.

Eight of the ten states that had legalized medical marijuana as of 2006 had a lower percentage of teen use in 2006 than in 1999, while the other two ended with higher average teen use percentages in 2006 than in 1999.

The Marijuana Treatment Fallacy

One of the major points used by prohibitionists to sustain the costly war on drugs is the "increase in marijuana treatment". They are only considered for such options after they have proven to be a danger to themselves or others as opposed to marijuana, which mere possession forces you to make a choice between "treatment or jail".

How Cannabis Reduces Crime

Below are a few reasons as to why legalizing cannabis would actually reduce crime rates across the board.

A first review of your application finds the following concerns that need to be addressed. We are planning on having this item on the December meeting, but if you think there will be difficulty in obtaining any of this information, if you could let us know by Thursday noon so we can schedule this for the January meeting.

- 1) The MMJ Ordinance Section 2303 B 1. Requires a 1000 foot notification area around the property. It is likely you will need to add a few people to your notification and citizen review process.
- 2) Section 2303 B 2 Supplemental Application is a list of items that need to be included with the application. Item g on that list appears to be included therefore we would need items a-f.
- 3) Section 2303 B 3. A zone change is required. If you would fill out the zone change application we will combine it with this for a conditional rezoning. The application is at this link: http://www.co.apache.az.us/wp-content/uploads/2015/10/Zone-Change-Application.pdf
- 4) Section 2303 B 6 Permit Conditions. Note that these are conditions that the Board will add to the Conditional Rezoning along with other conditions that may arise as a result of the public hearings. While they do not necessarily have to be done ahead of time, these items will be required to be completed prior to opening the facility.
- 5) Drainage Study: The conditional use requires describing how drainage will be addressed. The only way to obtain that is to have an Engineer certify pre- and post-construction drainage. Then the determination can be made if manmade structures are required to meter the drainage off the property. This is a simple calculation done by showing the engineer your site plan and describing the changes to the property.
- 6) Finally, the State Health Dept. lists security and other measures that must be met. The one that affects the conditional use permit the most is the required ten-foot fence around the property with the one inch metal gate. This needs to be shown on the map.

These are the items that have come up at this point. If there are other things that arise, we will let you know. Again, if you think there are challenges to gathering this data, let us know so we can schedule this for January.

Supervisor Weller:

I am writing this email on behalf of Sheriff Dedman and Chief Deputy Eagar in regards to the Medical Marijuana Cultivation Ordinance for Apache County. As you know, I am the Commander of the Investigative Services Division, which includes the Apache County Cooperative Enforcement Narcotics Team. Since Medical Marijuana became law, ACCENT and its partners have dealt with the Arizona Medical Marijuana Law. It has been very taxing on resources because of how poorly the law was written.

In regards to this Ordinance, I hope that I will be included in any discussions regarding potential improvements to the current Ordinance for the County. I saw a proposed recommendation that was authored by you in regards to placement of cultivation sites within a 1/4 mile of any County or State maintained roadway. I agree with this recommendation. I also would like to suggest a few more recommendations. My recommendations are:

- 1. Cultivation sites should not be within 1/4 mile of a school, park, church, cemetery or established school bus stop.
- 2. Cultivation sites should not be placed in an area of the County that is predominantly residential area.
- 3. New cultivation sites should not be placed within 1/4 mile of an existing marijuana cultivation site. In regards to this recommendation, I do not know if this would take into account marijuana grows that are permissible under individual cardholder guidelines.

I believe that these recommendations would limit the potential locations of cultivation sites to areas within the county that would be better suited for businesses like this, without prohibiting them completely. If you have questions, I have provided you with my contact information.



While Title 11 of the Arizona Statutes broadly empowers Maricopa County to enact reasonable regulations addressing the public's safety, health and welfare, the Court finds that AMMA expressly limited those broad zoning powers when dealing with the Medical Marijuana Dispensaries. The AMMA states:

Cities, towns and counties may enact reasonable zoning regulations that limit the use of land for registered nonprofit medical marijuana dispensaries to specified areas in the manner provided in title 9, chapter 4, article 6.1, and title 11, chapter 6, article 2.²

See Ariz. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 36-2801.06 (2013 (emphasis added).3

Thus, the AMMA, by its very terms, limits the County's almost unfettered zoning authority. Under the express terms of the AMMA, the County's regulatory reach may not extend beyond its ability to ensure that the Dispensaries operate in "specified areas." *Id.* A County zoning ordinance that poses a categorical prohibition of Medical Marijuana violates State law that limits its zoning jurisdiction. *Id.*

The Court has tried to harmonize the Second Text Amendment with the AMMA's statutory limitation on the County's authority to zone Medical Marijuana Dispensaries. Compare Ariz. Rev. Stat. Ann. §§ 11-801 through 11-866 (2013) with Ariz. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 36-2801.06 (2013); see also Rotter v. Coconino County. The only way it could harmonize the two would be to interpret the ordinance's federal-compliance command as implicitly carving out an exception for a Medical Marijuana Dispensary. Toward that end, the Court has reviewed the history of the Second Text Amendment in order to see if that could be an appropriate interpretation.

On April 11, 2014, Judge Michael Gordon of the Maricopa County Superior Court granted White Mountain's request for nearly 100% of the attorney fees and costs it requested, after its lawyers successfully fought off the State of Arizona's and Maricopa County's claim that the Arizona Medical Marijuana Act ("AMMA") is preempted by federal law and the Controlled Substances Act. Federal law classifies marijuana as a narcotic drug with no legitimate medical use.

I am thrilled to say that the judge's decision will allow White Mountain to recoup over \$118,000.00 in attorney fees for almost 400 hours of legal work that I did for their Sun City, Arizona dispensary. In addition, the Arizona Court of Appeals recently denied Maricopa County Attorney Bill Montgomery's request for a "stay" (delay of the implementation) of Judge Gordon's decision to invalidate Mancopa County medical marijuana zoning ordinance, Article 1301.1.44 which limited medical marijuana dispensary locations to Heavy Industrial Zoning, where businesses like mining and slaughter houses are located. Certainly medical marijuana patients should not have to travel to undesirable locations, just to purchase medicine.

Judge Gordon also ruled that Maricopa County's medical marijuana zoning ordinance was unenforceable because it unduly limited patient access to medical manijuena in unincorporated Maricopa County. Pursuant to the AMMA, county, local and municipal governments can only enact "reasonable restrictions" upon medical marijuana facilities. Maricopa has recently enacted a new zoning ordinance that allows dispensaries in certain commercial zones, such as in "strip centers."

Judge Gordon leveled a scathing attack upon the factics employed by Maricopa County Aftomey Bill Montgomery and his staff. Among other things, Judge Gordon's ruling states that:

"It borders on the disingenuous" for the County to now argue that White Mountain had to pursue administrative remedies before filing the lawsuit because to do so would have been "futile and a waste of time."

"The County's opposition to White Mountain's request seeking a declaration Invalidating the County's AMMA zoning ordinance was clearly unjustified in light of this Court's adverse findings on the preemption [that the Court made in favor of White Mountain, in late 2013]. The Court therefore finds that the County defended that claim 'without substantial justification' and sanctions are warranted. See Ariz. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 12-349(A)(1) (2014). Additionally, the Court further finds sanctions are warranted because the County's defense of the zoning ordinance unreasonably expanded and delayed the proceedings. See Ariz. Rev. Stat. Ann. § 12-349(A)(3)

*The Court observes that White Mountain was forced to act as a private attorney general and defend the constitutionality of the AMMA. White Mountain, out of serendipity, was conscripted to defend the AMMA in order to require the County to comply with the AMMA. Forcing White Mountain to shoulder a significant share of the attorney's fees and costs, where it prevailed on all substantive issue is patently unfair. Absent White Mountain's willingness to defend the AMMA, the County's decision would have remained unchallenged. Moreover, the failure to award fees where, as here, they were predictably substantial, would discourage other parties who may find themselves in the same conundrum.

Examining the merits of the claims reveals that the County's claim of preemption was justified only upon complex preemption issues, that is, obstacle and physicalimpossibility preemption. The extensive research and analysis necessary to litigate these issues caused the fees to surge.

Moreover, the record reveals a relentless effort by the County to press its preemption theory after it should have resorted to its appellate remedies. As described supra, the County decision to defend the zoning ordinance was unjustified.

I also think it is unreasonable to require a applicant to rezone to meet the requirements of part of the ordinance you are making no longer a requirement. And that even if the applicants rezone is approved does not guarantee his CUP will be approved. That is real unreasonable.

It is my opinion that a very real violation of any applicant's rights attempting to meet the requirements of article 23 as drafted is a complete excess of law.

2300 Medical Marijuana Regulations

Section 2301. Definitions

- Medical Marijuana Designated Caregiver Cultivation Location—An enclosed facility, that does not exceed 250 square feet of cultivation space, where a designated caregiver, as defined by A.R.S. 36 2801(5), cultivates marijuana if the designated caregiver's registry identification card provides that the designated caregiver is authorized to cultivate marijuana. The location shall comply with the security requirements of A.R.S. Title 36, Chapter 28.1
- Medical Marijuana Dispensary A not-for-profit entity, defined in A.R.S.§ 36-2801(11), that acquires, possesses, cultivates, manufactures, delivers, transfers, transports, supplies, sells or dispenses marijuana or related supplies and educational materials to cardholders.
- Medical Marijuana Dispensary Offsite Cultivation Location The additional location where marijuana is cultivated by a medical marijuana dispensary as referenced in A.R.S.§36-2804(B)(1)(b)(ii).
- Medical Marijuana Qualifying Patient Cultivation Location—An enclosed facility, that does not exceed 50 square feet of cultivation space for each location, where a qualifying patient, as defined by A.R.S. 36-2801(13), cultivates marijuana if the qualifying patient's registry identification card states that the qualifying patient is authorized to cultivate marijuana. The qualifying patient cultivation location or designated caregiver cultivation location shall be located in the AG or any residential zone with an approved administrative use permit. Medical marijuana cultivation as an accessory use to the qualifying patient's primary residence must not be detectable from the exterior of the building in which the cultivation takes place. The qualifying patient cultivation location shall comply with the security requirements of A.R.S. Title 36, Chapter 28.1

Section 2302. Purpose and Application.

A. Purpose

- 1. The Arizona Medical Marijuana Act, A.R.S. 36-2806.01 allows counties to enact zoning regulation of medical marijuana dispensaries.
- 2. Nothing in this ordinance is intended to permit or assist in the violation of either the Federal Controlled Substances Act or the Arizona Controlled Substances Act.
- 3. This ordinance will allow for the use of property as a medical marijuana dispensary or an affiliated medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location.

Adopted May 3, 2011 by Apache County Board of Supervisors <u>Oraft for P & Z Commission December 2015</u>

B. Application

Medical Marijuana Dispensary and Medical Marijuana Dispensary Offsite Cultivation
 Location shall only be located in a C2 (General Commercial) or AG Zone with an
 approved Conditional Use Permit following this section. The qualifying patient
 cultivation location or designated caregiver cultivation location shall be located in the AG
 or any residential zone-that is located at least twenty-five (25) miles from a Medical
 Marijuana Dispensary with an approved administrative use permit.

Section 2303. Conditional Uses.

