We continue to work hard here at Birch Grove and we are gearing up for our year end assessments, both the MCA's and MAPS testing.

The MCA (Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments) will be conducted on Tuesday, April 13 (Reading 3rd-5th grade), Wednesday, April 14 (Math 3rd-5th grade), and Thursday, April 15 (Science 5th grade only). PLEASE be sure that if your child(ren) is/are testing that they get **EXTRA sleep the night before a testing day**. Breakfast will be offered to testing students each morning and testing snacks will also be offered each day. We will have a short "pep rally" for testing students as well! Please encourage your child to take their time during this test and to do their best work - this is an opportunity for them to show off their big brains!

Please remember to send boots! Rubber boot work well too! It is hard to go outside or in the woods were there are puddles and mud with students that only have tennis shoes. If your child needs boots, please let us know. Thank you!

I sent out a letter from the Cook County Public Health and Human Services about COVID saliva tests for families. They should arrive on Friday this week. I will send out tests to those that requested them on Monday next week, so check backpacks. I send in staff saliva test every other Tuesday. If you want, I can send your completed tests along with our UPS pick up. Please send completed tests in a plastic baggie, and I will add these to our pick up. Tuesday pick-up days are:

- Tuesday, May 11
- Tuesday, May 25

Also, please note that the school calendar says that the last day of school is Friday, May 28. We will have school on-site this day, so it is NOT a distance learning day. There is also an early release at 12:00. Considering this, the last Friday distance learning day is: May 21.

This is just another step as the children push towards reading readiness. At the end of the week the children took turns dressing up and acting out the story of Little Red Riding Hood.

We sure enjoyed that too brief window of beautiful spring-like weather. Now it sounds like we will be dealing with rain for a while. Of course, we won't go outside in a downpour, but we will try to slip out between showers. It was another busy week in K/1! In language arts, we discussed character traits. We identified the actions and what a characters say to identify traits about that character. These students have blown me away these past two weeks. I expected and planned for a bit of a slide due to spring break where we would have to review class expectations and once again build our stamina for working. What I found was that they came back ready to tackle whatever I put in front of them, and they are eager to help those around them do it too! This week we have been pulling double duty in math as we look at graphs together as a whole class, but also progress through our individual assignments in our groups. I've balanced a little of the work by putting some on the computer so they can play their way through some of the practice.

In reading we are really focusing on our informational text unit. We are reading a story about trees, how they work, and some different types. We will be doing much more with trees and plants in the coming weeks. For now, I can share a fun fact: Did you know some tree sap gives off a foul smell to keep animals away?

With just about 35 days left of school, we are eager to see that our "target scores" are almost at the high score level-when we have mastered all the standards for both second and third grade. It feels good to see how far we have come this year! Our class goal is to memorize our math facts. Please practice these in some way daily. You can use dice, flash cards, or just about any card game to add/subtract or multiply/divide. We are making progress in this area too, but it is one of the things we have not mastered YET!

What a whirlwind of a week in 4/5th grade! We have been busy getting ready for our MCA tests next week. Math has consisted of a smattering of different topics including measurement in the metric system, finding area of various shapes, and transformations of shapes. We've buckled down and stuck with some hard problems, and it's been so impressive to watch the growth of students! We are using more critical thinking, math talk, and problem-solving skills than ever before!

In reading, we have been working on a wide variety of topics. 4th grade analyzed characters, working to compare and contrast two characters that were campaigning in a school election. We had great conversations about what character traits make a good leader. In 5th grade, we talked about tone and style of a piece of writing. Students did a great job identifying the tone of a story and finding evidence to support their ideas.

This week, we've been working on organizing our writing project. We learned an advanced outline format to help us think through our writing assignments and worked together to organize all the facts and information we want to present in our writing. Students got the body of their essay organized, so next week we will be looking to work on the introduction and conclusion before we start writing.

4/5th grade also talked about organization as a life skill. We worked to fill out a Friday agenda to help students get organized with their work. Students made lists of their independent work to check off when they completed assignments and made a plan for when they were going to complete each part. They are doing a good job learning to get organized and ready for middle school!

We also talked about the importance of healthy sleep schedules. Students have been a bit tired lately, especially in the morning. Please work with your child(ren) to plan to get enough sleep each night so they are ready to go the next day! Having a routine of reading before bed is a great way to settle down and get ready for sleep (and is a great way to sneak in those 20 minutes of reading each night).