- A. Medical Marijuana Dispensary. As long as the Arizona Revised Statutes remain in full force and effect to allow medical marijuana dispensaries, a medical marijuana dispensary is permitted as a conditional use subject to the following conditions:
 - 1. Minimum Notification Area. The minimum notification area for a conditional use permit for a medical marijuana dispensary is 1,000 feet.
 - 2. An applicant for a conditional use permit for a medical marijuana dispensary must complete an application that includes all of the following information:
 - a. If the application is by an agent for the owner the authorization must include an explicit acknowledgment from the owner that the owner knows that the proposed use of the property is as a medical marijuana dispensary.
 - b. The legal name of the medical marijuana dispensary.
 - c. The name address and date of birth of each principal officer and board member of the nonprofit medical marijuana dispensary and the name, address, and date of birth of each medical marijuana dispensary agent.
 - d. A copy of the operating procedures adopted in compliance with A.R.S. §36-2804(B)(1)(c).
 - e. A notarized certification that none of the principal officers or board members has been convicted of one of the following offenses:
 - i. A violent crime as defined in A.R.S. § 13-901.03(B) that was classified as a felony in the jurisdiction where the person was convicted;
 - ii. A violation of state or federal controlled substance law that was classified as a felony in the jurisdiction where the person was convicted including an offense for which the sentence, any term of probation, incarceration or supervised release, was completed within the 10 years prior to applying for the application for the dispensary or an offense involving conduct that would be immune from arrest, prosecution or penalty

under A.R.S. §36-2811 except that the conduct occurred before the effective date of that statute or was prosecuted by an authority other than the State of Arizona.

- f. A notarized certification that none of the principal officers or board members has served as a principal officer or board member for a registered nonprofit medical marijuana dispensary that has had its registration certificate revoked.
- g. A floor plan showing the location, dimensions and type of security measures demonstrating that the medical marijuana dispensary will meet the definition of enclosed locked facility contained in A.R.S.§36-2801(6) and will be conducted completely within an enclosed, locked building.
- 3. Permitted Location: A medical marijuana dispensary is only permitted in the C-2 (General Business) zone.
- 4. Community Impacts. The Board may or may not approve a medical marijuana dispensary at a site if substantial evidence is presented that locating the dispensary at the proposed site will negatively impact neighboring property values or if substantial evidence is presented that shows that locating the dispensary at the proposed site will create an unreasonable risk to the health, safety or general welfare in the area.
- 5. Development Standards.
 - A medical marijuana dispensary must be located in a permanent building and may not be located in a trailer, cargo container or motor vehicle.
 - A medical marijuana dispensary shall be setback a minimum of 25 miles from all other medical marijuana dispensaries measured from the parcel boundaries;
 - c. A medical marijuana dispensary shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from schools, community service agency, activity facility, and or activity where children may be enrolled, measured from the parcel boundaries.
 - d. A medical marijuana dispensary shall be setback a minimum of 2,500feet from a childcare center, measured from the parcel boundaries.
 - e. A medical marijuana dispensary shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a library or public park.
 - f. A medical marijuana dispensary shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a church.
 - g. A medical marijuana dispensary shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a residential substance abuse diagnostic and treatment facility or other drug or alcohol rehabilitation facility.
 - h. A medical marijuana dispensary may not have a drive-through service.

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- i. A medical marijuana dispensary may not have outdoor seating areas.
- The maximum floor area of a medical marijuana dispensary is 2,000 square feet finished floor area.
- k. The secure storage area for the medical marijuana stored at the medical marijuana dispensary shall not exceed 400 square feet finished floor area.
- The permitted hours of operation of a medical marijuana dispensary are between the hours of 9:00a.m. and 5:00p.m. daily.
- 6. Permit Conditions. The Board may include any conditions it finds necessary to conserve and promote the public health, safety, convenience, and general welfare. The board must include the following permit conditions for issuance of the conditional use permit for a medical marijuana dispensary:
 - a. An expiration date for the conditional use permit that requires re-application or renewal
 of the permit after three years or less.
 - A requirement that the medical marijuana dispensary meets security requirements adopted by the Arizona Department of Health Services.
 - c. A requirement that the storage facilities for the medical marijuana stored or grown at the off-site cultivation location prevent the emission of dust, fumes, vapors or odors into the environment.
 - d. A requirement that the owner secure a certification from the State Fire Marshall or from another acceptable entity responsible for fire safety in the area in which the medical marijuana dispensary is to be located stating that the structure complies with all fire code requirements and supply that certification to the Development Services Department.
 - A prohibition on the medical marijuana dispensary offering a service that provides offsite delivery of the medical marijuana.
 - f. A requirement that the medical marijuana dispensary is prohibited from permitting anyone to consume marijuana on the premises.
- 7. Enforcement. The provisions of this subsection may be enforced through the use of the civil penalty procedure provided for by Section 2.160.140 or by injunction or other civil proceeding as provided by A.R.S §11-808(H). Notwithstanding any other provision of this code, this subsection shall not be enforced under A.R.S §11-808(C) as a misdemeanor.
- 8. Fees. The fees shall be set from time to time by the Board of Supervisors.

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- B. Medical Marijuana Dispensary Off-Site Cultivation Location: As long as the laws within the Arizona Revised Statutes remain in full force and effect to allow medical marijuana dispensaries, a medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location is permitted as a conditional use subject to the following conditions:
 - Minimum Notification Area. The minimum notification area for a conditional use permit for a medical marijuana dispensary is 1000 feet.
 - Supplemental Application. In addition to the application required by Article 11, an applicant for a conditional use permit for a medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall complete an application that includes all of the following information.
 - a. If the application is by an agent for the owner the authorization must include an explicit acknowledgment from the owner that the owner knows that the proposed use of the property is as a medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location.
 - b. The legal name and address of the affiliated medical marijuana dispensary.
 - c. The name address and date of birth of each principal officer and board member of the medical marijuana dispensary affiliated with the off-site cultivation location and the name, address, and date of birth of each medical marijuana dispensary agent.
 - d. A copy of the operating procedures adopted in compliance with A.R.S. §36-2804(B)(1)(c).
 - e. A notarized certification that none of the principal officers or board members for the medical marijuana dispensary affiliated with the off-site cultivation location has been convicted of one of the following offenses:
 - A violent crime as defined in A.R.S. § 13-901.03(B) that was classified as a felony in the jurisdiction where the person was convicted;
 - 2) A violation of state or federal controlled substance law that was classified as a felony in the jurisdiction where the person was convicted except an offense for which the sentence, including any term of probation, incarceration or supervised release, was completed ten or more years earlier or an offense involving conduct that would be immune from arrest, prosecution or penalty under A.R.S. §36-2811 except that the conduct occurred before the effective date of that statute or was prosecuted by an authority other than the state of Arizona.
 - f. A notarized certification that none of the principal officers or board members for the medical marijuana dispensary affiliated with the off-site cultivation location has served as a principal officer or board member for a registered nonprofit medical marijuana dispensary that has had its registration certificate revoked.
 - g. A floor plan showing the location, dimensions of and type of security measures demonstrating that the medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location will be

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conducted completely within an enclosed locked building and meet the definition of enclosed locked facility contained in A.R.S.§36-2801(6).

- 3. Permitted Location: A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location is only permitted in the C-2 (General Business) zone or an AG (Agricultural General) zone.
- 4. Community Impacts. The Board may not approve a medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location on a property if substantial evidence is presented that locating the cultivation location at the proposed site will negatively impact neighboring property values or if substantial evidence is presented that shows that locating the cultivation location at the proposed site will create an unreasonable risk to the health, safety or general welfare in the area.
- 5. Development Standards.
 - a. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location must be located in a
 permanent building and may not be located in a trailer, cargo container or motor vehicle.
 - A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from all other medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation locations measured from the parcel boundaries;
 - c. A medical marijuana dispensary shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from schools, community service agency, activity facility, and or activity where children may be enrolled, measured from the parcel boundaries.
 - d. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a childcare center.
 - e. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a library or public park.
 - f. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a church.
 - g. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a residential substance abuse diagnostic and treatment facility or other drug or alcohol rehabilitation facility.
 - A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location may not have outdoor scating areas.
 - The maximum floor area of a medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location is 2,000 square feet finished floor area.

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- The secure storage area for the medical marijuana stored at the medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall not exceed 1,000 square feet finished floor area.
- k. Must have a legible copy of a valid Medical Marijuana Dispensary Agent Registry Identification Card, the original of which is issued by the State of Arizona, plainly displayed inside of the doorway at all times.
- Must have the address of the Medical Marijuana Dispensary that the Off-site Cultivation Location supplies plainly displayed inside of the doorway at all times.
- 6. Permit Conditions. The Board may include any conditions it finds necessary to conserve and promote the public health, safety, convenience and general welfare. The board must include the following permit conditions for issuance of the conditional use permit for a medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location:
 - a. An expiration date for the conditional use permit that requires re-application or renewal of the permit after two years or less.
 - A requirement that the medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location meets security requirements adopted by the Arizona Department of Health Services.
 - c. A requirement that the storage facilities for the medical marijuana stored or grown on site prevent the emission of dust, fumes, vapors, or odors into the environment.
 - d. A requirement that the owner secure a certification from the State Fire Marshall or from another acceptable entity responsible for fire safety in the area in which the medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location is to be located stating that the structure complies with all fire code requirements and supply a copy of that certification to the Community Development Department.
 - A requirement that the medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location is prohibited from permitting anyone to consume marijuana on the premises.
- 7. Enforcement. The provisions of this subsection may be enforced through the use of the civil penalty procedure provided for by Section or 2.160.140 or by injunction or other civil proceeding as provided by A.R.S §11-808(H). Notwithstanding any other provision of this code, this subsection shall not be enforced under A.R.S §11-808(C) as a misdemeanor.
- 8. Fees. The fees shall be set from time to time by the Board of Supervisors.

Section 2304. Non Dispensary Cultivation

A. Special Conditions for Non-Dispensary Cultivation.

1. Medical Marijuana Cultivation Location for a Registered Qualifying Patient:

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- a. Allowed as an accessory to a primary-residence
- b. Must be conducted in a completely enclosed, locked building
- Must have a legible copy of a valid Medical Marijuana Registry Qualifying Patient Identification Card, the original of which is issued by the State of Arizona, plainly displayed inside of the doorway.
- d. The qualified patient cultivation must be at least 25 miles from a medical marijuana dispensary.
- e. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location must be located in a permanent building and may not be located in a trailer, cargo container, or motor vehicle.
- f. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation-location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from all other-medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation locations measured from the parcel boundaries;
- g. A medical marijuuna dispensary shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from schools, community service agency, activity facility, and or activity where children may be enrolled, measured from the parcel boundaries.
- h. A medical marijuana dispensary off site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a childcare center.
- i. A medical marijuana dispensary off site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a library or public park.
- j. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site-cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a church.
- k.—A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a residential substance abuse diagnostic and treatment facility or other drug or alcohol rehabilitation facility.
- 1. The fees shall be set from time to time by the Board of Supervisors.
- 2. Medical Marijuana Cultivation Location for a-Registered-Designated Caregiver:
 - a. Allowed as an accessory to a primary residence
 - b. Must be conducted in a completely enclosed, locked building
 - e. Must have a legible copy of a valid-Medical Marijuana Registry Designated Caregiver Identification Card, the original of which is issued by the State of Arizona, plainly displayed inside of the doorway.

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- d. Must be for qualified patients who live at least 25 miles from a medical marijuana dispensary.
- e. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location must be located in a permanent building and may not be located in a trailer, cargo container or motor vehicle.
- f. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from all other medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation locations measured from the parcel boundaries:
- g. A medical marijuana dispensary shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from schools, community service agency, activity facility, and or activity where children may be enrolled, measured from the parcel boundaries.
- h. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a childcare center.
- A medical marijuana dispensary off site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a library or public park.
- j. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a church.
- k. A medical marijuana dispensary off-site cultivation location shall be setback a minimum of 2,500 feet from a residential substance abuse diagnostic and treatment facility or other drug or alcohol rehabilitation facility.
- I. Fees. The fees shall be set from time to time by the Board of Supervisors.

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE APACHE COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MEETING

February 2, 2016 Ganado, Arizona

Present were: Chairman Joe Shirley, Jr., and Vice Chairman Tom M. White Jr. Also present, County Manager/Clerk of the Board Delwin Wengert and County Attorney Michael Whiting. Supervisor Barry Weller participated via the telephone from St. Johns.

Chairman Shirley called to order the Board of Supervisors meeting at 8:35 a.m. in the Ganado Road Yard Conference Room, Highway 264 Mile Marker 446.8, Ganado, Arizona and welcomed all in attendance.

Ferrin Crosby led the Pledge of Allegiance. Kirk Arviso gave the invocation.

Chris Sexton, Health District Director, requested approval of the amendment to the contract with Stericycle which will reduce medical waste pick-up and disposal to twice a year, effective January 1, 2016 and was budgeted for FY2016. **Mr. White moved approval, seconded by Mr. Weller.** Vote was unanimous.

Chris Sexton, Health District Director, requested approval of the service agreement with Banner Health (dba ENTECH) effective January 1, 2016 for maintenance, calibration and repair service of medical equipment used in the Health District which was budgeted for FY15/16. Request authorization to purchase at Richey Brothers Auction on February 9, 2016 a dump truck and a water truck for District I at a cost not to exceed \$85,000 each, using District I carryover funds. Motion passed 2-0 with Mr. Weller abstaining.

Mr. Weller stated regarding Consent Item E, he pulled the item because of some emails he saw regarding the request for approval of a Conditional Use Permit to allow Steve Horsman to add a guest house on a 36.5 acre parcel adjacent to an existing house structure at Lakeview Ranch II Lot #99, located near Concho, parcel 201-60-099 with the Planning and Zoning Commission voting unanimous approval. Mr. Weller stated there are members of the public who want to speak on this issue.

George Walsh, a resident of Vernon, Arizona stated he does not have any opposition to the item; he opposes the item being heard with the meeting being held in Ganado where he can't face all of the Board members. Mr. Walsh stated the meeting is being held in an area where there are not any people who want to serve as commissioners on the Planning and Zoning Commission. Mr. Walsh stated the zoning does not affect the area the meeting is being held in and asked the item be pulled since state law requires it be pulled when there is a request for a public hearing. Mr. Walsh stated he sent an email and asked if all three supervisors had received a copy because if not, the Community Development Director and the County Attorney have withheld information that he asked be forwarded.

Mr. Weller stated he received nothing from Mr. Walsh through the Community Development Department and is not sure if the other two supervisors received what he is talking about. Mr. Weller stated he has been in communication relative to Mr. Walsh's concerns and stated and he thinks there is an appropriate objection to this being heard and disagrees with some of the County Attorney's positons so he will be abstaining from the cote though he is not necessarily against the two items it is just the process and the disrespect for the objection that took place. Mr. Ollerton stated the email from Mr. Walsh was forwarded to Mr. Weller this morning and also brought copies for the other two supervisors. Mr. Ollerton stated the Zoning Ordinance section 1107, it outlines how a conditional use permit should be heard before the Board of Supervisor. The ordinance stated that any person who desires to file an objection or appeal on an item has 15 days after the Planning and Zoning Commission has taken action for a recommendation to the Board, a person has 15 days to turn in an objections and the letter from Mr. Walsh was not received within that 15 day period; it was received after, so he sees no reason to not move forward and continue to hear the items.

Mr. Whiting stated in regard to the email, the County Attorney's Office revived them and advised the Community Development Department just as Mr. Ollerton stated; an email was sent to Mr. Weller outlining the concerns which were addressed and the recommendation of the County Attorney's Office is to proceed.

Mr. Weller asked Mr. Whiting if the statute mentions no timeline or time limitation and the County Ordinance is being sited and appears to reflect a limitation on the objection and asked if state statute overrides county statute. Mr. Whiting responded there is no conflict. Mr. Weller

stated that was not what he asked; he asked if state statute overrides county statutes. Mr. Whiting responded the same answer.

Mr. White stated every time a meeting is held in Ganado or Chinle there are always individuals that object, saying it is not legal but the way the statutes reads, a meeting can be held anywhere and items put before the Board will be considered by the Board. Mr. White moved to approve Item E, the Conditional Use Permit for Mr. Horsman. Mr. Weller stated for the sake of discussion, seconded the motion. Mr. Weller stated he wanted to clarify he heard no statement here about any illegality or inappropriateness of having meetings on the Navajo Nation, that is a separate subject, the items have to do with an objection and if that objection was appropriate or not and has nothing to do if whether there was a legal ability to be heard on the Navajo Nation. Motion passed 2-0 with Mr. Weller abstained.

Chairman Shirley asked if there was a motion to approve Item F., a Conditional Use Permit allowing Concord Blue Eagar, LLC, to construct and operate a renewable biomass power plant and biochar production facility on an 11.95 acre lot portion of the Eagar Industrial Site located near Eagar, Arizona, on portion of parcel 103-10-013B ad 103-10-012A and has unanimous approval by the Planning and Zoning Commission. Mr. White moved to approve. Mr. Weller seconded the motion.

George Walsh, a resident of Vernon, read from statute and stated he believes the County Attorney's opinion is bogus. Mr. Ollerton stated the zoning ordinance recognizes a specific statute and allows for an appeal of a conditional use permit. Mr. Ollerton stated the County had the opportunity to place a time limit of 15 days through the zoning ordinance. Mr. Ollerton stated the ordinance has been in place for many years and followed state statute when it was created and believes this is accurate.

Mr. Whiting stated he concurs with Mr. Ollerton and just like the same issue as on the last item, the County Attorney's Office has issued an opinion and he is sorry Mr. Walsh does not agree; though he fancies himself an attorney, but he is not one. Mr. Whiting stated the item is legal and the Board can take action if they so choose. Mr. Motion passed 2-0 with Mr. Weller abstaining.

Malena Bazurto, Grants Manager, requested approval of a Crew Use Agreement between Arizona State Forestry and Apache County for work to be performed by an inmate crew under the existing Agreement #WFHF-14-205 for fuels reduction in the Tai Wi Wi Subdivision in Alpine, at a not to exceed cost of \$6,000. Mr. Weller moved approval, seconded by Mr. White. Vote was unanimous.

R.D. Stradling, Building & Maintenance Director, requested approval to increase the salaries for the following individuals: Lanny Sherrill, Facilities & Construction Worker III, 12.5 years of service, current salary \$34,902 – midpoint is \$36,706, proposed increase \$2,000. Johnny Chavez, Facilities & Construction Worker II, 9.83 years of service, current salary \$24,704 – midpoint is \$30,880, proposed increase \$2,500. Mr. White moved approval. Mr. Weller seconded the motion for the sake of discussion. Mr. Weller stated his comments do not reflect the good work these employees do and they probably deserve the funds but in the past three months the people who voted in favor, approved over \$103,000 in increases that were not in

the budget, without any discussion on how this would be paid for and that amount exceeds what a levy limit would allow us each year. Mr. Weller stated this affects the special district taxing and there has been no discussion on how to pay for these raises and that concerns him. Mr. Wengert stated the raises have occurred within the current budget and departments are not increasing their budget to give the raises; only using their existing budget that the Board approved last July. Mr. Wengert stated the actual amount that were given in raises in this fiscal year is about \$36,000 in HURF for Districts I, II, & III, and about \$40,000 from the general fund. Mr. Weller stated \$16,900 in raises were given to District I Roads, \$16,269 for Distinct II, County Attorney was given \$26,000 in raises this year, Community Development was given \$3,000, Engineering was given nearly \$6,000, Finance was given over \$6,000, Grants Department was given \$3,000, School Superintendent's Office was given \$6,000 District III Roads was given \$11,000, Health District was given over \$2,000 and now the Maintenance Department is wanting to give \$5,400. Mr. Weller stated that is well over the \$76,000 that Mr. Wengert referenced. Motion passed 2-1 with Mr. Weller voting nay.

There was no one wanting to address the Board during call to the public.

Mr. White moved to adjourn, seconded by Mr. Weller. Vote was unanimous.

County"). The State and the County are collectively referred to as "Parties."	(

I. RECITALS

- 1. The State is empowered by Arizona Revised Statutes § 28-401 to enter into this Agreement and has delegated to the undersigned the authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of the State.
- 2. The County is empowered by Arizona Revised Statutes § 11-251 to enter into this Agreement and has by resolution, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof, resolved to enter into this Agreement and has authorized the undersigned to execute this Agreement on behalf of the County.
- 3. The work proposed under this Agreement, hereinafter referred to as the "Project", consists of three (3) inch asphaltic concrete overlay, incidental pavement leveling and shoulder work for approximately three (3) miles on Stanford Road from US 60 to Resa Ranch Road. The State will advertise, bid, award and administer the scoping, design and construction of the Project. The plans, estimates and specifications for the Project will be prepared and, as required, submitted to Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) for approval.
- 4. The County, in order to obtain federal funds for the design and/or construction of the Project, is willing to provide County funds to match federal funds in the ratio required or as finally fixed and determined by the County and FHWA.
- 5. The interest of the State in this Project is the acquisition of federal funds for the use and benefit of the County and the authorization of such federal funds for the Project pursuant to federal law and regulations. The State shall be the designated agent for the County for the Project, if the Project is approved by FHWA and funds for the Project are available. The Project will be performed, completed, accepted and paid for in accordance with the requirements of the Project specifications and terms and conditions.

- 6. The Parties will perform their responsibilities consistent with this Agreement; any change or modification to the Project will only occur with the mutual written consent of both Parties.
- 7. The federal funds will be used for the scoping/design and construction of the Project, including the construction engineering and administration cost (CE). The estimated Project costs are as follows:

The Parties acknowledge that the final Project costs may exceed the initial estimate(s) shown above, and in such case, the County is responsible for, and agrees to pay, any and all actual costs exceeding the initial estimate. If the final bid amount is less than the initial estimate, the difference between the final bid amount and the initial estimate will be de-obligated or otherwise released from the Project. The County acknowledges it remains responsible for, and agrees to pay according to the terms of this Agreement, any and all actual costs exceeding the final bid amount.

THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual Agreements expressed herein, it is agreed as follows:

II. SCOPE OF WORK

- 1. The State will:
- a. Upon execution of this Agreement, be the designated agent for the County for the Project, if the Project is approved by FHWA and funds for the Project are available.
- b. Upon execution of this Agreement, prior to performing or authorizing any work, invoice the County for the County's share of the Project design costs, currently estimated at \$11,682.00. If PMDR costs increase during the development of design, invoice the County in increments of \$5,000.00 to cover additional PMDR costs. Once the costs have been finalized, the State will either invoice or reimburse the County for the difference between estimated and actual PMDR and design costs.
- c. Upon receipt of the County's estimated share of the Project design costs, on behalf of the County, prepare and provide all documents pertaining to the design and post-design of the Project, incorporating comments from the County, as appropriate; and review and approve documents required

by FHWA to qualify the Project for and to receive federal funds. Such work may consist of, but is not specifically limited to, preparation of environmental documents; analysis and documentation of environmental categorical exclusion determinations; geologic materials testing and analysis; right-of-way related activities; preparation of reports, design plans, maps, specifications and cost estimates; and such other related tasks essential to the achievement of the objectives of this Agreement.

- d. Submit all required documentation pertaining to the Project to FHWA with the recommendation that the maximum federal funds programmed for this Project be approved for scoping/design. Upon authorization, proceed to advertise for and enter into contract(s) with the consultant(s) for the design and post design of the Project.
- e. Upon completion of design and prior to bid advertisement, invoice the County for the County 's share of the Project construction costs, estimated at \$39,719.00. Once the Project costs have been finalized, the State will either invoice or reimburse the County for the difference between estimated and actual costs; and de-obligate or otherwise release any remaining federal funds from the scoping/design phase of the Project.
- f. Upon receipt of the County's estimated share of the Project construction costs, submit all documentation required to FHWA with the recommendation that funding be approved for construction and request the maximum federal funds programmed for the construction of this Project. Should costs exceed the maximum federal funds available, it is understood and agreed that the County will be responsible for any overage.
- g. Upon FHWA authorization, proceed to administer construction, advertise for, receive and open bids, award and enter into a contract(s) with a firm(s) for the construction of the Project. If the bid amounts exceed the construction cost estimate, obtain County concurrence prior to awarding the contract.
- h. Be granted, without cost requirements, the right to enter County right-of-way as required to conduct any and all construction and pre-construction related activities for said Project, including without limitation, temporary construction easements or temporary rights of entry on to and over said rights-of-way of the County.
- i. Enter into an agreement with the design consultant which states that the design consultant shall provide professional post-design services as required and requested throughout and upon completion of the construction phase of the Project. Upon completion of the construction phase of the Project, provide an electronic version of the record drawings to the County.
- j. Notify the County that the Project has been completed and is considered acceptable, coordinating with the County as appropriate to turn over full responsibility of the Project improvements. De-obligate or otherwise release any remaining federal funds from the construction phase of the Project within ninety (90) days of final acceptance.
- k. Not be obligated to maintain said Project, should the County fail to budget or provide for proper and perpetual maintenance as set forth in this Agreement.

2. The County will:

- a. Upon execution of this Agreement, designate the State as authorized agent for the County for the Project if the Project is approved by FHWA and funds for the Project are available.
- b. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of an invoice from the State pay the County's Project design costs, estimated at \$11,682.00. If, during the development of the design, additional funding to cover

PMDR costs is required, pay the invoiced amount to the State within thirty (30) days of receipt. Be responsible for any difference between the estimated and actual PMDR and design costs of the Project.

- c. Review design plans, specifications, cost estimates and other such documents required for the construction bidding and construction of the Project, including scoping/design plans and documents required by FHWA to qualify projects for and to receive federal funds; provide design review comments to the State as appropriate.
- d. Upon completion of design, within thirty (30) days of receipt of an invoice from the State and prior to bid advertisement, pay to the State, the County's Project construction costs, estimated at \$39,719.00. Once the Project costs have been finalized, the State will either invoice or reimburse the County for the difference between estimated and actual costs.
- e. Be responsible for all costs incurred in performing and accomplishing the work as set forth under this Agreement, that are not covered by federal funding. Should costs be deemed ineligible or exceed the maximum federal funds available, it is understood and agreed that the County is responsible for these costs, payment for these costs shall be made within thirty (30) days of receipt of an invoice from the State.
- f. Certify that all necessary rights-of-way have been or will be acquired prior to advertisement for bid and that all obstructions or unauthorized encroachments of any nature, either above or below the surface of the Project area, shall be removed from the proposed right-of-way or will be removed prior to the start of construction, in accordance with The Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 as amended; 49 CFR 24.102 Basic Acquisition Policies; 49 CFR 24.4 Assurances, Monitoring and Corrective Action, parts (a) & (b) and ADOT ROW Manual: 8.02 Responsibilities, 8.03 Prime Functions, 9.06 Monitoring Process and 9.07 Certification of Compliance. Coordinate with the appropriate State's Right-of-Way personnel during any right-of-way process performed by the County, if applicable.
- g. Not permit or allow any encroachments upon or private use of the right-of-way, except those authorized by permit. In the event of any unauthorized encroachment or improper use, the County shall take all necessary steps to remove or prevent any such encroachment or use.
- h. Grant the State, its agents and/or contractors, without cost, the right to enter County rights-of-way, as required, to conduct any and all construction and preconstruction related activities, including without limitation, temporary construction easements or temporary rights of entry to accomplish among other things, soil and foundation investigations.
- i. Be obligated to incur any expenditure should unforeseen conditions or circumstances increase Project costs. Be Responsible for the cost of any requested changes to the scope of work of the Project, such changes will require State and FHWA approval. Be responsible for any contractor claims for additional compensation caused by Project delay attributable to the County. Payment for these costs will be made to the State within 30 days of receipt of an invoice from the State.
- j. Upon notification by the State of Project completion, agree to accept, maintain and assume full responsibility of the Project in writing.
- k. Pursuant to 23 USC 102(b), repay all federal funds reimbursements for preliminary engineering costs on the Project if it does not advance to right-of-way acquisition or construction within ten (10) years after federal funds were first made available.

III. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 1. The terms, conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect until completion of said Project and related deposits or reimbursement, except any provisions for maintenance shall be perpetual, unless assumed by another competent entity. This Agreement may be cancelled at any time prior to the award of the Project construction contract, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party. It is understood and agreed that, in the event the County terminates this Agreement, the County will be responsible for all costs incurred by the State up to the time of termination. It is further understood and agreed that in the event the County terminates this Agreement, the State shall not be obligated to complete and/or maintain the Project.
- 2. The State assumes no financial obligation or liability under this Agreement, or for any resulting construction Project. The County, in regard to the County 's relationship with the State only, assumes full responsibility for the design, plans, specifications, reports, the engineering in connection therewith and the construction of the improvements contemplated, cost over-runs and construction claims. It is understood and agreed that the State's participation is confined solely to securing federal aid on behalf of the County and the fulfillment of any other responsibilities of the State as specifically set forth herein; that any damages arising from carrying out, in any respect, the terms of this Agreement or any modification thereof shall be solely the liability of the County and that to the extent permitted by law, the County hereby agrees to save and hold harmless, defend and indemnify from loss the State, any of its departments, agencies, officers or employees from any and all liability, costs and/or damage incurred by any of the above arising or resulting from this Agreement; and from any other liability, damage to any person or property whatsoever, which is caused by any activity, condition, misrepresentation, directives, instruction or event arising out of the performance or non-performance of any provisions of this Agreement by the State, any of its departments, agencies, officers and employees, or its independent contractors, the County, any of its agents, officers and employees, or its independent contractors. Costs incurred by the State, any of its departments, agencies, officers or employees shall include in the event of any action, court costs, and expenses of litigation and attorneys' fees.
- 3. The cost of scoping, design, construction and construction engineering work under this Agreement is to be covered by the maximum available amount of federal funds programmed for this Project. The County acknowledges that the actual costs may exceed the maximum available amount of federal funds, or that certain costs may not be accepted by the federal government as eligible for federal funds. Therefore, the County agrees to pay the difference between actual Project costs and the federal funds received.
- 4. Should the federal funding related to this Project be terminated or reduced by the federal government, or Congress rescinds, fails to renew, or otherwise reduces apportionments or obligation authority, the State shall in no way be obligated for funding or liable for any past, current or future expenses under this Agreement.
- 5. The cost of the Project under this Agreement includes indirect costs approved by FHWA, as applicable.
- 6. The Parties warrant compliance with the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act of 2006 and associated 2008 Amendments (the "Act"). Additionally, in a timely manner, the County will provide information that is requested by the State to enable the State to comply with the requirements of the Act, as may be applicable.
- 7. The County acknowledges compliance with federal laws and regulations and may be subject to the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), Single Audit, Circular A-133 (Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations). Entities that expend \$500,000.00 or more (prior to 12/26/14) and \$750,000.00 or more (on or after 12/26/14) of federal assistance (federal funds, federal grants, or federal awards) are required to comply by having an independent audit. Either an electronic or hardcopy of the Single Audit is to be sent to Arizona Department of Transportation Financial Management Services within the required deadline of nine (9) months of the sub recipient fiscal year end.

- 8. This Agreement shall become effective upon signing and dating of the Determination Letter by the State's Attorney General.
 - 9. This Agreement may be cancelled in accordance with Arizona Revised Statutes § 38-511.
- 10. To the extent applicable under law, the provisions set forth in Arizona Revised Statutes §§ 35-214 and 35-215 shall apply to this Agreement.
- 11. This Agreement is subject to all applicable provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act (Public Law 101-336, 42 U.S.C. 12101-12213) and all applicable federal regulations under the Act, including 28 CFR Parts 35 and 36. The parties to this Agreement shall comply with Executive Order Number 2009-09 issued by the Governor of the State of Arizona and incorporated herein by reference regarding "Non-Discrimination".
- 12. Non-Availability of Funds: Every obligation of the State under this Agreement is conditioned upon the availability of funds appropriated or allocated for the fulfillment of such obligations. If funds are not allocated and available for the continuance of this Agreement, this Agreement may be terminated by the State at the end of the period for which the funds are available. No liability shall accrue to the State in the event this provision is exercised, and the State shall not be obligated or liable for any future payments as a result of termination under this paragraph.
- 13. In the event of any controversy, which may arise out of this Agreement, the Parties hereto agree to abide by required arbitration as is set forth for public works contracts in Arizona Revised Statutes § 12-1518.
 - 14. The Parties shall comply with the applicable requirements of Arizona Revised Statutes § 41-4401.
- 15. The Parties hereto shall comply with all applicable laws, rules, regulations and ordinances, as may be amended.

Awards may be supplemented by other federal, state, local, and private funds. Subrecipient's agreement or amended agreement(s) is incorporated by reference into this Subgrant Award Agreement.

This award is subject to agreement by the subrecipient, including any DPS VOCA funded positions and their immediate supervisors, to conform to the provisions of the Victims of Crime Act of 1984; the DPS VOCA victim assistance grant program guidelines; the subrecipient's application; the attached general conditions and applicable special conditions; the most recent version of the Office of Justice Programs Financial Guide; OMB circulars A-21, A-87, A-102, A-110, A-122, A-133; Executive Order 12372; and 28 CFR pts. 66 and 70, all of which are incorporated by reference as if fully stated herein.

- 1.7 "DPS" means the Arizona Department of Public Safety.
- 1.8 "Grant" means the furnishing of financial or other assistance, including state or federal grant funds, by the Department of Public Safety to any person for the purpose of supporting or stimulating educational, cultural, social or economic quality of life.

- 3.7 Research or statistical information. The subrecipient shall not use or reveal any research or statistical information under this project that is identifiable to any specific person except for the purpose for which the information was obtained, in accordance with VOCA.
- 3.8 Site inspections. The continuance of the subrecipient's subgrant award agreement is contingent upon successful completion of random or for-cause inspections. Failure to satisfactorily comply with Required Action items identified during the site inspection can result in termination of the subgrant award agreement.
- 3.9 <u>Audit requirements.</u> The subrecipient shall comply with the audit requirements of Title 2 F.F.R. Subrecipients that are local nonprofit affiliates of Arizona or national nonprofits should have available proof of (1), (2) or (3), and a statement by the Arizona or national parent organization that the subrecipient is a local nonprofit affiliate.
- 3.12 Potential fraud, waste, abuse or misconduct. The subrecipient shall promptly notify DPS in writing of any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, contractor, subcontractor, or other person has either 1) submitted a false claim for grant funds under the False Claims Act; or 2) committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving award funds.
 - No subrecipient under this award may require any employee or contractor to sign an internal confidentiality agreement or statement that prohibits or otherwise restricts, or purports to prohibit or restrict, the reporting (in accordance with law) of waste, fraud, or abuse to an investigative or law enforcement representative of a federal department or agency authorized to receive such information. The foregoing is not intended to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.
- Prohibited activities. The following activities are prohibited under this subgrant award agreement:

 1. New construction. 2. Any renovation or remodeling of a property either (a) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historical Places or (b) located within a 100-year floodplain. 3. A renovation which will change the basic prior use of a facility or significantly change its size. 4. Research and technology whose anticipated and future application could be expected to have an effect on the environment.

 5. Implementation of a program involving the use of chamicals.

- 3.14 Subgrant award agreement renewal. DPS has the option to renew this project for a specified additional time period. The renewal of this project is contingent upon satisfactory performance, availability of funds, and demonstrated need.
- 3.15 System for Award Management. The subrecipient agrees to comply with applicable requirements regarding registration with the System for Award Management (SAM). After the initial registration, subrecipients are required to review and update the information at least annually and more frequently if required by changes in the subrecipient's information or another award item. Additional information about registration procedures may be found at the SAM website (www.sam.gov).
- 4.0 Cost and Payments.
- 4.1 <u>Available funds.</u> Any award is dependent upon receipt of the VOCA Assistance funds from the U.S. Department of Justice, and there is no obligation on the part of DPS to award funds other than the federal VOCA.
- 4.2 <u>Match waiver.</u> Any award made with a match waiver pending approval from the U.S. Department of Justice is subject to reduction if the match waiver is not approved.
- 4.3 Compliance. Failure of the subrecipient to utilize DPS VOCA funds for direct services to crime victims or for training purposes as stated in the approved budget may be subject to immediate cancellation. The subrecipient shall not utilize VOCA funds for projects which serve perpetrators of crime or crime prevention, and/or for any other non-allowable cost or activity in accordance with DPS / VOCA guidelines. The subrecipient agrees to reimburse DPS for any VOCA funds the subrecipient expends that are not in full compliance with this subgrant award agreement.
- No charge to victims. Subrecipients shall provide services to crime victims, at no charge, through the VOCA-funded project. The purpose of the VOCA victim assistance grant program is to provide services to all crime victims regardless of their ability to pay for services rendered or availability of insurance or other third-party payment resources.
- 4.5 Qn-call time. The subrecipient shall not utilize VOCA funds to support on-call time for staff. DPS may approve the use of on-call time as program match.
- Non-supplantation. VOCA crime victim assistance funds will be used to enhance or expand services and shall not be used to supplant state and local funds that would otherwise be available for crime victim services. See Section 1404(a)(2)(c), codified at 42 USC 10603(a)(2)(C). This supplantation clause applies to state and local public agencies only.
- 4.7 <u>Mandated services.</u> The subrecipient shall not utilize VOCA funds to support legally mandated services.
- 4.8 Funds management. The subrecipient shall provide appropriate accounting and monitoring procedures to ensure fiscal control and efficient management of funds, in accordance with the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Financial Guide, effective edition.
- 4.9 <u>Unexpended funds.</u> The subrecipient shall immediately contact DPS to make arrangements to amend its budget to expend remaining funds or to reduce the contracted amount when it becomes apparent that not all VOCA grant funds will be expended by the end of the grant period. Any VOCA funds not expended or encumbered prior to the end of the award period shall be reverted to DPS within 30 days of the close of the grant period. Any funds not matched as required shall be reverted to DPS within 30 days of receipt of written notification from DPS.
- 4.10 Matching funds. The subrecipient shall commit, track and report matching funds at approximately the same percentage rate as expenditures. The subrecipient may commit, track and report match funds at a higher percentage rate each month, not to exceed the total required match amount. The subgrant award agreement is subject to cancellation if the required match funding committed, tracked, and reported each month is more than 10% less than the rate of expenditures.

- 4.11 Training and conference expense. The subrecipient agrees to comply with all applicable laws, regulations, policies, and guidance (including specific cost limits, prior approval and reporting requirements, where applicable) governing the use of federal funds for expenses related to conferences, meetings, training, and other events, including the provision of food and/or beverage and costs of attendance at such events.
- 4.12 <u>Prohibited expense.</u> The subrecipient shall not utilize VOCA funds, either directly or indirectly, in support of any contract with the Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now (ACORN) or its subsidiaries.
- 4.13 Training or training materials. The subrecipient understands and agrees that any training or training materials developed or delivered with funding provided under this award shall adhere to the OJP Training Ouiding Principles for Grantees and Subgrantees, available at http://www.ojp.usiloi.gov/funding/olptrainingguidingprinciples.htm.
- 4.14 <u>Duplicate funding.</u> The subrecipient agrees that if it currently has an open award of federal or state funds or if it receives an award of federal or state funds other than this award, and those award funds have been, are being, or are to be used, in whole or in part, for one or more of the identical cost items for which funds are being provided under this award, the subrecipient shall promptly notify DPS and, if so requested by DPS, seek an agreement amendment request to eliminate any duplication of funding.
- 5.0 Subgrant Award Agreement Changes.
- 5.1 Agreement Amendment. This subgrant award agreement is issued under the authority of the Director of the Arizona DPS and may be modified only through an Agreement Amendment, approved by DPS.
- 5.2 <u>Assignment of duties.</u> The subrecipient shall not assign or transfer any of its duties under this agreement without express written permission of DPS.
- 5.3 Scope of work. Awards are based on information presented in the subrecipient's on-line application. Any deviation from the scope of the project as stated in the Narrative and Budget sections of the subrecipient's application shall be approved in writing by DPS prior to the use of such funds.
- 5.4 Subcontracts. The subrecipient shall not enter into any subcontract under this subgrant award agreement without the advance written approval of DPS. The subrecipient shall clearly list any proposed subcontractors and the subcontractor's proposed responsibilities in the application for funding or agreement amendment. The subcontract shall incorporate by reference the terms and conditions of this subgrant award agreement.

6.0 Indomnification.

Subrecipient Indemnification. The parties to this subgrant award agreement agree that the State of Arizona, its departments, agencies, boards and commissions shall be indemnified and held harmless by the subrecipient for vicarious liability of the State as a result of entering into this agreement. However, the parties further agree that the State of Arizona, its departments, agencies, boards and commissions shall be responsible for its own negligence. Each party to this contract is responsible for its own negligence.

7.0 Grant Remedies.

- 7.1 Right to Assurance. If DPS in good faith has reason to believe that the subrecipient does not intend to, or is unable to perform or continue performing under this subgrant award agreement, DPS may demand in writing that the subrecipient give a written assurance of intent to perform. Failure by the subrecipient to provide written assurance within the number of days specified in the demand may, at DPS's option, be the basis for terminating the subgrant award agreement under the General Conditions or other rights and remedies available by law or provided by the subgrant award agreement.
- 7.2 <u>Project implementation.</u> If a project is not operational within 60 days of the original start date of the project period, the subrecipient shall submit written documentation to DPS explaining steps taken to initiate the

project, the reasons for the delay, and the expected start date. If a project is not operational within 90 days of the original start date of the project period, the subrecipient shall submit a second written statement explaining the implementation delay. DPS reserves the right to cancel the agreement if the proposed project is not operational within 90 days of the original start date.

8.0 Grant Termination.

- 8.1 Cancellation for conflict of interest. Pursuant to A.R.S. § 38-511, the State may cancel this agreement without penalty or further obligation if any person significantly involved in initiating, negotiating, securing, drafting or creating the agreement on behalf of the State is or becomes at any time while the agreement or an extension of the agreement is in effect an employee of or a consultant to any other party to this agreement with respect to the subject matter of the agreement. The cancellation shall be effective when the subrecipient receives written notice of the cancellation unless the notice specifies a later time. If the subrecipient is a political subdivision of the State, it may also cancel this agreement as provided in A.R.S. § 38-511. In the event of cancellation under this paragraph, any unexpended funds received by the subrecipient shall be reverted within 30 days of the cancellation notification.
- 8.2 <u>Oraquities.</u> DPS may, by written notice, terminate this subgrant award agreement, in whole or in part, if DPS determines that employment or a gratuity was offered or made by the subrecipient or a representative of the subrecipient to any officer or employee of the state for the purpose of influencing the outcome of the grant award or in securing the subgrant award agreement, an amendment to the subgrant award agreement, or favorable treatment concerning the subgrant award agreement, including the making of any determination or decision about subgrant award agreement performance. DPS, in addition to any other rights or remedies, shall be entifled to recover exemplary damages in the amount of three times the value of the gratuity offered by the subreciplent.
- Suspension or Debarment. DPS may, by written notice to the subrecipient, immediately terminate this subgrant award agreement if DPS determines that the subrecipient has been debarred, suspended or otherwise lawfully prohibited from or ineligible for participation in federal assistance programs or activities, including but not limited to, being disapproved as a subcontractor of any public procurement unit or other governmental body. Submittal of an application for funding or execution of a subgrant award agreement shall attest that the subrecipient is not currently suspended or debarred. If the subrecipient becomes suspended or debarred, the subrecipient shall immediately notify DPS.
- 8.4 <u>Termination for convenience.</u> DPS reserves the right to terminate the subgrant award agreement, in whole or in part any time, when in the best interest of DPS without penalty or recourse. Upon receipt of the written notice, the subrecipient shall stop all work as directed in the notice and minimize all further costs to DPS. In the event of termination under this paragraph, any unexpended funds received by the subrecipient shall be reverted within 30 days of the termination notification.
- 8.5 <u>Termination for default.</u> In addition to the rights reserved in the contract, DPS may terminate the subgrant award agreement in whole or in part due to the failure of the subrecipient to comply with any term or condition of the subgrant award agreement or to make satisfactory progress in performing the subgrant award agreement. An award is subject to cancellation if less than 20% of the awarded funds are expended or encumbered within 4 months of the contact start date, 40% within 7 months, and 70% within 10 months. DPS shall provide a 30-day written notice of termination and the reasons for termination to the subrecipient. In the event of termination under this paragraph, any unexpended funds recoived by the subrecipient shall be reverted within 30 days of the termination notification. The subrecipient has the option to appeal within 20 calendar days of the date of the written notice of termination. The final decision will be at the discretion of the DPS Director or his designee.
- 8.6 <u>Continuation of performance through termination.</u> The subrecipient shall continue to perform, in accordance with the requirements of the subgrant award agreement, up to the date of termination, as directed in the termination notice.
- 8.7 <u>Termination by subrecipient.</u> Upon written notice to DPS, the subrecipient may cancel this subgrant award agreement. Any unexpended funds shall immediately be reverted to DPS.

9.0 Arbitration,

The parties to this subgrant award agreement agree to resolve all disputes arising out of or relating to this subgrant award agreement through arbitration, after exhausting applicable administrative review, to the extent required by A.R.S. § 12-1518 except as may be required by other applicable statutes (Title 41).

10.0 Other Service Requirements.

- 10.1 <u>Collaboration.</u> The subrecipient agrees to continually and proactively participate in developing partner relationships among other service providers in the effort to aid crime victims within the community served.
- 10.2 <u>Demographics</u>. The subrecipient agrees to maintain information on victim services provided through this project by race, national origin, sex, age and disability.
- 10.3 <u>Key staff changes.</u> The subrecipient agrees to promptly notify DPS of changes in key staff members identified in the grant application, to include Project Contact, Civil Rights Contact, Crime Victim Compensation Coordinator, Project Director, Financial Contact, Authorizing Official, and VOCA funded staff and/or staff used as match.
- 10.4 <u>Vacancies.</u> The subrecipient agrees to promptly notify DPS in writing when any VOCA funded employee position is vacated, and when any VOCA funded employee position is filled.
- 10.5 Surveys. The subrecipient agrees to utilize customer feedback surveys to assist the agency with contracted project outcome and quality measures. Feedback and satisfaction surveys will utilize the Likert Scale of Measurement (Strongly Agree, Agree, Neither Agree or Disagree, Disagree, Strongly Disagree).
- Victim Compensation. The subrecipient agrees to assist eligible victims in seeking available crime victim compensation benefits provided by the state victim compensation program. The subrecipient shall designate a Victim Compensation Coordinator within its agency. The Victim Compensation Coordinator shall receive victim compensation training from his/her county attorney's office or complete the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission (ACIC) on-line introduction to Crime Victim Compensation training module (http://www.arcic.gov/ACIC.Web/victim/cbttraining.aspx). If training has not been received, the subrecipient shall arrange for and attend training within 90 days from the first day of this subgrant award agreement or 90 days after reassignment of new staff in this role.
- 10.7 <u>Victims' Rights.</u> The subreciplent agrees to notify victims of Victims' Rights (A.R.S. Title 13, Chapter 40 Crime Victims' Rights; and A.R.S. Title 8, Chapter 3, Article 7 Victims' Rights for Juvenile Offenses) and to offer to connect the victim with a representative from the prosecutor's or county attorney's office if the victim so chooses. Subrecipients shall ensure that all DPS-VOCA funded and match staff and their first line supervisor have received victims' rights training from the Arizona Attorney General's Office.
- Civil Rights. The subrecipient shall designate a Civil Rights Contact Person within its agency. This person shall complete the on-line civil rights training program offered by the Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OIP), Department of Justice (DOI) via the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission (ACJC) website. The subrecipient shall ensure the Civil Rights Contact Person completes the training within 90 days from the first day of this subgrant award agreement or 90 days after reassignment of new staff in this role.
- 10.9 <u>Volunteers.</u> The subrecipient agrees to incorporate the use of volunteers to assist in carrying out the agency's mission. The use of volunteers is a current and ongoing requirement for all projects.
- 10.10 Text messaging policy. Pursuant to Executive Order 13513, "Pederal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," 74 Fed. Reg. 51225 (October 1, 2009), the Department of Justice (DOJ) encourages subrecipients to adopt and enforce policies banning employees from text messaging while driving any vehicle during the course of performing work funded by this grant, and to establish workplace safety policies and conduct education, awareness, and other outreach to decrease crashes caused by distracted drivers.

If supplanting had not occurred, 110 new officers would have been hired using Federal funds for 60 officers and State funds for 50 officers.

PROJECT PURPOSE: To provide assistance to victims of crime.

This agreement is made under the authority of the Victims of Crime Act of 1984, Public Law 98-473, Title II, Chapter XIV, 42 USC 10601, et seq as amended.

The purpose of this agreement shall be to award Victims of Crimo Act (VOCA) Assistance funds to the subrecipient to provide services to victims of crime as authorized by the Victims of Crime Act. Awards may be supplemented by other federal, state, local, and private funds. Subrecipient's agreement or amended agreement(s) is incorporated by reference into this Subgrant Award Agreement.

This award is subject to agreement by the subrecipient, including any DPS VOCA funded positions and their immediate supervisors, to conform to the provisions of the Victims of Crime Act of 1984; the DPS VOCA victim assistance grant program guidelines; the subrecipient's application; the attached general conditions and applicable special conditions; the most recent version of the Office of Justice Programs Financial Guide; OMB circulars A-21, A-87, A-102, A-110, A-122, A-133; Executive Order 12372; and 28 CFR pts. 66 and 70, all of which are incorporated by reference as if fully stated herein.

Subrecipients, and all their contractors, will comply with all lawful requirements imposed by the awarding agency, specifically including any applicable regulations, such as 28 CFR prs. 18, 22, 23, 30, 35, 38, 42, 61, and 63, and the award term in 2 CFR § 175.15 (b); section 106 of the National Historic Proservation Act of 1966 (16 USC § 470); Executive Order 11593; the Archaeological and Historical Preservation Act of 1974 (16 USC § 469 a-1 et seq.); the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 USC § 4321); and any applicable statutorily-imposed nondiscrimination requirements, which may include Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 USC \$ 2000d and 28 CFR § 42.101 et seq); Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 USC § 794 and 28 CFR § 42.501 et seq); the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 USC § 6102 and 28 CFR § 42.700 et seq); Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (20 USC § 1681 and 28 CFR pt 54); the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (42 USC § 3789d and 28 CFR § 42,201 et seq); the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 2002 (42 USC § 5672(b)); Section 1407 of the Victims of Crime Act of 1984 (42 USC § 10604(e)); Title It of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 USC \$12131-34 and 28 CFR pt. 35); and Equal Treatment for Paith-Based Organizations (28 CPR pt 38 and Executive Order 13279); and State Executive Order No. 2009-09. The above referenced federal and state laws prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, disability, and national origin (including limited English proficiency) in the delivery of services and employment practices, and prohibit discrimination on the basis of age in the delivery of services.

#### General Conditions

- 1.0 Definition of Turms. As used in this subgrent award agreement, the terms listed below are defined as follows:
- 1.1 "Agreement" means a written online Request for Grant Application (RFGA) approved by the Arizona Department of Public Safety.
- 1.2 "Agreement Amendment" means a written online document approved by the Arizona Department of Public Safety that is requested by the subrecipient agency for the purpose of making changes in the agreement.
- 1.3 "Application" means a written online Request for Grant Application (RFGA).
- 1.4 "Days" means calendar days unless otherwise specified.
- 1.5 "Direct Service" means supportive services provided through direct contact with a victim in-person, by phone or hottine, or by email.
- 1.6 "Director" means the head of the Axizona Department of Public Safety, or his/her designee, who is duly authorized by the State to enter into grant agreements and make written determinations with respect to those agreements.
- 1.7 "DPS" means the Arizona Department of Public Safety.
- 1.8 "Grant" means the furnishing of financial or other assistance, including state or federal grant funds, by the Department of Public Safety to any person for the purpose of supporting or stimulating educational, cultural, social or economic quality of life.
- 1.9 "Gratuity" means a payment, loan, subscription, advance, deposit of money, services, or anything of more than nominal value, present or promised, unless consideration of substantially equal or greater value is received.
- 1.10 "Match" means additional resources (cash or in-kind) provided by the subrecipient to support the DPS VOCA funded project. Cash match shall be from a non-Federal source.
- 1.11 "Project" means activities and services supported by Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funds plus required match, relating to this subgrant award agreement only.
- "Services" means the furnishing of labor, time or effort by a subrecipient which does not involve the delivery of a specific end product other than required reports and performance. Allowable services include those efforts that (1) respond to the emotional and physical needs [healing] of crime victims; (2) assist primary and secondary victims of crime to stabilize [restitution/economic restabilization] their lives after a victimization; (3) assist victims to understand and participate in the criminal [justice] system; and (4) provide victims of crime with a measure of [safety] and security.
- 1.13 "State" means the State of Arizona and Department or Agency of the State that executes the subgrant award agreement.
- 1.14 "Subgrant award agreement" means a written signed agreement between the Arizona Department of Public Safety and the grant recipient for the award of DPS VOCA funds.
- "Subrecipient" means the legal entity to which a subaward is made and which is accountable to DPS for the use of the funds provided.

- 1.16 "VOCA" means Victims of Crime Act of 1984, as amended, 42 USC 10601, et seq.
- 2.0 Subgrant award agreement interpretation.
- 2.1 Arizona Law. The Arizona law applies to this grant award agreement, including the Solicitation and Award of Grants, Arizona Revised Statutes (A.R.S.) Title 41, Chapter 24, and its implementing rules.
- 2.2 Subgrant Award Agreement Order of Precedence. In the event of a conflict in the provisions of the subgrant award agreement, as accepted by the State and as they may be amended, the following shall prevail in the order set forth below:
- 2.2.1 Special Conditions:
- 2.2.2 General Conditions:
- 2.2.3 DPS / VOCA Guidelines:
- 2.2.4 Federal VOCA Quidelines; OJP Financial Quide; applicable OMB circulars; and Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements in 2 C.F.R. Part 200.
- 2.3 Relationship of parties. The subrecipient under this subgrant award agreement is an independent subrecipient. Neither party to this subgrant award agreement shall be deemed to be the employee or agent of the other party to the subgrant award agreement.
- 2.4 Severability. The provisions of this subgrant award agreement are severable. Any condition deemed illegal or invalid shall not affect any other condition of the subgrant award agreement.
- 2.5 No parol evidence. This subgrant award agreement is intended by the parties as a final and complete expression of their agreement. No prior dealings between the parties shall supplement or explain any terms used in this document and no other understanding either oral or in writing shall be binding.
- No waiver. Either party's failure to insist on strict performance of any condition of the subgrant award agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of that condition even if the party accepting or acquiescing in the nonconforming performance knows of the nature of the performance and fails to object to it.
- Subgrant award agreement administration and operation.
- Non-Discrimination. The subrecipient shall comply with State Executive Order No. 2009-09 and all other applicable Federal and State laws, rules and regulations related to the prohibition against discrimination, including Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 2002, the Victims of Crime Act of 1984, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, Department of Justice implementing regulations and Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations.
  - In the event a federal or state court or administrative agency makes a finding of discrimination after a due process hearing against the subrecipient agency on the grounds of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability, the subrecipient shall forward a copy of the finding to the Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Office for Civil Rights and DPS.
- 3.1.1 <u>Providing Services to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Individuals.</u> In accordance with Department of Justice guidance, recipients (and subrecipients) of Federal financial assistance shall take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP).
- 3.1.2 <u>Faith-Based Organizations</u>. - 3.1.4 <u>Civil Rights Compliance Review.</u> The subrecipient shall provide relevant information regarding civil rights policies and procedures during the DPS-VOCA Civil Rights Compliance Review process.
- Certification Regarding Lobbying. Subrecipient agencies entering into a VOCA grant or cooperative agreement over \$100,000 shall certify that no Federal funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the subrecipient, to any porsons for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the making of any Federal grant, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal grant or cooperative agreement. Federal funds include but are not limited to such grants as Victims of Crime Act (VOCA), Violence Against Women Act (VAWA), Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (Rural Safe Home Network Program), and the Children's Justice Act, which may be administered through a State or other local governmental agency. Additionally, subrecipient agencies shall disclose to DPS any lobbying activities that have been paid or will be paid with any funds other than Federal funds.
- 3.2.1 <u>Lobbying Activities.</u> The subrecipient understands and agrees that it cannot use any federal funds, either directly or indirectly, in support of the enactment, repeal, modification or adoption of any law, regulation or policy, at any level of government.
- 3.3 <u>Required reports.</u> The subrecipient will submit reports on such data in such form and at such times as required by DPS, to include:
- 3.3.1 Monthly financial report due the 15th of each month;
- 3.3.2 Quarterly statistical and programmatic report due 30 days following the close of each quarter;
- 3.3.3 Annual nutrative report due 30 days following the close of the grant period;
- 3.3.4 DPS victim assistance survey due annually upon request; and
- 3.3.5 Year-end Amendment Agreement, if applicable, due 30 days following the close of the grant period.

Failure to submit complete, accurate and timely reports may result in a reduction of the current award. Any three combined occurrences of monthly or quarterly reports submitted over 15 days late and/or three combined occurrences relating to the submission of incomplete or inaccurate monthly or quarterly reports may result in up to a 10% award reduction as determined by DPS.

- 3.3.6 If DPS determines that the subrecipient has falled to meet the acceptable standard for maintaining financial and/or programmatic documentation or is identified as a high risk subrecipient, additional financial or programmatic documentation may be required.
- Becords. The subrecipient shall retain all financial records, supporting documentation, statistical records and all other records pertinent to this award until March 31 of the seventh year following the year indicated in the Federal Grant Number of this Subgrant Award Agreement. (Federal Grant #2014-VA-GX-0018 plus seven years keep through March 31 of that seventh year). In addition, with a 24-hour notice, the subrecipient will allow DPS and the Department of Justice's Office for Victims of Crime and/or the Office of the Chief Financial Officer (or their representatives) to review all of the subrecipient's records concerning this grant project.
- 3.5 <u>Capital equipment.</u> Any purchase of capital equipment shall be approved by DPS prior to purchase to include submission of the subrecipient's producement or purchasing policies and procedures and related quote(s) for item purchase. The subrecipient shall maintain all capital equipment and furniture (costs in excess of \$5,000 per unit) purchased through this subgrant award agreement in accordance with the OJP Financial Guide. The subrecipient shall submit documentation relevant to the purchase as required by DPS. All capital equipment and furniture shall be used for victim services as identified in the subrecipient's

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- application and this subgrant award agreement. Any deviation from this provision shall be approved in writing by DPS.
- 3.6 <u>Authorization of use.</u> DPS reserves a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish or otherwise use, and authorize others to use for government purposes, the copyright of any work developed under this award and any rights of copyright to which a subrecipient purchases ownership with support through this subgrant award agreement.
- 3.7 <u>Research or statistical information.</u> The subrecipient shall not use or reveal any research or statistical information under this project that is identifiable to any specific person except for the purpose for which the information was obtained, in accordance with VOCA.
- 3.8 <u>Site inspections.</u> The continuance of the subrecipient's subgrant award agreement is contingent upon successful completion of random or for-cause inspections. Failure to satisfactorily comply with Required Action items identified during the site inspection can result in termination of the subgrant award agreement.
- 3.9 <u>Audit requirements.</u> The subrecipient shall comply with the audit requirements of Title 2 F.F.R. Subpart F (§ 200,500 et seq.) of the Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards and the DPS VOCA guidelines. If an audit is required, a copy of the audit report shall be sent to DPS.
- 3.10 <u>Financial statement availability.</u> The nonprofit subrecipient shall make its financial statements available online (either on the subrecipient's or another publicly available website). Subrecipient organizations that have Federal 501(c)(3) tax status are considered in compliance with this requirement to the extent that such organizations flie IRS Form 990 or similar tax documents (e.g., 990-EZ), as several sources already provide searchable online databases of such financial statements.
- 3.11 <u>Certification of nonprofit status.</u> The nonprofit subrecipient shall certify its nonprofit status by submitting a statement to DPS affirmatively asserting that the subrecipient is a nonprofit organization, and by providing either 1) a copy of its 501(c)(3) designation letter; 2) a letter from the Arizona Department of Rovenue or Atizona Attorney General's Office stating that the subrecipient is a nonprofit organization operating within Arizona; or 3) a copy of the agency's Arizona certificate of incorporation that substantiates its nonprofit status. Subrecipients that are local nonprofit affiliates of Arizona or national nonprofits should have available proof of (1), (2) or (3), and a statement by the Arizona or national parent organization that the subrecipient is a local nonprofit affiliate.
- 3.12 <u>Potential fraud, waste, abuse or misconduct.</u> The subrecipient shall promptly notify DPS in writing of any credible evidence that a principal, employed, agent, contractor, subcontractor, or other person has either 1) submitted a false claim for grant funds under the False Claims Act; or 2) committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct involving award funds.
  - No subrecipient under this award may require any employee or contractor to sign an internal confidentiality agreement or statement that prohibits or otherwise restricts, or purports to prohibit or restrict, the reporting (in accordance with law) of waste, fraud, or abuse to an investigative or law enforcement representative of a federal department or agency authorized to receive such information. The foregoing is not intended to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.
- Prohibited activities. The following activities are prohibited under this subgrant award agreement:

  1. New construction. 2. Any renovation or remodeling of a property offlier (a) listed on or eligible for fisting on the National Register of Historical Places or (b) located within a 100-year floodplain. 3. A renovation which will change the basic prior use of a facility or significantly change its size. 4. Research and technology whose anticipated and future application could be expected to have an effect on the environment.

  5. Implementation of a program involving the use of chemicals.

- 3.14 Subgrant award agreement renewal. DPS has the option to renew this project for a specified additional time period. The renewal of this project is contingent upon satisfactory performance, availability of funds, and demonstrated need.
- 3.15 System for Award Management. The subrecipient agrees to comply with applicable requirements regarding registration with the System for Award Management (SAM). After the initial registration, subrecipients are required to review and update the information at least annually and more frequently if required by changes in the subrecipient's information or another award item. Additional information about registration procedures may be found at the SAM website (www.sam.gov).
- 4.0 Cost and Payments.
- 4.1 <u>Available funds.</u> Any award is dependent upon receipt of the VOCA Assistance funds from the U.S. Department of Justice, and there is no obligation on the part of DPS to award funds other than the federal VOCA.
- 4.2 Match waiver. Any award made with a match waiver pending approval from the U.S. Department of Justice is subject to reduction if the match waiver is not approved.
- 4.3 Compliance. Failure of the subrecipient to utilize DPS VOCA funds for direct services to crime victims or for training purposes as stated in the upproved budget may be subject to immediate cancellation. The subrecipient shall not utilize VOCA funds for projects which serve perpetrators of crime or crime prevention, and/or for any other non-altowable cost or activity in accordance with DPS / VOCA guidelines. The subrecipient agrees to reimburse DPS for any VOCA funds the subrecipient expends that are not in full compliance with this subgrant award agreement.
- 4.4 No charge to victims. Subrecipients shall provide services to crime victims, at no charge, through the VOCA-funded project. The purpose of the VOCA victim assistance grant program is to provide services to all crime victims regardless of their ability to pay for services rendered or availability of insurance or other third-party payment resources.
- 4.5 On-call time. The subrecipient shall not utilize VOCA funds to support on-call time for staff. DPS may approve the use of on-call time as program match.
- Non-supplantation. VOCA crime victim assistance funds will be used to enhance or expand services and shall not be used to supplant state and local funds that would otherwise be available for crime victim services. See Section 1404(a)(2)(c), codified at 42 USC 10603(a)(2)(C). This supplantation clause applies to state and local public agencies only.
- 4.7 Mandated services. The subrecipient shall not utilize VOCA funds to support legally mandated services.
- 4.8 <u>Funds management.</u> The subrecipient shall provide appropriate accounting and monitoring procedures to ensure fiscal control and efficient management of funds, in accordance with the U.S. Department of justice, Office of Justice Programs, Financial Guide, effective edition.
- 4.9 Unexpended funds. The subrecipient shall immediately contact DPS to make arrangements to amend its budget to expend remaining funds or to reduce the contracted amount when it becomes apparent that not all VOCA grant funds will be expended by the end of the grant period. Any VOCA funds not expended or encumbered prior to the end of the award period shall be reverted to DPS within 30 days of the close of the grant period. Any funds not matched as required shall be reverted to DPS within 30 days of receipt of written notification from DPS.
- 4.10 Matching funds. The subrecipient shall commit, track and report matching funds at approximately the same percentage rate as expenditures. The subrecipient may commit, track and report match funds at a higher percentage rate each month, not to exceed the total required match amount. The subgrant award agreement is subject to cancellation if the required match funding committed, tracked, and reported each month is more than 10% less than the rate of expenditures.

- 4.11 <u>Training and conference expense.</u> The subrecipient agrees to comply with all applicable taws, regulations, policies, and guidance (including specific cost limits, prior approval and reporting requirements, where applicable) governing the use of federal funds for expenses related to conferences, meetings, training, and other events, including the provision of food and/or beverage and costs of attendance at such events.
- 4.12 <u>Prohibited expense.</u> The subrecipient shall not utilize VOCA funds, either directly or indirectly, in support of any contract with the Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now (ACORN) or its subsidiaries.
- 4.13 Training or training materials. The subrecipient understands and agrees that any training or training materials developed or delivered with funding provided under this award shall adhere to the OJP Training Guiding Principles for Grantees and Subgrantees, available at <a href="http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/funding/ojptralningguidinggrinciples.htm">http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/funding/ojptralningguidinggrinciples.htm</a>.
- 4.14 <u>Dualicate funding.</u> The subrecipient agrees that if it currently has an open award of federal or state funds or if it receives an award of federal or state funds other than this award, and those award funds have been, are being, or are to be used, in whole or in part, for one or more of the identical cost items for which funds are being provided under this award, the subrecipient shall promptly notify DPS and, if so requested by DPS, seek an agreement amendment request to eliminate any duplication of funding.
- 5.0 Subgrant Award Agreement Changes.
- 5.1 Agreement Amendment. This subgrant award agreement is issued under the authority of the Director of the Arizona DPS and may be modified only through an Agreement Amendment, approved by DPS.
- 5.2 <u>Assignment of duties.</u> The subrecipient shall not assign or transfer any of its duties under this agreement without express written permission of DPS.
- 5.3 Scope of work. Awards are based on information presented in the subrecipient's on-line application. Any deviation from the scope of the project as stated in the Narrative and Budget sections of the subrecipient's application shall be approved in writing by DPS prior to the use of such funds.
- 5.4 Subcontracts. The subrecipient shall not enter into any subcontract under this subgrant award agreement without the advance written approval of DPS. The subrecipient shall clearly list any proposed subcontractors and the subcontractor's proposed responsibilities in the application for funding or agreement amendment. The subcontract shall incorporate by reference the terms and conditions of this subgrant award agreement.

#### 6.0 Indemnification.

<u>Subrecipient Indemnification</u>. The parties to this subgrant award agreement agree that the State of Arizona, its departments, agencies, boards and commissions shall be indemnifted and held harmless by the subrecipient for vicarious liability of the State as a result of entering into this agreement. However, the parties further agree that the State of Arizona, its departments, agencies, boards and commissions shall be responsible for its own negligence. Each party to this contract is responsible for its own negligence.

#### 7.0 Grant Remedies.

- 7.1 Right to Assurance. If DPS in good faith has reason to believe that the subrecipient does not intend to, or is unable to perform or continue performing under this subgrant award agreement, DPS may demand in writing that the subrecipient give a written assurance of intent to perform. Failure by the subrecipient to provide written assurance within the number of days specified in the demand may, at DPS's option, be the basis for terminating the subgrant award agreement under the General Conditions or other rights and temedies available by law or provided by the subgrant award agreement.
- 7.2 <u>Project implementation.</u> If a project is not operational within 60 days of the original start date of the project period, the subrecipient shall submit written documentation to DPS explaining steps taken to initiate the

project, the reasons for the delay, and the expected start date. If a project is not operational within 90 days of the original start date of the project period, the subrecipient shall submit a second written statement explaining the implementation delay. DPS reserves the right to cancel the agreement if the proposed project is not operational within 90 days of the original start date.

#### 8.0 Grant Termination.

- Cancellation for conflict of interest. Pursuant to A.R.S. § 38-511, the State may cancel this agreement without penalty or further obligation if any person significantly involved in initiating, negotiating, securing, drafting or creating the agreement on behalf of the State is or becomes at any time while the agreement or an extension of the agreement is in effect an employee of or a consultant to any other party to this agreement with respect to the subject matter of the agreement. The cancellation shall be offective when the subrecipient receives written notice of the cancellation unless the notice specifies a later time. If the subrecipient is a political subdivision of the State, it may also cancel this agreement as provided in A.R.S. § 38-511. In the event of cancellation under this paragraph, any unexpended funds received by the subrecipient shall be reverted within 30 days of the cancellation notification.
- 8.2 Gratuities. DPS may, by written notice, terminate this subgrant award agreement, in whole or in part, if DPS determines that employment or a gratuity was offered or made by the subrecipient or a representative of the subrecipient to any officer or employee of the state for the purpose of influencing the outcome of the grant award or in securing the subgrant award agreement, an amendment to the subgrant award agreement, or favorable treatment concerning the subgrant award agreement, including the making of any determination or decision about subgrant award agreement performance. DPS, in addition to any other rights or remedies, shall be entitled to recover exemplary damages in the amount of three times the value of the gratuity offered by the subrecipient.
- 8.3 Suspension or Debarment. DPS may, by written notice to the subrecipient, immediately terminate this subgrant award agreement if DPS determines that the subrecipient has been debarred, suspended or otherwise lawfully prohibited from or ineligible for participation in federal assistance programs or activities, including but not limited to, being disapproved as a subcontractor of any public procurement unit or other governmental body. Submittal of an application for funding or execution of a subgrant award agreement shall attest that the subrecipient is not currently suspended or debarred. If the subrecipient becomes suspended or debarred, the subrecipient shall immediately notify DPS.
- Termination for convenience. DPS reserves the right to terminate the subgrant award agreement, in whole or in part any time, when in the best interest of DPS without penalty or recourse. Upon receipt of the written notice, the subrecipient shall stop all work as directed in the notice and minimize all further costs to DPS. In the event of termination under this paragraph, any unexpended funds received by the subrecipient shall be reverted within 30 days of the termination notification.
- Termination for default. In addition to the rights reserved in the contract, DPS may terminate the subgrant award agreement in whole or in part due to the failure of the subrecipient to comply with any term or condition of the subgrant award agreement or to make satisfactory progress in performing the subgrant award agreement. An award is subject to cancellation if less than 20% of the awarded funds are expended or encumbered within 4 months of the contact start date, 40% within 7 months, and 70% within 10 months. DPS shall provide a 30-day written notice of termination and the reasons for termination to the subrecipient. In the event of termination under this paragraph, any unexpended funds received by the subrecipient shall be reverted within 30 days of the termination notification. The subrecipient has the option to appeal within 20 calendar days of the date of the written notice of termination. The final decision will be at the discretion of the DPS Director or his designee.
- 8.6 <u>Continuation of performance through termination.</u> The subrecipient shall continue to perform, in accordance with the requirements of the subgrant award agreement, up to the date of termination, as directed in the termination notice.
- 8.7 <u>Termination by subrecipient.</u> Upon written notice to DPS, the subrecipient may cancel this subgrant award agreement. Any unexpended funds shall immediately be reverted to DPS.

#### 9.0 Arbitration,

The parties to this subgrant award agreement agree to resolve all disputes arising out of or relating to this subgrant award agreement through arbitration, after exhausting applicable administrative review, to the extent required by A.R.S. § 12-1518 except as may be required by other applicable statutes (Title 41).

#### 10.0 Other Service Requirements.

- 10.1 <u>Collaboration.</u> The subrecipient agrees to continually and proactively participate in developing partner relationships among other service providers in the effort to aid crime victims within the community served.
- 10.2 <u>Demographics.</u> The subrecipient agrees to maintain information on victim services provided through this project by race, national origin, sex, age and disability.
- 10.3 Key staff changes. The subrecipient agrees to promptly notify DPS of changes in key staff members identified in the grant application, to include Project Contact, Civil Rights Contact, Crime Victim Compensation Coordinator, Project Director, Financial Contact, Authorizing Official, and VOCA funded staff and/or staff used as match.
- 10.4 <u>Yacancies.</u> The subrecipient agrees to promptly notify DPS in writing when any VOCA funded employee position is vacated, and when any VOCA funded employee position is filled.
- 10.5 <u>Surveys.</u> The subrecipient agrees to utilize customer feedback surveys to assist the agency with contracted project outcome and quality measures. Feedback and satisfaction surveys will utilize the Likert Scale of Measurement (Strongly Agree, Agree, Neither Agree or Disagree, Disagree, Strongly Disagree).
- Victim Compensation. The subrecipient agrees to assist eligible victims in seeking available crime victim compensation benefits provided by the state victim compensation program. The subrecipient shall designate a Victim Compensation Coordinator within its agency. The Victim Compensation Coordinator shall receive victim compensation training from his/her county attorney's office or complete the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission (ACJC) on-line Introduction to Crime Victim Compensation training module (http://www.azcjc.gov/ACJC.Web/victim/cbttraining.aspx). If training has not been received, the subrecipient shall arrange for and attend training within 90 days from the first day of this subgrant award agreement or 90 days after reassignment of new staff in this role.
- 10.7 Victims' Rights. The subrecipient agrees to notify victims of Victims' Rights (A.R.S. Title 13, Chapter 40 Crime Victims' Rights; and A.R.S. Title 8, Chapter 3, Article 7 Victims' Rights for Invenile Offenses) and to offer to connect the victim with a representative from the prosecutor's or county attorney's office if the victim so chooses. Subrecipients shall ensure that all DPS-VOCA funded and match staff and their first line supervisor have received victims' rights training from the Arizona Attorney General's Office.
- 10.8 <u>Civil Rights.</u> The subrecipient shall designate a Civil Rights Contact Person within its agency. This person shall complete the on-line civil rights training program offered by the Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), Department of Justice (DOJ) via the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission (ACIC) website. The subrecipient shall ensure the Civil Rights Contact Person completes the training within 90 days from the first day of this subgrant award agreement or 90 days after reassignment of new staff in this role.
- 10.9 <u>Volunteers.</u> The subrecipient agrees to incorporate the use of volunteers to assist in carrying out the agency's mission. The use of volunteers is a current and ongoing requirement for all projects.
- 10.10 Text messaging policy. Pursuant to Executive Order 13513, "Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," 74 Fed. Reg. 51225 (October 1, 2009), the Department of Justice (DOI) encourages subrecipients to adopt and enforce policies banding employees from text messaging while driving any vehicle during the course of performing work funded by this grant, and to establish workplace safety policies and conduct education, awareness, and other outreach to decrease crashes caused by distracted drivers.

#### Complying with Federal Civil Rights Program Requirements

Ensuring Access to Federally Assisted Programs

Pederal laws prohibit recipients (and subrecipients) of federal financial assistance from discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability in funded program or activities, not only in respect to employment practices but also in the delivery of services or benefits. #### Certification regarding eligibility for de minimis rate of 10% of Modified Total Direct Costs (MTDC)

Pursuant to § 200.414 Indirect (F&A) Costs of the Uniform Administrative Requirements. Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, any non-Federal entity that has never received a negotiated indirect cost rate, except for those non-Federal entities described in Appendix VII to Part 200 - States and Local Government and Indian Tribe Indirect Cost Proposals, paragraph (d)(1)(B), may elect to charge a de minimis rate of 10% of modified total direct costs (MTDC) which may be used indefinitely. As described in § 200.403 Factors affecting allowability of costs, costs must be consistently charged as either indirect or direct costs, but may not be double charged or inconsistently charged as both. If chosen, this methodology once elected must be used consistently for all Federal awards until such time as a non-Federal entity chooses to negotiate for a rate, which the non-Federal entity may apply to do at any time.

Additionally, pursuant to § 200,414(g), any non-Federal entity that has a federally negotiated indirect cost rate may apply for a one-time extension of a current negotiated indirect cost rate for a period of up to four years. This extension will be subject to the review and approval of the cognizant agency for indirect costs. If an extension is granted the non-Federal entity may not request a rate review until the extension period ends. At the end of the 4-year extension, the non-Federal entity must re-apply to negotiate a rate.

# Certification regarding Non-Supplanting

As outlined in the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Federal Financial Guide, Federal funds must be used to supplement existing State and local funds for program activities and must not supplant those funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose. Furthermore, supplanting is defined as "to deliberately reduce State or local funds because of the existence of Federal funds. For example, when State funds are appropriated for a stated purpose and Federal funds are awarded for that same purpose, the State replaces its State funds with Federal funds, thereby reducing the total amount available for the stated purpose."

The following example is provided in the Federal Financial Guide to help clarify the difference between supplementing and supplanting:

State funds are appropriated to hire 50 new police officers, and Federal funds are awarded for hiring 60 new police officers. At the end of the year, the State has hired 60 new police officers, and the Federal funds have been exhausted. The State has not used its funds towards hiring new officers, but instead reduced its appropriation for that purpose and assigned or appropriated the funds to another purpose. In this case, the State has supplanted its appropriation with the Federal funds. If supplanting had not occurred, 110 new officers would have been hired using Federal funds for 60 officers and State funds for 50 officers.



COMPLAINT AND NOTICE OF APPEAL OF PROPERTY VALUATION

Title 42 – Property Tax

(Assigned to: Hon. Christopher Whitten)

Pursuant to A.R.S. §§42-16168, 42-16203 and 42-16207, et seq., plaintiff, Transwestern Pipeline Company ("Transwestern"), appeals to the Arizona Tax Court the valuation of its property for tax year 2016, as determined by the Arizona Department of Revenue ("ADOR") and upheld by the Arizona State Board of Equalization ("State Board"). In support of its Complaint and Notice of Appeal, Transwestern alleges:

I.

Transwestern is a Delaware corporation, doing business in the State of Arizona. At all times material hereto, Transwestern owned legal and/or equitable title to property

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situated within Apache County, Coconino County, Maricopa County, Mohave County, Navajo County, Pinal County and Yavapai County in the State of Arizona and which ADOR identifies by taxpayer identification number 53-853 (the "Subject Property").

II.

ADOR is an agency of the government of the State of Arizona, created and organized pursuant to A.R.S. §§42-1001, et seq. ADOR is charged with the duty of determining annually the value of Transwestern's taxable property located in Arizona, pursuant to A.R.S. §§42-14201, et seq.

Ш.

Defendants, Apache County, Coconino County, Maricopa County, Mohave County, Navajo County, Pinal County and Yavapai County ("Defendant Counties"), are political subdivisions of the State of Arizona. Defendant Counties and ADOR are made defendants to this action pursuant to A.R.S. §42-16208.

IV.

On or about August 28, 2015, ADOR determined the final tax year 2016 full cash value of the Subject Property to be \$639,690,000, pursuant to the statutory methodology prescribed by A.R.S. §42-14204. Transwestern filed a timely appeal from ADOR's valuation to the State Board, which upheld ADOR's valuation in a decision dated November 13, 2015. A copy of the State Board's Decision is attached hereto as Exhibit A. Upon information and belief, for tax year 2016, the statutory full cash value of the Subject Property as determined by ADOR and upheld by the State Board is excessive because it exceeds the market value of the Subject Property, in violation of A.R.S. §42-11001(6).

V.

Pursuant to Arizona law, each of the Defendant Counties has and/or will assess, levy and seek to collect property taxes from Transwestern for itself and for each taxing

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unit or district appearing upon its rolls, based upon the full cash value determined by ADOR and upheld by the State Board for tax year 2016.

#### VI.

For tax year 2016, the full cash value of the Subject Property as determined by ADOR and upheld by the State Board is excessive and inequitable because, among other reasons: (1) ADOR valued the Subject Property solely pursuant to the statutory methodology prescribed by A.R.S. §42-14204, which valuation exceeds the "market value" of the Subject Property, as determined by using standard appraisal methods and techniques, in direct contravention of A.R.S. §42-11001(6); and (2) ADOR's calculation of the statutory full cash value was made in error as it relates to two specific components of the calculation, including (a) the inclusion of non-reoccurring revenues related to prior years' tax refunds to Transwestern as a result of the settlement of prior litigation for tax years 2010, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015 that reduced Transwestern's Arizona full cash values in each tax year, and (b) a mistake in the amount stated as the 2013 accumulated depreciation net of the amortization of the plant acquisition adjustment. Collectively, these two errors in the calculation of the statutory value under A.R.S. §42-14204, overstated the full cash value of Transwestern's Arizona property by \$25,226,000. The overstatement of revenues due to prior years' tax refunds accounts for \$10,078,000 of the difference in the correct calculation of the statutory value, and \$15,148,000 of the difference in the statutory value is attributable to ADOR's mistake on the depreciation.

#### VII.

Pursuant to A.R.S. §42-13301, a reduction in the full cash value of the Subject Property for tax year 2016 will require a reduction in the limited property value.

#### VIII.

Upon information and belief, the property taxes that will be assessed against the

Subject Property for tax year 2016 are based upon excessive full cash and limited property values. As a result of these overvaluations, Transwestern will have to pay more taxes than could legally be collected if the Subject Property was valued properly. Therefore, pursuant to A.R.S. §§42-16213 and 42-16214, Transwestern is entitled to have the 2016 tax roll corrected to reflect the correct full cash and limited property values, and to receive a refund of any taxes levied, assessed and paid based on the excessive 2016 full cash and limited property values, together with interest as provided by law.

WHEREFORE, Transwestern requests that this Court:

- 1. Determine and fix the full cash value and limited property value of the Subject Property for tax year 2016;
- 2. Render judgment that Transwestern have and recover from Defendant Counties a refund in the amount of any excess taxes paid based on the 2016 full cash value and limited property values as determined by this Court, together with interest thereon at the legal rate from the date of payment by Transwestern until refunded by Defendant Counties;
- 3. Award Transwestern its attorneys' fees and expert witness expenses incurred herein, pursuant to A.R.S. §12-348, as well as its taxable costs; and
  - 4. Grant such further relief as the Court may deem proper. DATED this 11th day of January, 2016.
